
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Neighborhood Signs



Here we are again—at a big election year—in both local and national levels. The following is the city ordinance regarding signs.

The ordinance regarding signs in a residential area states that you may not post a sign in the right of way. The public right of way on private property is between the first expansion joint of your driveway and the street. You may temporarily post the following signs on private property: contractor's sign, garage or yard sale signs, lost or found pet signs, neighborhood meeting signs, political signs, and real estate signs.

Our neighborhood deed restrictions, however, state that the posting of any sign is prohibited except FOR RENT, FOR LEASE, OR FOR SALE and not larger than one square foot. Please remember to remove political signs after the election date passes, and please ensure
