The Gratitude of Thanksgiving

This morning, as I got my kids ready to walk to the bus stop, we had to dig out winter coats for the first time this season. It is finally cold enough outside for it to feel like Fall. That means that one of my favorite American holidays, Thanksgiving, is on the horizon. Years ago, when Lauren and I first came to Columbus, we agreed that as long as possible, we would alternate Thanksgiving celebrations between our two extended families, spending one year in Michigan, and the next year in Wisconsin. As neither of us has any relatives here in Columbus, Thanksgiving is a holiday where we will always be traveling to spend time with family and celebrate the holiday together. These weekends are always filled with special times, although they're not

always perfect. Years ago my older brother insisted our family invest in an outdoor turkey deep-fryer that not only burned a nice section of my grandparents' lawn, but also delayed our Thanksgiving dinner by a couple hours. There was also the time during a childhood Thanksgiving, I somehow agreed to play football with my cousins, excitedly actually caught the ball, and then promptly began running in the wrong direction. Touchdown! (other team).

Through all the craziness of the holiday, there is one tradition that has always remained the same no matter where we spend it. Going around the Thanksgiving table, everyone shares one or more things for which he or she is grateful at that moment. Even in the midst of a raucous weekend with kids running around, a constant stream of NFL football on the TV, and an endless supply of food, this is often cited as the favorite part of Thanksgiving weekend. We take a moment and publicly say thank you. Thank you for the blessings in our lives. Thank you for the joy I've experienced this year. Thank you for the blessed memories of loved ones who sit around this table with us in spirit. Thank you God for enabling us to reach this moment in time.

If Thanksgiving is a holiday in which we are instructed to pause and give thanks, perhaps we should see it not just as an American holiday, but as an important Jewish Holy Day as well. So many of our holidays are focused around the idea of gratitude. In Jewish tradition, we actually have many prayers of thanksgiving we say every day, including the very first words we say when we wake up in the morning. "*modeh ani l'fanecha Melech chai v'kayam, shehechezarta bi nishmati b'chemlah, rabbah emunatecha. I offer thanks to You, ever living Sovereign, that You have restored my soul to me in mercy, how great is Your trust.*" The first thing we say is "thank you." We wake up and say "I am glad to be alive, I am thankful to be alive." We are instructed to see each day as an opportunity as an opportunity for gratitude and blessings. If we are to celebrate each moment as a gift, all the more so when we are gathered with those whom we love for Thanksgiving.

One of my favorite Jewish stories: There once was a man who thought he had a tough life. He found no joy in his work, his family, or his community. He was always envious of what his friends and neighbors had, and knew that he could never afford nicer things. And so he prayed to God to show him a better place. "Show me the way to Paradise!" he implored.

"Very well," replied God, who showed him the way to Paradise.

As it turned out, Paradise wasn't far away – just a few days' journey from his village. So late one afternoon he set out on his way. He walked until nightfall and then decided to rest beneath a leafy tree. Just before he fell asleep, it occurred to him that in the morning he might become confused and forget which was the way to Paradise and which was the way back to the village. Perhaps he wasn't the sharpest tool in the shed. So he left his shoes by the roadside, with the tips pointing toward Paradise so that in the morning all he'd have to do was jump into his shoes and continue on his way.

However, somehow, during the night, the man's shoes got turned around. In the morning he rose feeling rested from his sleep, and prepared to set off on his journey. He went to the roadway, stepped into his shoes, and began walking – unaware that he was in fact returning home.

By noon he could see a village on the next hillside, and his heart leapt. "I've arrived in Paradise!" he thought. He ran down into the valley and up the hill, not stopping until he had arrived at the gates of the village.

"What a beautiful place in Paradise!" he thought. My village was always so crowded, so noisy. This is different, so filled with life and joy!" After a while, he began to feel hungry.

He thought, "Since Paradise looks so much like my village, I wonder if there is a street in Paradise like my street." And just where he thought it might be, there it was! "And look, a house just like mine as well!" Just as he was wondering at this marvelous coincidence, a woman came to the door – a woman who bore a striking resemblance to his wife. The woman called his name and asked him to come in for dinner.

His heart leapt again. "They know me in Paradise! There is a place set for me here in Paradise!"

He entered the house. This house in Paradise was nothing like his house in the village. That house was always crowded, cluttered, filled with commotion. This place was cozy and homey and filled with life. He sat at the table and ate the best meal he'd ever had. He complimented the woman on her heavenly soup. Afterward he went up to his bedroom and entered the deepest, most restful sleep he'd ever known.

Do you know that in all the years that followed, no one could convince the man that he hadn't made it to Paradise! Every one of his days from then on was filled with more wonder, more purpose, more joy, and more life than the day before. He was so grateful for his new life, that he thanked God every day for bringing him to Paradise.

This has long been one of my favorite stories. While it is completely ridiculous on one hand, on the other it reminds us of the timeless message which is at the core of our tradition: gratitude fills our life with meaning. Sometimes we just need to change our perspective to be able to see it.

I wonder why we often have such a hard time seeing the beauty in our own lives? It seems to be a human condition that no matter how great our circumstances are, we tend focus on what we don't have rather than what we do have. We focus on our dreams that are not yet realized, on our desires that are yet unfulfilled. It's like we have a built-in success blind-spot.

We learn from Pirke Avot, a Jewish Ethical volume, that there was once a famous scholar named Ben Zoma. "Ben Zoma asks, Who is Rich? The One who is happy with what he has – one who is *sameach b'chelko* – happy with his portion of this world. The rich person isn't rich because of the amount of stuff he has, the rich person is the one who can find happiness even if the cards are stacked against him. It is the person who can find happiness even though. Even though he's not where he wants to be as he is turning 50. Even though the book that she has worked so hard on hasn't yet been published. Even though he has fallen on hard times and can't afford the luxuries he once had. Even though he can't seem to shake those twenty pounds. Even though she is the only one of her friends who is still single."

For Ben Zoma, this clicked for him one day, when he was sitting down to eat. He looked down at his piece of bread and in that moment he realized what had to have happened and how many people had to have worked for that bread to be in front of him. The farmer planting the crops and later harvesting them. The right amount of sunlight and water for them to grow. The man who prepared the grain to be used. The baker who combined the grain with other ingredients. The shop keeper who sold him the bread. Once he was conscious to what had to happen in order for him to could eat, his perspective completely changed. His shoes were turned in the other direction.

Ben Zoma later taught that we are supposed to say 100 blessings a day to awaken our hearts to the world around us. We are supposed to be thankful 100 times each day. Think about that for a moment – if we opened our hearts and our minds to gratitude and were thankful 100 times each day, how different would our lives be? Perhaps we would spend less time complaining about the line at Starbucks and more time appreciating our pumpkin spice lattes and the other wonderful things in life.

As we approach Thanksgiving this year, perhaps we can spend less time arguing about the political climate with Uncle Sheldon, and spend more time focusing on all that for which we are grateful. Once we are able to turn our shoes around and acknowledge all of our blessings, only then will we truly be able to work to repair our world, and become the blessing in other people's lives.

A Week of EPIC Meals and Connections

November is one of my favorite times of the year. We get to break out the scarves, boots and fuzzy socks; everything becomes sweet potato, cinnamon and pumpkin flavored; and we gear up to celebrate one of my favorite holidays - Thanksgiving! Thanksgiving is a special time to gather with our family and friends, share a feast and express our gratitude for the things most important in our lives.

One might think that Thanksgiving shares a few connections with our Jewish holiday, Sukkot, and they wouldn't be wrong! Sukkot is also a time for gathering and, in agricultural times especially, to express thankfulness for the abundant harvest of the summer. Dr. Jonathan Sarna, a leading expert on Jewish American history, writes that while the Puritans certainly learned from the Hebrew Bible to thank God for their bounty, it's unlikely they celebrated Sukkot directly by way of the first Thanksgiving meal. Regardless, it is still a nice connection between the rhythms of our Jewish and secular calendars - especially when a lot of food is involved!

Over the past couple of weeks, several of our congregants participated in sharing a festive meal in the spirit of togetherness and gratitude. As part of our connection with EPIC (Eastside Partners Interfaith Community), TBS members both hosted and joined interfaith dinners across Columbus with Christian and Muslim families. Several of our Jewish families generously hosted a meal and were able to teach interfaith families about popular Jewish foods and customs, while others experienced similar hospitality from families of other faiths.

I have heard only positive feedback from hosts and participants alike from EPIC's "Week of Meals." Across the dinner tables, connections were made, there were engaging conversations about Ohio issues, similar challenges facing congregations of all faiths, shared hobbies and interests, and ideas about engaging our communities with more interfaith programs. I was delighted to hear that many families want to follow up with another dinner and are looking forward to meeting their new friends again.

In this time of decisiveness, it is heartwarming and truly inspiring to have heard such wonderful feedback about these experiences. To all of our members who participated: thank you for taking the time and opening up your homes for this important and meaningful building of outreach and interfaith connections.

In Memory of Jim Feibel (The Pebble Dropper)

*He raised his hand

Excerpt from Rabbi Benjy's Eulogy of Jim Feibel, z'l

In the early winter of 1979, Jim went to the airport to pick up Temple Beth Shalom's first Torah scroll. Our scroll, number 131, is one of 1500 Torah scrolls saved from Prague during the Nazi occupation from 1939-1945. Just this past Selichot, at the beginning of September, as we were changing the Torah covers, Jim told those assembled the story of picking up the scroll.

He went to the airport, and had problems at customs, because they didn't know how much to charge for the scroll.

"What is this?" they asked Jim.

"It's a Torah scroll."

So the guy looked down his list, nope, no Torah scroll.

Jim said, ok it's the Books of Moses.

Nope, we don't have that either.

Jim tried again, "it's the Pentateuch, surely you have that."

He had to figure out its spelling first. Nope, it's not on the list either.

Then Jim said, it's a Jewish bible.

Oh Bible? Ok, that's duty free. Have a good day!"

And since that day, that little scroll, from the Pincus synagogue in Prague, written in 1803, has faithfully served our congregation. We hold it up at Bar and Bat Mitzvahs. We learn from its text. We see ourselves in its stories. It is the center of our community. And right along side it, since the beginning, Jim Feibel has been the Torah of this congregation. He has been our center. He has been the calm in the storm. He has been that warm presence. Those smiling eyes. That loving embrace. That eager question. That reassuring constant. His story is bound up in all of ours, and we are such better people for having known him.

It says in our tradition, "Days are scrolls, write on them what you want to be remembered." Our Torah will always be with us. It is in our hearts, it is in our souls. May each of us here work to keep Jim's ideals alive in this broken world. May we treat people with compassion, may we engage with the community, may we find our spiritual paths, may we always remember those who are most important to us.


