BFF or BAF?

Stratford, Ontario, is a charming little town of about 32,000. During the annual Stratford Festival, the population balloons as hotels, motels and BnBs are jammed. In 2015, the web site Workopolis named Stratford one of the 10 best places to live in Canada.

Brooklin, Ontario, is also a charming place, though neither a town nor city in its own right. Its population is also around 32,000 and growing as new housing developments spurt. There are, however, no hotels, motels, or BnBs and nothing really to attract someone to stay a few days unless visiting family. Brooklinites love the community and would likely crow they'd live nowhere else. There are a few local events, like the annual Spring Fair and Harvest Festival, but none lasts more than a handful of days and most are barely a half day long.

Stratford, because of its festival, has become a renowned performing arts centre. The festival runs for about six months, but even in the "off-season" there are arts-related events going on.

Brooklin is not an arts centre. There's no theatre let alone a stage with the accoutrements needed, like lighting, sound equipment, curtains, storage, green room, and so on. Even if someone were to step forward to be a patron of such a place, where would it go?

Still, here's an idea worth pondering. Invite performers, actors, and playwrights to try out their works in front of audiences, right here in our core. Even without a golden facility, there are enough "bare bones" venues to host evening and weekend Fringe Festival performances. Think Brooklin Community Centre, the United Church on Cassels Rd or the Legion.

The Fringe Festival circuit, in case you weren't aware, is actually a worldwide phenomenon with Edinburgh, Scotland, being the grandest. Canada is festooned with them: Edmonton, Ottawa, Montreal, Toronto, Calgary, PEI, even North Bay. They all had to start somewhere and not in the best of locations either. My niece once staged her play (that I produced) in a rickety old church basement in Ottawa. We weren't certain the ceiling was going to stay above us when church patrons practiced hymn singing upstairs. No, please, do not stamp your feet to the beat!

Brooklin could do it, becoming the place to go for theatrical performances outside Toronto. Our venues are in the downtown core with shops and restaurants within easy walking distance. Park, walk two blocks, see a couple of shows, grab Any takers out there?

a bite, and enjoy the village.

Call it the Brooklin Fringe Festival (BFF) or Brooklin Arts Festival (BAF). Pick four or five days right before ar after the Spring Fair and watch the region come to us.

Are You On The Voters' List?

With the next Whitby municipal Assessment Notice or municipal election on Monday, October 22, the Town of Whitby is encouraging eligible voters to find out if they are on the list to vote by visiting voterlookup.ca.

Voterlookup.ca is an online service used to collect and confirm information that will be used in the preparation of the final Voters' List for the Whitby municipal and school board elections. Through the service, electors can easily update their personal information, add a name to an address or change their school support.

To update or confirm their information, eligible voters can log on to voterlookup.ca using their full name and date of birth, and either:

- property address; or,
- assessment roll number (19 digit roll number found on a Property

tax bill).

Updates to this information will help ensure the Town's Voters' List is up-to-date before voters head to the polls this fall.

An eligible voter is a person who, on voting day, resides in Whitby or is the owner or tenant of land there, or the spouse of such owner or tenant, and is a Canadian citizen, at least 18 years of age and not prohibited from voting. After September 4, electors wishing to update their information may do so by contacting the Town directly.

Nomination Process Closes July 27

Nominations in the Town of Whitby began on May 1, 2018, for the Offices noted in the table below.

In accordance with the Municipal Elections Act, nominations must be filed using the prescribed forms, accompanied by the prescribed nomination filing fee and nominations for an office on a council must be endorsed by at least 25 persons. The filing fee is \$200.00 for the offices of Mayor and Regional Chair and \$100.00 for all other offices. The filing fee is payable by cash, debit, certified cheque or money order.

A nomination must be signed by the candidate and may be filed in person or by an agent at the Office of the Town Clerk for the Town of Whitby (unless otherwise noted), during regular business hours (Monday to

Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.) between May 1, 2018 and July 26, 2018 and between 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. on Friday, July 27, 2018 (Nomination Day). If a nomination for a candidate is filed by an agent, a letter must be submitted at the time of filing which authorizes the agent to file on behalf of the candidate. The letter must be signed by the candidate, and commissioned or notarized by a person authorized under the Commissioners for Taking Affidavits Act or Notaries Act. In addition to this letter, an agent must also provide a copy of the candidate's ID to be retained on file. No person who proposes to be a candidate may solicit or accept contributions for election purposes or incur campaign expenses until a nomination paper has been filed.

Growing Independent Kids



daughter on an independent adventure, on a bus for a trip of a lifetime at

an all-girls sleepaway camp. For the next two weeks, I won't have any contact with her except for a couple of hand-written "snail mail" letters and a few Facebook pictures. Am I worried? Not at all.

The whole idea of going to camp on your own and getting away from your family can be scary, but at the same time can build independence. I am impressed and take pride in this type of development in my child. Each time she returns, I get a more self-reliant, confident kid.

We live in a results-oriented world. We want our children to score the winning goal or star in the show. And we want them to do it without our help. But how can kids be encouraged to find their own solutions when we direct them and make all the decisions for them? With guidance rather than direction, kids are able to build self-confidence and independence because once they get over the fear of trying something new, they want to try more new things. This is something that isn't taught, but learned.

Develops self-confidence

I just sent my 9-yr-old about watching them struggle or letting them fend for themselves. It's about encouraging self-confidence, making positive choices, and having a mind of your own. All these things are developed at camp. With no parent to pick up your clothes, tell you to bathe, what to eat, or where you need to be, kids somehow survive by making their own decisions with guidance from their camp counsellors.

> At camp, the kids bond with their cabinmates by figuring out who gets which bunk, establishing cabin norms, working as a team, and building self-reliance and self-direction along the way. While camp has structured activities, the girls also have a say in what they do. All kinds of options are there for the taking. It's up to them to fill the time. Being independent is about choices. It's about saying "no" to something that doesn't feel right and "yes" to trying new things that do. My child comes home with tails of archery, canoe trips, ropes courses, and cabin antics that find her and her cabinmates on dinner clean-up duty.

Finding one's uniqueness

Starting this type of independence at a young age is good practice for the future and is crucial for proper growth. Independence isn't about Developing independent kids isn't taking the role model out of the

picture but rather about giving the child the ability to grow up into one's unique self in their own way. Kids grow into independent thinkers who choose right over wrong and know when to leave the crowd behind.

It's also about trying on different identities to find the one that fits. It's about letting children learn their

ideas matter, their decisions (and consequences) are theirs and that they will be supported along the way.


From the Brooklin Heritage Society

In 1936, my grandmother, Hattie Bailey, opened a concession stand in the orchard between her house at 149 Baldwin Street N and my grandfather Jerry's Sunoco service station at 157. This stand was referred to as "The Booth" and it was from here that Hattie sold sandwiches, beverages, baked goods, candy, cigarettes, ice cream and paintings by local artist Cliff Delong.

A neighbour, Mrs Pengelly, baked pies Hattie sold by the slice. Local women brought flowers from their gardens. Members of Rebecca Lodge held their tea parties in the orchard.

Before closing the booth in 1953, Hattie also operated a concession stand for many years at the Brooklin Spring Fair.



Did you know that as soon as a coffee bean is roasted, its tasty life declines? This explains why coffee places have to add preservatives, according to Mark Sylvester (in photo on left). His new venture, which began only two months ago, imports coffee beans

then roasts them for you to take home, grind, and pour. He says some customers have told him the coffee is so fresh and good that they've stopped adding things to it like milk or sugar. "Our niche," he calls it.

They sell Colombian and Ethiopian beans bought from suppliers. In fact, his Colombian connection lives in Whitby and comes from a fifth generation family-owned coffee farm with an export licence.



"The coffee bean itself is the seed of a fruit, the coffee cherry," describes the coffee connoisseur. "Once you open the fruit, the lifespan is about two to three weeks." He and his partner import the beans and prepare them for the consumer, offering delivery sub-

scriptions from the web site. They roast on Tuesdays and Thursdays and deliver on Wednesdays and Fridays.

Their instagram account provides quick updates on special deals and new roasts.

Cathi Westrop parlayed a quarter century career in the cosmetic industry into a successful business selling soaps, bath salts and the like. It began simply enough when she was making soaps for family members. But darn if people kept asking for more. She acquiesced by expanding the inventory, running the business from her home and selling in several retail stores as well, two in Toronto and eight in Durham.

It's not quite a full time occupation yet as she's maintained her role as manager of Brooklin's Humphrey's Boutique two days each week. However, she finds time to make the soaps herself, using olive, palm, and coconut oils - never animal fats - and with Health Canada approved ingredients. She's taught her husband to help out because of the number of orders. The result is that their basement, living room, dining room and office are now soap warehouses.

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Durham Region reports positive signs

in this "Hot Summer" market. Durham Region Association of REALTORS" (DRAR) President Dennis Roberts reported 918 residential transactions in June 2018, a 6.87 percent increase from May 2018 and a 7.92 per cent decrease from the same time last year. June also saw the number of new listings in Durham decrease month-over-month to 1,895, down from 2,247 new listings in May. The average selling price reached \$610,728 in June 2018, a 2.22 per cent increase compared to May 2018. "After some adjustment to the new Office of The Superintendent of Financial Institutions (OSFI) stress test regulations and generally higher borrowing costs, the increase in sales over the last couple months are a clear indication that home buyers have started to get back into the market," said Roberts. "Durham Region continues to offer the best home value in the GTA. According to the MLS" Home Index and Benchmark Price, Durham continues to offer affordable housing options for buyers," said Roberts. "Durham leads with the most affordable single-family detached, single-family attached, townhouses and apartments.

"The expectation is to see improvement in sales over the next year. Over the same period, however, it is likely that issues surrounding the supply of listings will persist. This suggests that competition between buyers could increase, exerting increased upward pressure on home prices. With a new provincial government in place and municipal elections on the horizon, housing supply should be top-of-mind for policy makers," said Jason Mercer, TREB's Director of Market Analysis and Service Channels.

Sotheby's CEO Brad Henderson said he expects home prices will rise by the end of the year in Toronto, although sales volumes will likely remain flat.

"There's going to continue to be upward pressure on prices in the single digits. It will probably be in the 5 percentage range," he said. "Costs continue to rise — there continues to be more demand than there is supply."

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
