Our Mission: The North Mecklenburg Woman's Club is a philanthropic organization dedicated to promote and support social, educational, and civic progress in the community.

Membership:

Any woman resident of the communities that comprise North Mecklenburg and the greater Lake Norman areas who is interested in the objectives of this club, is a candidate for membership.

It is the duty of each member to:

- Support club projects
- Each member is expected to support all fundraising efforts. This support can include volunteer time, buying or selling tickets, financial support and/or in-kind donations. Members attending Red, White & Green are asked to donate an item valued at \$25 or more.
- Actively serve on the Committees of their choice
- Attend either Day or Evening monthly meeting
- Pay annual dues

Dues:

Annual membership dues are \$50.00. The fiscal year begins June 1 and ends May 31st. Members shall pay Dues to the Membership Chair by the May Meeting, one month prior to the beginning of the fiscal year. The Membership Chair shall begin to collect dues for the following year at the March meeting. Dues must be paid by the September meeting of each year, or the member will be dropped from the club

Hospitality Reservations

Meals are \$17 and may be paid for with cash, check or credit card. If you pay by credit card, a \$1.00 credit card surcharge will be added for each meal. A cash bar is available at the night meeting. NorthStone accepts only cash or credit card.

- Members are encouraged to pay in September for the meals for the Club year. Even if you have paid for the year, you are still required to contact the Hospitality Chair to confirm your absence from the meeting.
- Members and their guests are required to make a reservation for lunch or dinner by Friday prior to the meeting.
- IF YOU MAKE A RESERVATION, YOU ARE REQUIRED TO PAY EVEN IF YOU CANNOT ATTEND THE MEETING.

100% of the funds we raise are given to our charities. This past year we created a new grant system. All non-profits providing services in the greater Lake Norman Area are eligible to apply. Charities are selected through a process of screening by our appropriations team, then membership input. The final selection for the year is made by the board based on Membership input and recommendations from the appropriations team.

History of North Mecklenburg Woman's Club

1914 – 1920s

Organized in 1914 as the Huntersville Woman's Club, our primary purpose was creating social opportunities and doing civic work in Huntersville, N. C. With an average of 30 members, we worked on beautification...lawns, gardens; we created handicrafts; exchanged recipes; and encouraged music appreciation.

1920s

During these years, most of our members were teachers so we began to partner with local schools on grounds improvement, donating books and helping with fund raising. We also sponsored our first Boy and Girl Scout troops.

1930s

The big emphasis was on helping the war effort. We helped with Red Cross work and sold war bonds. At home we helped fight growing health issues by assisting with fund raising for polio and heart programs, and providing supplies for cancer patients.

1940s

We helped establish the first branch library in the county. It was a small brick building furnished with shelves, draperies, tables and chairs. Our members helped to rebind and catalogue books and for a while helped to staff the branch.

1950s

We did clean up, fix up, paint drives, planted trees and shrubs, held garden tours and sponsored health programs and fashion shows. Quilts were made for the patients at Huntersville Sanatorium. To raise money we held bazaars, bake sales, antique displays and a Christmas home decoration contest.

In 1953, we joined the General Federation of Woman's Clubs. We had grown to 44 members—2 from the original 1914 membership. We established our department structure: American Home, Education, Fine Arts and International Relations.

In 1956 we partnered with North Mecklenburg High School and the American Field Service Exchange to bring in the first foreign exchange student. That year, we were also the official hosts for the opening of a new branch library.

1960s

With our help, over 50 crabapple trees were planted along Hwy 115 in downtown Huntersville. We collected clothes for the schools clothes closet and provided financial aid for students to attend a summer recreation program. For Easter Seals, members addressed 5,000 envelops for donations.

1970s

We raised money for donations to create Holbrook Park and its tennis courts. A fund was also established to build a Community Center for Huntersville and gave financial support to the Boys & Girls Home, Huntersville Hospital Operation —Home Bound, and to Western Carolina Center. We were awarded the Community Improvement Program Award in 1973 for financial support of the North Mecklenburg Medical Development Association. In 1979, club member Sarah McAuley was elected at Huntersville's first female mayor.

-NMWC members helped provide a bus for the Huntersville Hospital called the —Funshine Express.

- The North Mecklenburg Junior Woman's Club was formed and sponsored by the Huntersville Woman's Club, the Charter President was Dawn Bradford, who is still a member today. These ladies were between the ages of 18 – 35. Also in 1981, Girls Haven received \$2,200 from the club in support of their swimming pool and gym.

- We gave \$4,700 and helped complete a two year community program to restore the Hugh Torrance House and Store. A Fit Trail received a financial boost of \$1,000 from our group and members fought against the Reames Road Landfill.

- We sponsored our first \$1,000 scholarship to a student at North Mecklenburg High School.

- Members began meeting in Huntersville Presbyterian Fellowship Hall. Dues were only \$20.00 and lunches were prepared by some of the 66 members.

- Financial donations were made to Huntersville Oaks Nursing Home. Also, that year our official seal was approved. It is a white dogwood bloom on a green background with Huntersville Woman's Club, organized in 1914.

– The Lake Norman Juniorettes were formed by Denise Carter, a member of the North Mecklenburg Junior Woman's Club and a past president of NMWC. Erica Whelan was the Charter President.

1992 –Member's stood strong to keep the library in Huntersville while the library at North Cross was being discussed. Bingo was held at Brookwood Retirement Home and stamps were collected for World Countries.

– A tree was planted at Cornelius Elementary.

– Brookwood Woman's Club was formed. It was known as the "club within a club". The Huntersville Woman's Club paid the dues of these women, but held monthly meetings for them with guest speakers. The dream of building the Huntersville Civic Association Building was dropped by the members.

– The North Mecklenburg Junior Woman's Club disbanded.

– Our general meetings were moved from Huntersville Presbyterian Church to the Peninsula Country Club, with members paying for their lunch instead of the hostess committee cooking it. Bibs were made for Huntersville Oaks residents.

– With membership at only 38, Special Interest Groups were formed in the hopes of encouraging new members. These groups included a book club, lunch bunch, and "make a project". The tradition of planting an historical tree at North Mecklenburg High School for the Horticultural Department was begun and continues today.

We ended the decade with 40 members paying \$25 for dues.

The new millennium

- We decided to focus scholarship money on women returning to school to further their careers and the first award was made.

– Made a large donation to the NC Aquarium. Double Harvest was brought to our attention through Vickie Van Wingerden (an active member today) and we began supporting it through International Affairs. One hundred bibs were made for patients at Huntersville Oaks Nursing Home. Members held a Bridge Benefit at the Huntersville Aquatic Center and our first Red, White, & Green Auction was established as the December program. The donations of \$5,000 made to the Civic Center were returned to the HWC because it wasn't going to be built and we donated it to the Huntersville Aquatic Center.

– We held our first plant sale. A donation of \$2,500 was made to a student at NMHS who broke his neck in a diving accident. The money went towards the purchase of a lift for the family van.

– We renamed our organization the North Mecklenburg Woman's Club (NMWC) to reflect the growing diversity of our membership. We also changed our logo from the Dogwood Flower to a branch, — branching out to the community. Members were given tote bags with the new name and logo. We held our first fashion show as a fundraiser.

– We withdrew from the General Federation of Woman's Club so we could ensure that more of our funds stayed in the local communities and give us more independence. Butter Braids were sold for the first time as a fundraiser. Supported the Opening of Hope House.

– We helped open Lake Norman Free Clinic and decorated a bedroom at Hope House. Donated \$5,000 in scholarships.

– Membership reached an all-time high of 135 members. Scholarships were given only to women going back to school, no high school students. We sponsored the Over the Tabletop gala fund raiser for the first time.

– We realigned our organization by adding a communications vice president and having all committee chairs report to one of the now three vice presidents.

2012 - 2013

Over The Tabletop raised \$13,000 that went to ANSWER, Red, White, and Green raised \$8,000 that went to Ada Jenkins Center, and a fashion show that raised \$12,000 along with other monies that totaled \$30,000 that helped Purple Heart Homes, Hope House, Caterpillar Ministries and many other charities in the area. 146 members participated in the Soup and Chowder event for Susan G. Koman, Education, International Affairs, and Community Affairs projects. Butter Braids were sold to give members a boost for the Blood Drive that was held at the fall meeting.

2013 - 2014

The beginning of our celebration of 100 years in the community! Each committee was asked to donate items by the 100's, 100 blankets, 100 cupcakes, 100 notes of kindness, 100 items for the Animal Shelter, 100 toiletry items, 100 books for the library, 100 cans of

food, etc. Butter Braids, Over the Table Top, and Casino Night raised money for the many charities we support. Dress for Success was also supported by our ladies as we held a members brunch and collected items that were needed for job interviews. We were excited to donate a full kitchen and laundry room to a local resident whose house burnt down, Build Betty A House. We also supported the opening of Serenity House by furnishing and tidying up their front porch to welcome visitors.

2014 - 2015

180 members contributed to Butter Braids; Over the Tabletop (\$10,000); Red, White, and Green (\$14,344); and Casino night, Saddles and Spurs (\$9,860). International Affairs was dropped and Community for a Cause was added to aid with crisis in the area that needed immediate help. Legendary Leading Ladies was added to membership recognizing members with 25 years of service to the club.

2015 - 2016

For the first time, the NMWC membership topped 200, finishing the year at 203. The club's efforts netted \$66,000 to be divided among 18 designated charities. The five main charities, ANSWER, Caterpillar Ministries, Hope House, Purple Heart Homes, and Serenity House received \$10,600 each, comprising 80% of the year's fundraising monies. The club supported thirteen additional charities through the work of its volunteers and individual checks of \$1,000 totaling the remaining 20% of funds raised.

2016 - 2017

The membership focused its fundraising efforts on fewer events with the goal of increasing the impact of each. The plan succeeded with \$74,600 allocated for end-of-year donations to the selected charities. Red, White and Green, a favorite among members, raised \$15,500. The casino night, Denim and Diamonds, reached an all-time high of \$40,000 with nearly 300 guests attending. A new fundraiser, Make Money Grow, challenged participating members with \$20 "seed money" to use any way they liked to raise money. Members found many creative ways, hosting luncheons, psychics, game nights, selling baked goods, etc., to raise over \$12,000. Angels and Sparrows, ANSWER, Hope House, and Caterpillar Ministries received the majority of the money raised with other designated charities receiving the remaining 20%. Additional committee accomplishments included an overhaul of the website by GoDaddy, the collection of Boxtops for Education, a donation of 300 pairs to Double Harvest, and much other hands-on work as well as social and educational activities.

2017 - 2019

The membership focused its fundraising efforts on two major events the past two years. Our traditional Red, White and Green Holiday auction and our Denim and Diamonds Casino Night. In addition we raised funds through sponsorship and our Make \$ Grow program. In 2018 we raised \$86K and in 2019 we raised \$77K. Our major charities included Angels and Sparrows, ANSWER Scholarship, Hope House, Beds for Kids and Caterpillar Ministries. They received the majority of the money raised with other designated charities receiving the remainder. A special one time gift was given to the Cain Center for the Arts to help establish an Arts Center in Cornelius. NMWC name will appear on a brick when the Arts Center is completed. Our efforts to help the schools through tutoring and supply drives expanded. We held a special recognition lunch for teachers that was greatly appreciated. We also recognized our first responders on Valentine's day with treat baskets. Members brought in gently used jewelry which they used to set up a shop so Caterpillar Ministry children could "shop" for their mom's for Mother's Day. Other special projects included making blankets, weaving moisture barrier mats for the homeless out of plastic grocery bags, filling Christmas stockings for adults at local care centers and holding special events like bingo parties for the residents too. We continue to staff the Angels and Sparrows soup kitchen every month as well as participate in making brown bag lunches during the summer for school children. We are continually working to improve our communication inside and outside the club through our weekly emailed newsletter, our website, Facebook and Instagram. To balance out the hard work our members put in we have a lot of fun activities to. We have monthly book club, lunch bunch and Canasta. We have an art group that gives members a chance to learn new arts and crafts as well as opportunities to attend performing arts. Our Wine and Dines are a favorite for both our members and their spouses, friends and guests. Other recent favorites include, Woman's Self-Defense Class, Metrolina Greenhouse tour, Aloha Paddle board and Pink Flamingo Girls Night Out. Our Holiday Brunch and Cookie Exchange is becoming an annual favorite. We created our first printed photo history book in May of 2019 to help remember what the hard working, fun loving members of NMWC have accomplished.

North Mecklenburg Woman's Club Past Presidents
