As you're reading this month's newsletter, summer is coming to an end. With all the rain we received. it was not what we could call a normal summer. Fred will still be with us till mid-October, so he'll be around to help with fall cleanup. I can't believe that's almost right around the corner.


As always, thank you, Jeff, Shawn, Fred and Jarod, for all your hard work in keeping the community looking the best it can be.

FERAL CAT PROJECT UPDATE



Lots has happened since June. Before I get to the details, I'd like to clarify some things. I think that some residents are under the impression that all the feral cats and kittens will return to Medvil after being trapped, neutered, and vaccinated. The Trap, Neuter, Return Program, or TNR, has as its main goal to reduce the population by limiting reproduction, with the added benefit of finding homes for adoptable cats who can then have a safer, longer, healthier life.

Most of the adult cats here are too feral to be tamed and will return to the cooperative. All kittens go to foster homes to be socialized and then to permanent homes with loving adopters. If adult cats show some signs that they might be social, special volunteers work with them with hopes of getting them used to people and into loving homes. This has been done with a handful, and only one cat, Tortellini, has been able to be adopted. The shelter had hope for Rigatoni and Fettuccine, but they were recently returned, as was Spaghetti, who did a good job rearing her kittens, Linguine, Farfalle, Gemelli, Macaroni, and Orzo, who have all been adopted.

Since the last publication of *The Medvil Messenger*, two adult cats, Lasagna and Gnocchi, and two kittens, Piccata and Caprese, were trapped. Gnocchi is at the shelter being evaluated for sociability, Lasagna is in the socialization program, and the kittens are at my house being socialized. Cavatappi's kittens, Vermicelli, Capellini, Pappardelle, and Orecchiette, were trapped. Three of them are up for adoption. The fourth is being monitored for a possible medical condition.

Buttons - who was already pregnant again when she was trapped - will be available for adoption soon, and her kittens, Felt and Velcro have been adopted. Tagliatelle took good care of her kittens, Fusilli, Bucatini, and Rotini, and was returned to Medvil. Her kittens have been adopted. Fettuccine's kittens, Penne and Ziti, have been adopted as well.

This program has been very successful so far. Nine adults have been spayed or neutered, a whopping 16 kittens have been adopted, and a few adults have been given a chance at a new, safe, happy life in loving homes! Without this program, the population would have increased by 18 (the total number of kittens trapped so far), plus, the females who were trapped could have EACH had up to three more litters this year, and some of the female kittens would have been able to have litters this summer, too!

Our community is made up of cat lovers, cat haters and everything in between. This program benefits everyone. The population is being controlled, cats are in less danger, and there will always be good mousers around.

Wednesday afternoons from 12:30 to 2:30 a group of women from the

community meet at Partridge Lane clubhouse to knit, crochet, chat and generally enjoy each other's company. Sometimes we call this a support group. Got a problem with the project you're working on? We'll offer our opinions and advice and one of us will have the solution. Don't know which colors would look good together? Same thing. There will be as many suggestions as there are people present. Need knitting needles or crochet hooks? We have a stash of both so whether you're new to the craft or a veteran we probably have what you need. We ply our hooks and needles for relaxation, to make hats, blankets, mittens, scarves and more for others and sometimes even for ourselves. Project Linus is a recipient of many blankets and afghans from our group. Native Americans living in poverty in South Dakota get a few packages every year filled with just about anything you want to make. The homeless in Manchester have worn hats, socks and mittens that we have made. We are generally selfsupporting, especially buying yarn for our work, but



we have also been fortunate to receive donations from residents and others who have heard of what we do. We get needles, hooks, yarn, fabric, and did I mention yarn?

Perhaps the most thoughtful and meaningful gifts we have received are from residents of Medvil who can no longer knit or crochet and family members of residents who have died. It all gets put to good use and we are very grateful.

Recently a member of the Board of Directors passed away. Sonja Fuller came to our group when she was learning to crochet, stayed for a while then became too busy with community business to come to meetings but continued to knit and crochet at home. Her family has donated all of Sonja's yarn to our group to use in making items for charity and we want to share it. If you are unable to knit or crochet with us, you are welcome to come to the clubhouse to look at the yarn and choose what you would like. All we ask is that your creations go to someone in need. Make a phone call to Rollande Moore or Gini Duford to let us know if you can come to a meeting and what kind of yarn you like to use so we can have a selection available when you come.

The Medvil Cooperative Annual Meeting is scheduled for Saturday, November 6th. Here are a few things you need to know about this year's meeting:



• It is at the Derryfield Restaurant, 625 Mammoth Road in Manchester.

That's right, no more uncomfortable metal folding chairs! The Maple Ave Elementary School decided two years ago that they were no longer going to rent out their space since we were the only group who used it.

- Registration opens at 8:00 am at which time we will begin serving a continental breakfast. The meeting is slated to begin at 9:00 am.
- Lunch will not be served this year. In the interest of appealing to those folks who don't have an entire Saturday to devote to our meeting, we will make every effort to end the meeting (voting and all) by 12 noon.

The Annual Meeting packets with the full agenda and supporting materials will be in the mail the third week of October.

VOTING

There shall be no voting by proxy; nor shall a proxy be counted towards the establishment of a quorum. *The existence of a quorum shall be established at* the beginning of each meeting and shall remain valid until the meeting is adjourned.

And just a reminder, only one Membership interest is assigned to a home, and only one full vote may be exercised under a Membership interest.



MY MOTHER AND THE BOYFRIEND

My mother at the age of 84 is going steady. The boyfriend is 92. They have a very proper relationship. No premarital sex, no staying out past midnight and no sneaking the boyfriend in at night. Oh, and you'll never hear foul language from them-- she's a Mormon and his father was a Methodist minister.

They met at the local senior center prior to Covid-19. My mother enjoyed the Breakfast Club, chatting with others about current events. She also enjoyed visiting with her painting buddies, showing off new projects. She has been a prolific artist mainly working in watercolor and oils. My home is



full of her paintings. The boyfriend would come for the Writer's Club where my mom would also be in attendance and then on to bingo. He is also a retired physician and pathologist.

Almost 3 years ago, my dad died suddenly. And then Covid-19 hit the country. This caused the closing of the senior center and put

many older people into a community-imposed isolation. So, even though my younger sister shares the home with my mother and was home after work every day, these were dark times.

The boyfriend and my mom reached out to each other by phone and with my mom's tutelage, was able to show him how to do "FaceTime" on an IPhone. If you're not familiar with FaceTime, it's a phone call where you get to see the person that you're calling in real-time. Mind you, he was not the boyfriend back then.

At the beginning, they challenged each other to writing assignments. Mostly poems and short stories that they would share each week. After a few months, my mom suggested they put on their masks and go for a ride, just to get out. He had only been living in the same city for 3 years and was not familiar with the area. So, once or twice a week they would venture out in the wilds of Northern Utah.

Since they both got vaccinated for Covid, they are enjoying bird watching on Saturday mornings, they go out to lunch on Thursdays at the senior center

that finally reopened and visit at each other's homes. He has told my mother that doing FaceTime every day at 9 AM, (he seems to be on some schedule) during Covid had saved his life. They also play music together, she the piano and he the cello. And there is the occasional hug and kiss.

Life is really too short, so seize the time you have and enjoy all that you can.

(My sister and I are very happy for them, but rather than use his name, I still occasionally call him "the boyfriend" and my sister calls him "what's his name.")



It's a portable, easy-to-use, medical device that can analyze the heart's rhythm and, if necessary, deliver an electrical shock, or defibrillation, to help the heart re-establish an effective rhythm.

- Rides available for medical appointments.
- Connect with MTA Route #6 at Shaws Plaza for Manchester, Concord and Nashua service.
- All buses accessible for disabled passengers.

For Appointments:

- Provide the address information for pickup and drop-off locations.
- Give them the date and time requested, you will be provided with a 30-minute pick-up window.
- You may ride with a companion.
- Passengers will need to provide the purpose of the ride.
