# HERE ARE SOME TIPS ON HOW TO CELEBRATE SAFELY THIS HOLIDAY SEASON:

Turn on lights and a radio or TV so it looks like someone's home. Be extra cautious about locking doors and windows when you leave, even if it's just for a few minutes. Don't display gifts where they can be seen from outside. Stay alert and be aware of what's going on around you.

When shopping with young children, teach them to go to a store clerk, police officer, or security guard if you get separated.

Loading up on all those gifts is a sign of progress in holiday shopping, but if those packages are left out in the open after they're in the car, your car has become a likely target for thieves. Remember the old cliché "Out of sight, out of mind?" The same idea applies to items in your car. Breaking into an empty car isn't worth a thief's time. However, anything left in plain view like to spare change, sunglasses, tablets, cell phones, or briefcases may tempt a thief.

Help prevent your vehicle from being stolen by always locking your car and using anti-theft devices. Never leave your vehicle running while you run inside a store even if for only a

minute or two. Park in a well-light space, and be sure to lock the car, close the windows, and hide shopping bags and gifts in the trunk

Avoid carrying large amounts of cash and pay with a check or credit card whenever possible. Be extra careful with purses and wallets. Carry a purse close to your body, not dangling by the straps. Put a wallet in an inside coat or front pants pocket.

It's not uncommon for people to try to take advantage of others' generosity during the holidays by going door-to-door for charitable donations. Ask for identification and find out how the funds will be used. If you aren't satisfied, do not donate. Help a charitable organization you know and like instead.

Burglars know that many households have new, and oftentimes expensive, items in their homes following the December holidays. In too many cases, residents make it easy for burglars to figure out which homes to target by putting boxes that identify their new gifts in plain view with their other garbage. Avoid becoming an easy target for post-holiday burglars by not leaving boxes for new electronics and other items in the alley or other garbage pick-up locations for several days at a time. Instead, break down any boxes you are throwing out, put them in garbage bags and place them inside a trash can.

If you see someone suspicious casing your alley, or if you see a burglary in progress, call 911. The holidays are a good time to update your home inventory sheet. Take photos or make videos of items, and list descriptions and serial numbers. If your home is burglarized, having a detailed inventory can help identify stolen items and make insurance claims easier to file. Make sure things like TVs, VCRs, stereo equipment, cameras, camcorders, sports equipment, jewelry, silver, computers, home office equipment, and power tools are on the list. Keep track of online deliveries. Sign up for email notifications to track your packages from initial shipment to its arrival at your home, or the recipient's address if you have the gift delivered directly. If you know a family member or neighbor will be home, ask them to pick up the packages as soon as they are delivered. Switch delivery location to work where it can be received by someone and not left on the porch. See if the post office or store the product is being shipped from can hold the package for pick up. The post office will allow your package to remain safe and secure for up to 30 days.



#### **User Names**

When new PNP members are added to the Samaritan program we assign them a User Name that consists of the initials of PNP, a zero and end in the person's PNP badge number. We do this for several reasons. First it makes the PNP members easy to find in the Samaritan program which is used by all other volunteer programs in the city of Phoenix. Second it verifies the person has gone through the PNP class and was assigned a badge number and it prevents us from entering a duplicate record.

Recently a good number of records were no longer in the PNP record area of the program, we were able to find the mis-assigned records because of the User Name beginning with PNP and re-assign them back to the PNP area.



# Snapshot of November 22<sup>nd</sup> Breakfast:

This morning Guest speaker Nick Stavros, President and CEO, Community Medical Services spoke on the Methadone Clinic at 28<sup>th</sup> Drive and Thunderbird and their mission to treating the opioids crisis.

The clinic is currently in capacity to services 350 patients on any given day and is the first clinic to operate 24 hours a day. The facility is 5,000 square ft. and they will be 2 expanding to another location on Cactus and I-17, a 27, 000 square ft. facility with 288 parking spaces and will take over the 24-hours operation.

Mr. Stavros reiterated that the clinics are located only where there is a need. Therefore, crime rates do not spike when a clinic is put in place.

# \$900,000 GRANT AWARDED TO COMBAT HUMAN TRAFFICKING OFFICE OF GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

The Phoenix Police Department was awarded a grant of \$900,000 from the U.S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice for the Enhanced Collaborative Model Task Force to Combat Human Trafficking: Supporting Law Enforcement's Role Grant. The purpose of the grant is to support the development and enhancement of a multidisciplinary human trafficking task force. Funding will supplement the progress made in the effort to combat human trafficking and the focus of the funding is to provide support to law enforcement entities to continue building capacity and operational effectiveness as a core member of a collaborative, multidisciplinary human trafficking task force. # CRIME TIPS:

# TELEMARKETERS STILL HAVE YOUR PHONE RINGING? YOU CAN FIGHT BACK!

Tired of incessant telemarketing calls? You aren't alone. Complaints to the Federal Trade Commission average 190,000 a month. If you've added all of your phone numbers to the National Do Not Call Registry, you might be wondering why you still get so many telemarketing calls. One reason is that some entities are allowed to call — charities, surveys, political groups and debt collectors, for example. But another reason is that many of these calls, up to half, may be scam calls. And we all know scammers don't first check the National Do Not Call Registry before targeting us. Nevertheless, there are some things you can do to help keep these calls at bay.

#### **HOW IT WORKS:**

The Federal Trade Commission manages the National Do Not Call Registry, 1-888-382-1222, which is intended to stop unwanted sales calls; it's free, and you can add all of your numbers to it.

Your registration does not expire.

Legitimate companies are not permitted to call you if you're on the registry unless you've recently done business with them or if you've given them written permission to call you.

If legitimate telemarketers call a number on the National Do Not Call Registry and don't otherwise have permission, they are susceptible to stiff fines from the Federal Communications Commission, so most legitimate companies will not break the rules.

#### WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

If your number is on the National Do Not Call Registry and you're still besieged by calls, they are probably scam calls.

If you answer a scam call, the longer you stay on the line, the "hotter" your number is in the buying and selling of phone lists. Even though you may want to engage to teach them a lesson or waste the scammer's time, it's not worth it.

#### WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

Hang up on unsolicited calls — or better yet, let them go to voicemail. You can decide whether to return the calls after you've carefully listened to them.

Ask your phone provider if it offers free or low-cost call-blocking

If an incoming call directs you to press a number on your telephone keypad to be removed from their calling list, don't press the number — just hang up. Pressing the number will just lead to your number being bought and sold among scammers.

Report unwanted calls to the Federal Trade Commission at <a href="www.donotcall.gov">www.donotcall.gov</a>. Report the number that shows up on your caller ID and any number that you're told to call back. If you have been victimized by a scammer on public Wi-Fi, call the AARP Fraud Watch Network Helpline at 1-877-908-3360 for guidance and support.

# VETERANS IN THE CROSSHAIRS OF SCAMMERS

While veterans and nonveterans alike are targeted by scammers, an AARP study found that veterans are twice as likely as nonveterans to lose money to fraud schemes. And nearly 80% of veterans reported being targeted by scams related to their service, such as fundraising appeals from fake military charities or being told of "little known" government programs that could mean cash for veterans. As we honor those who have served our country this Veterans Day, know that scammers go to great lengths to target their money, their benefits and their commitment to current and former soldiers.

#### **HOW IT WORKS:**

Targeting veterans can take many forms. These include:

The Cash-for-Benefits Scheme: Predatory lenders target veterans in need of money by offering cash in exchange for future disability or pension payments. These buyouts are typically a fraction of the value of the benefit.

The Update-Your-Military-File Scam: A caller claims to be from the Department of Veterans Affairs and asks to "update" their information, but really is hoping to get personal information to steal your credit.

Charity Scams: A caller claims to be raising money for disabled veterans or veterans with cancer. But often, the so-called charity is not registered with the government or uses most of the money to raise more funds and pay their own salaries.

Employment Scams: Con artists post bogus job offers to recruit veterans on various online job boards. The scammer may use or sell the personal information provided in the job application. It's likely a scam if you have to pay to get the job, you need to supply credit card or banking information, or the ad is for "previously undisclosed" federal government jobs.

#### WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

If you are a veteran, be mindful that scammers see you as a hot prospect. You have the power to protect yourself by knowing this and engaging your inner skeptic when considering special offers or requests for personally identifiable or otherwise sensitive information.

The Veterans Affairs will never call you, e-mail or text you to request money.

#### WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

If you get an unexpected call from the VA, hang up and call the VA back at a verified phone number, and ask if the VA is trying to reach you.

at <a href="https://www.give.org">www.charitynavigator.org</a> before giving any money. Make donations directly to the veterans organizations you know.

Only work with VA-accredited representatives when dealing with VA benefits; you can search for them online at the VA Office of General Counsel website.

When it comes to fraud, vigilance is our number one weapon. You have the power to protect yourself and your loved ones from scams. Please share this alert with friends and family and visit the <u>Fraud Watch</u> Network for more information.

# ADOT wrapping up major wrong way sign project on Valley freeways

# Work is agency's latest phase on installation of more noticeable signs

The Arizona Department of Transportation is completing a project to install hundreds of new, more visible wrong way



signs along Phoenix-area freeways as part of ongoing efforts to get the attention of often-impaired drivers who go the wrong direction on off-ramps or in travel lanes.

Updated, more noticeable wrong way signs are among countermeasures the state is using to reduce the risk of serious crashes caused by wrong-way drivers.

The most recent \$2.1 million sign project is a continuation of ADOT's statewide initiative in recent years to replace older signs with larger and lowered "wrong way" or "do not enter" signs along exit ramps on Valley freeways and other Arizona highways.

As an example, updated red wrong way signs on posts along offramps have been increased in size from 30 by 24 inches to 48 by 36 inches. Over time, the bottom edge of such signs has been lowered to approximately 3 feet above the ground, rather than 7 feet, to have them closer to a wrong-way driver's line of vision.

The latest wrong way sign upgrades have included sections of interstates 10 and 17, US 60 (Superstition Freeway), State Route 51, Loop 101 (Agua Fria Freeway) and Loop 202 (Santan Freeway).

In addition to the ground-mounted signs along exit ramps, the current project includes dozens of large wrong way signs installed on bridges or sign structures on the Valley freeway system. These noticeable signs, measuring 5 feet by 8 feet, are above the left lanes of freeways where wrong-way drivers tend to travel.

ADOT first installed 26 of these larger signs above the left lanes of I-17 in Phoenix in 2017 in association with the first-in-the-nation thermal-camera wrong-way vehicle alert system being evaluated by the state.

The wrong way signage project in the Phoenix area, paid for with federal highway safety funds, also has added more of the white pavement arrows pointing in the correct direction of travel along many of the freeway exit ramps where the new wrong way sign upgrades have been made.

# ADOT Construction Academy creates fast track to careers

New two-week format gets participants ready for highway construction jobs



PHOENIX – A new full-time format for

the Arizona Department of Transportation's Construction Academy pre-apprenticeship training program readies participants for highway construction jobs in just two weeks.

The first cohort in the Highway Construction-Jump Start program graduated in October after hands-on instruction in Camp Verde. At no cost to them, seven participants received training and certifications needed to compete for entry-level jobs on construction projects.

Another cohort is currently receiving training in Phoenix, with graduation scheduled for Friday, Nov. 8.

ADOT created its Construction Academy programs to remove barriers to careers in highway construction for women, minorities, veterans and members of economically disadvantaged groups, including those who are out of work.

The agency also offers the Construction Academy in a 16-week format, with participants receiving three hours of instruction three nights a week toward starting careers as masons on construction projects. The next 16-week programs are planned this coming spring in Phoenix and Prescott next summer.

With funding from the Federal Highway Administration, ADOT offers both programs through its On-The-Job-Training Supportive Services Program, part of the agency's Business Engagement and Compliance Office.

"The new Jump Start program gives those who can participate full-time a fast track to careers in one of the best industries in Arizona," said Steve Navis, manager of ADOT's On-The-Job-Training Supportive Services Program. "Whether you can commit a full two weeks or a few nights a week over a longer period, we're tailoring these high-quality adult education programs to you."

Participants in the two-week program receive certification to work as flaggers on highway projects, commercial driver license permits needed to drive commercial trucks and Occupational Safety and Health Administration 10-hour safety training certification covering general safety and health hazards for entry-level construction workers.

They also receive training in construction math, reading construction plans, work-readiness and resume-building.

Many of these trainees will move on to construction apprenticeships and later reach journeyman status, with ADOT providing continuing support and guidance.

Future two-week programs are scheduled in Tucson (Feb. 3-14), Phoenix (March 2-13), Nogales (March 30-April 10), Globe (May 4-15) and Show Low (June 1-12).

In both programs, ADOT covers training costs and fees for participants and provides support finding employment as well as job-readiness training. Those with 100 percent attendance receive free gear including hand tools, tool belts and hard hats.

If you see Arizona Department of Transportation employees at Sky Harbor Airport in Phoenix beginning this holiday travel season, don't be surprised. They're raising awareness about the AZ Travel ID.

The AZ Travel ID is the driver license or ID card that meets the new federal ID requirements that the U.S. Transportation and Security Administration will impose at all airport security checkpoints beginning October 1, 2020.

During peak travel times, ADOT representatives are stationed at strategic locations in Terminal 4 to answer basic questions and to

provide hand flyers that explain what the AZ Travel ID is and how to get one. The flyers outline the documents needed and encourage people to start the application process at aztravelid.com.

"Getting this vital information into the hands of flyers is crucial as the October, 2020



deadline approaches, and that's why MVD is making this added commitment to raising awareness," said MVD Stakeholder Relations Manager Jennifer Bowser-Richards.

She added, "The AZ Travel ID is easy to get, costs less than obtaining a Passport and is the most convenient solution for getting through airport security and not taking the risk of missing your flight when the new ID rules go into place."

# ADOR Seeking Unclaimed Property Owners Who Served in U.S. Military in Arizona

The Arizona Department of Revenue's (ADOR) Unclaimed Property program is looking for members of the U.S. military who have unclaimed funds in their names from when they were based in Arizona.

The agency has identified more than 8,800 military personnel with last known Arizona addresses from Luke Air Force Base, Tucson's Davis-Monthan Air Force Base, Fort Huachuca Army Base, Yuma Proving Ground Army Base, Camp Navajo Army Base and Marine Corps Air Station (MCAS) Yuma.

These properties, some dating back over 30 years, total \$2.3 million with the largest property due to a single owner being \$86,034.

The agency is currently sending notices to the military member's last known Arizona base or most current address with the hope the property owner or family member will contact ADOR Unclaimed Property.

Unclaimed property generally consists of money due to an individual from sources like old bank accounts, uncashed payroll checks, tax refunds, credit balances, rebates, returned deposits and dormant safe deposit boxes. Often property becomes unclaimed because the company that holds the funds has an outdated or the wrong forwarding address for its customer and in some cases, a person passes away with no family members aware of the assets. Most accounts are turned over to the state after several years of inactivity.

ADOR returns the property to owners who provide documentation showing their right to claim the assets. Claimants must include with their claim form a valid photo ID, such as a driver's license or other applicable identification, and documentation linking them to the owner's last known address. Claimants must also provide documentation demonstrating a legal right to claim any property listed in another name.

Every year, the ADOR Unclaimed Property program returns millions of dollars to claimants, including \$48.4 million in 2018-2019 and ranging from \$1 to \$586,000. In the past three fiscal years, about \$170 million has been returned to individuals and businesses.





#### **BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS**

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

If you are in imminent danger and unable to talk to a 9-1-1 operator, you now have the ability to text to 9-1-1. The service goes live following months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community.

- What is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- What happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- When did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- Was anyone hurt?
- Weapons are there weapons involved?
- What manner did they leave or arrive foot, vehicle, bicvcle...?
- Who did it? -Suspect description
- Where did the suspect go? What direction
- What did the suspect obtain? type and amount
- Who is calling? Give your name location and phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)
