I would like to thank the community for re-electing me for another term on the City Commission. It has been an honor and privilege to serve the people of Garnett and I will continue to do so as best I can.

One task the Commission is currently working on is the search for a new city manager. The community surveys are in and our work is now to begin in this process of selecting the best candidate for our City.

Another responsibility as Commissioner is to analyze the budget. This is something I have always thought was our most important job that affects everyone in Garnett. One of the biggest factors is the mill levy that is set on your property taxes. Although this year (2017) the mill levy increased slightly (+.359), the 10-year record of our mill levy is .870 lower in 2017 than it was in 2007!

## From The City Clerk/Finance Director

Work continues on the software conversion at City Hall for our general ledger, payroll, municipal court, utilities and cemetery. General ledger and payroll went live in January 2016, and the court conversion was completed in May 2016. The utility software went live on November 28, 2016. Our cemetery modality has an anticipated go-live date sometime in January.

Utility customers will notice that the new utility bills will have a different appearance beginning with the January bills. Utility bills will now print on white cardstock with blue lettering. When customers bring bills in for payment, please bring the whole bill in if you would like us to validate your receipt. The cardstock CANNOT be torn apart in order for staff to validate a receipt. Utility bills will have a bar code that will enable staff to scan the bill directly into the software system for payment posting. This will not only help our payment processing be more efficient, but will also help eliminate errors.

Our new system will allow us to grow in the future, as well as have more flexibility than what we have had in our old system. As with any changes in software systems, there is a tremendous amount of new procedures for our staff to learn. Staff is doing an excellent job of working through those challenges. We continue to strive to offer the best customer service possible and we appreciate the patience that our customers have shown us during this time of transition.

### An Important Message from the Garnett Water Department

Our water distribution system violated drinking water standards. Even though this is not an emergency, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened.

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a regular basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not our drinking water meets health standards. During June 1 through September 30, 2016 we did not take the required number of 20 samples to monitor for lead and copper. The Kansas Department of Health & Environment requires this sampling to be done every three years. The last time 20 acceptable samples were submitted was during the period of June 1 to September 30, 2013.

As soon as city crews noticed that the sample bottles had not been submitted in a timely manner to the Kansas Department of Health, a phone call was made to the Department of Health to see if the samples could still be submitted. Their reply was no. An alternative schedule of June 1 to September 30, 2017 has been set for water department personnel to sample again. The State will then send us the results and schedule our sampling schedule.

The table below is a recent history of our monitoring for lead and copper. It shows how often we are supposed to sample, the date that we last sampled, the date we failed to sample, how many samples we are supposed to take, how many samples we took, when samples should have been taken and the date samples are next scheduled to be taken.

Lead can cause delays in physical or mental development in infants and children; children could show slight deficits in attention span and learning abilities. In adults, lead can cause kidney problems and high blood pressure. Copper can cause gastrointestinal distress and liver or kidney damage. People with Wilson's Disease should consult their personal doctor if the amount of copper in their water exceeds the action level.

A new feature to Code**RED** is the availability of receiving text messages via your cell phone. Code**RED** is an emergency notification system and allows Anderson County Emergency Management to alert you in the event of an emergency situation, such as severe weather, evacuation notices, bio-terrorism, boil water notices and missing child reports.

The Garnett Fire Department held a drawing for children back in October in which the prize would be the opportunity to take a ride in a fire truck. # **Don't Forget to License Your Pet**

Owners of dogs and cats within the city of Garnett are required to purchase pet licenses annually at city hall. Between the first of January and the end of February, the city will collect a registration fee of \$7.50 for sexually altered or neutered dogs and cats, and \$20 for any dog or



cat that is not sexually altered or neutered.

As of March 1, 2017, the fees will double to \$15 and \$40 respectively. Replacement tag fee for lost tags are \$5.

Certificate of current rabies vaccination provided to you by your veterinarian is required at time of city pet license purchase.

Thereafter, by ordinance a notification will be sent to a pet owner 30 days in advance of the expiration of their pet's rabies vaccination. Owners will be required to provide the new rabies vaccination information to the city within 30 days of notification. Failure to comply will result in the pet license being revoked and a fine issued. So don't forget to license your pet!



# **Exposing a Silent Killer - Carbon Monoxide**

Winter is the time of year when the City of Garnett Gas Department wishes to remind all city residents to be aware of the dangers of carbon monoxide poisoning.

Potential carbon monoxide sources in the home include:

- Unvented space heater.
- Gas or wood burning fireplace.
- Improperly maintained or faulty oven, range or cook top vent.
- Operating barbecue grill in enclosed area such as the garage.
- Leaking, cracked, corroded or disconnected flue or vent pipes.
- Plugged or cracked heat exchangers.
- Improperly installed or faulty furnace, water heater or gas clothes dryer.

Carbon monoxide (CO) is a colorless, tasteless and odorless gas that is very toxic. If enough CO is inhaled it can cause death. Some of the first signs of CO poisoning are flu-like symptoms, headache, dizziness, weakness and nausea.

Have a professional regularly check the furnace and venting system in your home. Also, consider purchasing carbon monoxide detectors. It could save your life.

Prevent carbon monoxide poisoning by following a few safety tips:

- Don't try to heat your kitchen or home by leaving the stove on or oven door open.
- Never burn charcoal indoors.
- If you have an attached garage, pull the car all the way out when warming it up. Leaving the garage door open is not enough.
- Have a professional regularly check combustion appliances.
- Contact Garnett City Hall, (785) 448-5496, or the Law Enforcement Dispatch Center, (785) 448-6823, if you have concerns about carbon monoxide or if you smell natural gas inside or outside your home.
