Americanism October 2024



Historian Report October 2024 By Lynda Griffin – AZ Department Historian

I attended the 103rd ALA National Convention this year in New Orleans and I wanted to share a little History about the ALA and New Orleans Louisiana. President Lisa Williamson lead us into the 103rd ALA National Convention let us remember Burdick's words and renew the vow to the Colors and to everything for which they stand. Let us come together and work as one to accomplish our goals. It's the least we can do. This year, the conventions was held in New Orleans. It is the sixth time the Legion Family has congregated in the Big Easy for these events. The first was in 1922. It was the second convention for the Auxiliary, and the scars of the Great War were still present, still very real, and very different from any previous war. The government wasn't prepared for the servicemembers' quick return, and medical officials had never seen the types of injuries incurred previously. And — as in any war — loved ones were left behind by those who died. In other words, there was no support system.

The minutes from the 1922 meetings held in New Orleans provide a clearer picture of the conditions facing the Auxiliary created by the Great War and the work not only accomplished thus far, but required in the coming years. It was massive. And our response was impressive. However, there were still numerous concerns, which were different in each state. Bringing the units and departments to best meet the conditions together was imperative. And in those many pages of transcribed minutes, there appears such a moment when those crucial words were spoken by a woman who understood the meaning of *Service Not Self*.

She served with the Salvation Army a good part of her life, and, with her husband, stayed very close to the front lines in France during World War I, making doughnuts, pies, and coffee, offering words of wisdom and comfort, along with prayer to those who wanted them. After the war, she gifted her experience, knowledge, and talents to the Auxiliary, becoming our first national chaplain, serving three consecutive years. Her name was Samantha Minerva "Ma" Burdick.

It was the morning of the convention's second day when the Colors were presented, a gift from the 1922 National Executive Committee. And with these words, National Chaplain Burdick presented them: *Madam President: This is one of the greatest privileges I have ever had, to present to you and these ladies, these flags. I feel more than I can say this morning. I stand beside Old Glory, which is really Old Glory, the beautiful flag of our country that our boys fought for, and I feel we can hardly give it honor enough. Then I stand here with our old organization banner which stands for so much. It stands for our boys who did not come back; it stands for our boys who are here; it stands for we mothers, wives, sisters and sweethearts.*

And I am quite sure that every one of us will pledge ourselves this morning to God to stand by these two flags.

I esteem it a great privilege, Madam President, to present your organization with these banners, and I feel we cannot say enough in honor of them, and the care that we shall give them, and the manner in which we shall work under the two flags, as long as God lendeth us breath. I feel that I cannot express myself this morning. This is very, very close to me because I have loved your boys and I love them yet.

Honor them. Care for them. Work under them. Inspiring words that may necessitate a re-examination as to how we look upon the Colors, as it's too easy to take things for granted when exposure to those things is frequent.

I only had two members in the whole state answer all the eight questions correctly. Department President Patricia Lugo was the winner. I will see you at Fall Conference with your gift.

Set up your agenda; on your night, set up your room to include a voter registration table and Legion Family membership, programs, and information. With some upfront planning, your Candidates Night will be a great success. Your Meet the Candidates Night will support the Legion's "Get Out the Vote," which began in 1920 with the American Legion requesting all Legionnaires to exercise their right to vote and encourage others to vote. Let us, The American Legion Family, renew our commitment to continue to be politically active individuals – be Informed and participate in our government, which leads to our mission of supporting our veterans

National Legislative 1st Quarterly Zoom Meeting

The Legislative National Committee met with the Department Chairs and guests, which included our National Vice President, Ray Ward, on September 24, 2024The Legislative National Committee met with the Department Chairs and guests, which included our National Vice President, Ray Ward, on September 24, 2024. The main topics for this meeting included Auxiliary supporting the Legion's Legislative Agenda and Get Out the Vote as early voting has already begun. Divisional breakout sessions focused on the following:

- How can we encourage and train members to use the Grassroots Action Center to engage more with their legislative representatives?
- Discuss how the ALA Legislative Department Chairs are working with TAL Legislative Department Chair to share the legislative agenda for their state.
- Joining ALA Legislative Facebook Page
- Submit pictures and events to the division chairman and national chairman as they happen instead of at year-end reporting, which will allow for a jump on year-end reporting.

National Legislative Chair Sallie Rossman spoke on the American Legion Auxiliary supporting The American Legion's Legislative Agenda. The National Chair stated that the American Legion Auxiliary is a group of citizens whose involvement in the Legislative program provides information and assistance to American Legion Auxiliary members to advocate for the Legion's legislative agenda. Awareness of The American Legion's priorities and call-to-action alerts prepares the Auxiliary to communicate with representatives on the impending legislature. Using knowledge to persuade elected officials to achieve The American Legion's priorities is often the process of changing or reforming attitudes toward the needed legislature.

The Call to Action is for the Auxiliary to advocate for The American Legion Legislative Agenda at all levels of our government. It includes being knowledgeable of TAL legislative priorities, responding to the Legislative Action Alerts, contacting representatives at all levels of the government, and hosting Meet the Candidates Nights. Members have the tools available on The American Legion Legislative, and the American Legion Auxiliary website will allow members to achieve the mission of our Legislative program, which is to "provide information and assistance to members to advocate for The American Legion agenda."

National Legislative Vice Chair Amy Luft provided information on the "Get Out the Vote" giving information on TAL initiative to increase voter turnout in elections. The "Get Out the Vote" program includes ideas on how to work the program effectively. Members can conduct voter registration and nonpartisan "Get Out the Vote" campaigns, host or participate in a nonpartisan candidate forum, promote the importance of voting at your local schools, and provide transportation to voting polls for members/community and/or help with childcare. What members cannot do includes endorse or oppose a candidate for public office, make contributions (money, time, or facilities) to a candidate, volunteers working on an American Legion family-sponsored registration and voting drive should not wear campaign buttons or make their personal views about candidates known in any way, and not invite candidates to speak at or during an official meeting of The American Legion Family. As stated by TAL, "Get Out the Vote activities in an American Legion post must be nonpartisan, which simply means the American Legion Family cannot show or state a preference for or against any particular candidate or a particular political party."

Western Division- Joan Cannon, National Division Chair

They discussed how to provide Legislative Program information to district chairs in a format shareable with unit members. One suggestion was making a flow chart to show the steps to get to the grassroots action center. Most importantly, department legislative chairs must pass the information on to their unit counterparts. Discussing the importance of contacting the TAL Legislative Department Chair and introducing this will enable our department legislative chairs to create a relationship with their TAL counterpart. Joining ALA Legislative Facebook Page – All western division department chairs joined the national legislative Facebook page, and district chairs and all members will be encouraged to participate by providing information on joining. Requested departments send pictures and event information as it happens or monthly. Doing so will support their department's end-of-year reporting and Western Division and National Chairmen's year-end reporting.

Central Division- Cynthia Boehnlein, National Division Chair

The Central Division is off to a great start. The division chair shared two tips with the chairs to help make their programs successful. One is, if they always have a 118thCongress trifold with them, there is a QR code printed on it that will take a member or advocate directly to the Grassroots Action Center to sign up and begin sending messages. The second is to ensure the member checks the box to sign up for text alerts for special alerts from the Legion. In doing this, the member can send the messages directly from their text messages and not have to search their email accounts for Action Alerts. We found it advisable to review our profiles to ensure we have all checked the box, as this is a newer feature of the Grassroots Center. Illinois—Reports posting action alerts and Legion priorities on the department's Facebook page and sending out flyers with the Legion agenda. Indiana-Department Chair shared the TAL Legislative Guide with members. The department chair is scheduling a Zoom meeting with the District Chairman, and they will try Quarterly meetings. Iowa -Members discussed the Legion's legislative agenda at their annual leadership meeting in August. Kansas—Some members march on Capitol Hill with their jobs and can connect with their legislators. **Michigan**—Chair met with the Legion counterpart and discussed the upcoming election and candidates' meet-and-greets in the state. **Missouri**—Encouraging signing up for alerts in the "Legionette," discussed in a virtual meeting, and providing the link to the TAL legislative website. Rallies will be held in January and April before the sessions shut down. Ohio - Using the PowerPoint provided by the national chair at the Department School of Instructions. The department chair also met with Ohio State Senator Jerry Cirino from District 18 to discuss veterans' issues at the Statehouse on the radio show "They Sacrificed for Us." The State of Ohio has also held its first Veteran Suicide Awareness Day statewide on September 22. West Virginia -Holding a training session where she challenged each member to send ten messages before the morning coffee. Their high schools organized a conference call with their two senators to voice their opinions. Wisconsin—The Department's PEP was rewritten to mirror the National PEP. Weekly notifications from Grassroots were forwarded to members, and step-by-step instructions on how to sign into the Grassroots Action Center were shared with members. She reports that several articles have been written for the Department paper.

Southern Division- Pearl Sanders-Mills, Division Chair

The Southern Division discussed Getting Out the Vote. Ideas included conducting a voter registration drive in your community and providing transportation to the polls on voting day. We discussed the Grassroots Action Center and ensured all members could locate their representatives' contact information. We will encourage members to join the national Facebook page. Some states will work with voter registration. We talked about working with the Legislative Legion Chair.


Northwestern Division- DeLora Kautzmann, Division Chair

Information on voting and legislation supported by the Legion was disseminated to members of their departments. South Dakota has participated in joint legislative activities with the Legion. There was discussion on getting young voters by posting Get Out the Vote, voting location, and absentee voting information posters at universities and colleges.

Eastern Division- Lisa Boyer, Division Chair

Connecticut--Starting a Campaign: Put some *PEP in your Step: P* - Phone Calls, E – Emails, P - Personal Contact. Maryland- held their chairman's meeting, noting that half of the units have Legislative Chairs and making sure that each one is on the Action Committee, knows how to get the Grassroots Newsletter, and has signed up to send emails. Massachusetts-Department Chair Ann Gobi, the past state legislator, suggested holding a Zoom meeting inviting the Congress people and US Senators with the folks in the department so people can meet face to face in a relaxed atmosphere after the election. New Jersey-The goal this year is to make everything easy: attention grabber flyers and quick information- and this seems to be getting a good response. Request a blurb for the "Get Out the Vote" to be consistent when posting.

The quarterly Legislative Program zooms are on January 28, 2025, and April 1, 2025, at 8:00 PM Eastern.



How can you get involved with Get Out The Vote:

- 1. **Verify you are registered to vote**. Even if you believe you are registered to vote in your state, it is essential to verify your registration status. Visit https://www.vote411.org/check-registration to check your voter registration status.
- Register to vote. Check voter registration deadlines for your state and register to vote at https://www.vote411.org/select-state. The website will provide information on voter registration deadlines, the last day to request an absentee ballot, when and where early voting opens, identification requirements to vote, and more.
- 3. Educate yourself on what is on the ballot. Registering to vote is not enough; we must know what is on our ballots and what is at stake for our community. Visit https://www.vote411.org/ballot to find sample ballots and the candidates up for election in your area. Research further into each candidate to see their campaign websites and interviews they have done. Check if each candidate has forums and other events near you.
- 4. **Spread the word.** Share the above links with your friends, families, and community members to ensure they are registered to vote. Use the hashtag #GetOutTheVote on social media to share your stories and encourage others to vote.

therapy dog criteria.

Department of Arizona VA&R Western Division Progress Report Marge Christianson, Chairman October 1, 2024

The Department of Arizona held 3 Veteran Creative Arts Festivals (at each VAMC in Arizona).

The Phoenix VA brought in professional artists to judge the works while veterans and their guests enjoyed art and snacks. People's Choice voting was a hit and the VAMC Director came to the award presentation. As a co-sponsoring organization, it was an honor to address all the attendees, thank them and inform them about the ALA's contribution.

The Tucson VCAF had a "Wine Tasting" theme (really grape juice) that added an air of elegance to the works. Veterans, guests, staff and volunteers enjoyed the charcuterie plate & "wine" while viewing the art. New this year were display boards, donated by the Auxiliary, for the Creative Writing submission which gave them far more visibility that just lying on tables. The winning art was then put on display at the Tucson Mall so the public could view it!

The Prescott VCAF was held for 3 days at the Yavapai County Fair for the second year. This enabled far more "pedestrian" traffic than previous years. A beautiful "palette-designed" cake was served during the award presentation.

Work is underway for three Gift Shops.

The Phoenix VAMC is under construction so Post 1, the nearest to the hospital, will host the event. Work is being done to provide transportation between the hospital and the Post as well as widely promoting the event in local businesses.

The Tucson VAMC, due in large part to our VAVS Rep, has approved a traditional gift shop at the VAMC. This event will include the veterans in the hospital as well as assist the homeless veteran group on the last day of the shop.

The Prescott VAMC is assisting with gift selection for those in the Community Living Center. Volunteers, including the entire Legion Family, will then go room to room with treats, gifts and good cheer. Following that there will be a "assembly line" gift selection for those in the Domiciliary, along with food and entertainment.

Work is underway to receive "Wish Lists" from the 4 State Homes in Arizona. Past Department President Barbara White selected the State Homes as her special project two years ago, so funds are now available! Five therapeutic recliners will be delivered next week to the Phoenix State Home! Unfortunately, personnel changeover and limited resources at the State Homes are making this effort a bit of a challenge. In the meantime, birthday cards, birthday parties and the opening of the new Flagstaff Home are occurring.

Wreaths Across America is being promoted via the Department website and the popular Department Ring Your Bell Facebook page (which has 1,200 members).

As always, Units in Arizona have been busy supporting our veterans. Unit 107 held a "bachelor auction" to raise funds to the Phoenix VAMC. Unit 16 is gathering warm clothing for veterans for the upcoming cold weather in southern Arizona. Auxiliary Units are supporting events like Stand downs and seminars in and out of their Post Homes. Junior members are distributing poppies and helping at fundraising pancake breakfasts.


