Venerable József Cardinal Mindszenty

József Mindszenty was a Hungarian cardinal of the Catholic Church who served as Archbishop of Esztergom and leader of the Catholic Church in Hungary from 1945 to 1973. For 5 decades, with great faith and courage, Cardinal Mindszenty fought at considerable personal cost for religious freedom in Hungary and was strongly opposed to both fascism and communism in his country.

József Mindszenty was born on March 29, 1892, the son of Janos Pehm and Borbala (Kovacs) Pehm, a farming family in Csehimindszent in western Hungary. Ordained a priest in 1915 and consecrated Bishop of Veszprem in 1944, his strange odyssey began.

During the Second World War, the Church of Hungary's "Prince-Primate" was quickly imprisoned by the Nazis. Undaunted, Pope Pius XII appointed him Archbishop and Primate of Hungary, and, on February 21, 1946, elevated him to Cardinal. Pope Pius XII

reportedly told him, "Among these 32, you will be the first to suffer the martyrdom symbolized by this red color."

On December 26, 1948, Cardinal Mindszenty was arrested by the communists and accused of treason, conspiracy, and other offences against the new Hungarian People's Republic. Shortly before his arrest, he wrote a note to the effect that he had not been involved in any conspiracy, and that any confession he might make would be the result of duress. While imprisoned, Mindszenty was repeatedly hit with rubber truncheons and subjected to other forms of abuse until he agreed to confess.

In 1949, at a "show trial," that generated worldwide condemnation, including a United Nations resolution, he received a life sentence for his opposition to Marxist rule and persecution. After eight years in prison, the Hungarian Revolt freed him in 1956, but Soviet tanks crushed the uprising and re-imposed Communist rule.

Cardinal Mindszenty sought refuge at the United States Embassy in Budapest where he was granted asylum. He spent the next 15 years in relative seclusion within a book-lined room and the embassy garden. During those years in which he was holed up in the embassy, an arrangement which was opposed by some in diplomatic circles, he never let up campaigning for freedom in number of letters and messages, sent through diplomatic channels, to four United States Presidents and their Secretaries of State. The messages, documented in a book called *Do Not Forget This Small Honest Nation,* contained political advice on how to defend Hungary and Eastern Europe from Soviet Bolshevism.

A letter arrived from President Richard M. Nixon suggesting that his continued presence wasn't in Washington's best interest. A brokered asylum agreement was worked out between Rome and Budapest, and, in 1971, Cardinal Mindszenty settled in Vienna, Austria. In December 1973, at the age of 81, Mindszenty was stripped of his titles by the Pope, who declared the Archdiocese of Esztergom officially vacated, but who refused to fill the seat while Mindszenty was still alive. Pope Paul VI had such regard for Mindszenty that he left him in office until he was 81, even though he'd already decreed that all bishops were to tender their resignations to Rome on their 75th birthdays.

Cardinal Mindszenty passed away in Vienna, Austria, on May 6, 1975, at the age of 83 and was given temporary burial in St. Laszlo Chapel located in Grace Church at Mariazell, Austria. In his last will and testament, he expressed the wish that he be returned to his native Hungary when "the red star of faithless Moscow" had fallen. The political climate in Hungary changed, and he was cleared by the new rulers paving the road home 16 years after his death. His remains were met at the city of Esztergom, and his body was transferred to a horse-drawn carriage which was followed by 50,000 marchers to the 19th-Century Church of the Assumption located on the Danube River. After an outdoor Mass attended by thousands, the odyssey of the Cardinal had come to an end, and he was reburied in the crypt in the Basilica.

The cause for the cardinal's beatification opened on June 15, 1993. Mindszenty was titled as a Servant of God after the Congregation for the Causes of Saints consented. Documentation pertaining to his cause for beatification was sent to Rome in 1996. On February 12, 2019, Pope Francis authorized the promulgation of a decree declaring that Hungarian Cardinal József Mindszenty possessed heroic virtue. He's now known as "Venerable," the first major step towards beatification.
