

#### Ten Important Dogmas of the Lutheran Church By Bo Kristian Holm, Associate Professor, Systematic Theology, Aarhus University



#### 1. Creation

The world was created by God and the world was created good. The belief in creation originates from the creation stories in Genesis, the first book in the Bible. In the Apostles' Creed we declare that we believe in God as the "Creator of heaven and earth" and in the Nicene Creed we proclaim our belief in the "Maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen". See also Article I of the Augsburg Confession.

#### Augsburg Confession: [Article I. Concerning God]

"In the first place, it is with one accord taught and held, following the decree of the Council of Nicea, that there is one divine essence which is named God and truly is God. But there are three persons in the same one essence, equally powerful, equally eternal: God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. All three are one divine essence, eternal, undivided, unending, of immeasurable power, wisdom, and goodness, the creator and preserver of all visible and invisible things. What is understood by the word "person" is not a part nor a quality in another but that which exists by itself, as the Fathers once used the word concerning this issue..."

a Christian steward? As you think about this for a moment, you will begin to realize that, by your own efforts, you will never come close to being a "10". On God's grading scale, we all rate a zero without him. Fortunately, God knows that we are not perfect. Since the fall of Adam, God has used ordinary sinful people to do the extraordinary.

In spite of our imperfections and frailties, God wants to use us as his hands and feet to feed the hungry, house the homeless, build his Church, and seek the lost with his Gospel. God has made us his stewards, and he equips us for the task. The Apostle Paul wrote, "And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work" (2 Corinthians 9:8).

God doesn't expect us to be perfect stewards, but he expects us to have attitudes that desire to praise and serve him. Jesus didn't say, "Blessed are those who achieve their potential and never make a mistake," nor did Jesus say, "Well done, good and successful servant." What Jesus did say was, "Blessed are the poor in spirit . . . those who mourn . . . the meek" (Matthew 5:3-5). He also said, "Well done, good and faithful servant" (Matthew 25:23). In our humanity, it is easy for us to make a mess of things, but we please the Lord when we, through faith, willingly use our time, talents, and treasures to help others and his Church.

The good news for us is that, in Christ, our "0" becomes a "10".

### **Opportunity Knocks**

The apostle Paul, like us, had things he wanted to do and people he wanted to see. He told the Corinthians that he wanted to come to visit them but that he would have to stay awhile in Ephesus, "because a great door for effective work [had] opened to [him] (1 Corinthians 16:9). As a true disciple of Christ, Paul knew about self-sacrifice. He had suffered much for the sake of the Gospel, and even now, instead of pleasing himself, he was not going to let this opportunity for ministry pass by.

These few words offer much food for thought. Perhaps you've worked long and hard and have been driving around, casting your eyes on new luxury homes. The budget would be tight. Sure wouldn't leave room for extra gifts and offerings beyond the tithe. What do you do? Is this the time for you, like Paul, to put your own desires aside in order to be able to give donations to missionaries, to your church colleges, and to the ministry of your own church? Everywhere you look, can't you see that "a great door for effective work has opened..."?



## Seek Contentment

Many people spend years seeking contentment not realizing that contentment is a state of mind independent of external circumstances. True contentment comes from knowing that God is in control and that he will provide for you.

As a child of God, you are no doubt aware that our society is trying hard to make you discontented. Advertisements suggest you can't be content without an expensive house, a new car, an exotic vacation, big investments, and the latest in clothes. Society tries to make you believe that happiness and contentment are within your reach if you just acquire a few more things.

Contentment does not consist of the size of income or net worth. It has nothing to do with the size of your house or year of your car. Contentment can't be bought at a department store or travel agency. Real contentment is not related to circumstances or things.

For some, acquiring money can become a preoccupation and an obsession. It's possible to become a slave to wealth. Greed will not allow contentment, because it will always urge you to acquire more. No matter how you try, you cannot be satisfied by worldly things. The love of money can potentially possess a person's life like no other emotion can. Jesus spoke to the issue of greed in Matthew 16:26 when he asked, "What good will it be for a man if he gains the whole world, yet forfeits his soul?" The things you possess will only contribute to fleeting happiness, not an enduring peace and contentment. "But man, despite his riches, does not endure; he is like the beasts that perish" (Psalm 49:12).

With money as your security, pride, self-centeredness, and self-sufficiency take over and replace your trust in God to provide. You can be like the Rich Fool, who gave himself credit for his success and desired even more. You can push God out of your life.

When God is your security, you can be content. The Apostle Paul knew both the secret of contentment and how to receive it. "I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances. I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty" (Philippians 4:11-12). Without Christ, you will never achieve contentment, but a relationship with Christ will redirect your focus from transient earthly pleasures to things of eternal significance. Keeping your eyes on "the prize" (Philippians 3:14) will bring about gratitude in your heart for what you have rather than desiring what you don't have. May the words of the psalmist be an expression of your heart: "Whom have I in heaven but you? And earth has nothing I desire besides you. My flesh and my heart may fail, but God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever" (Psalm 73:25-26).
