<u>The Cascade Water Garden</u> 2 Fairview Road, Crafers Saturday 06 to Sunday 07 February 2021

The Cascade Water Garden is a pond and aquatic habitat constructed on the slope of a hillside using many tons of artfully placed Carey Gully stone. Crystal clear water spills over the huge rocks and cascades into a large pool which is home to aquatic plants, invertebrates, fish and frogs. The water is aerated by the movement and filtered by the plants and reeds which naturally remove impurities - without adding chemicals, the result is a water quality clean enough to swim in!

A WORD FROM THE TREASURER

The year of 2020 has been particularly hard for all concerned, especially for social gatherings and Club meetings.

However, as with all organisations, the Strathalbyn Garden Club still has to pay for all of its running costs and overheads such as public liability insurance, club affiliation fees, club website, publishing the newsletter, etc.

These expenses are paid from the Club funds which rely on income support from membership subscriptions and fund-raising activities.

Membership subscriptions are vital for the smooth running of the Club and are therefore required to be paid on time at every AGM held at the end of June each year.

The Club Constitution and Rules state "Any member whose subscription is outstanding for more than 90 days after the due date of 1st July each year shall cease to be a member of the Club......".

Generally, this rule is greatly relaxed to give late-paying members up to 180 days (6 months) to pay their arrears.

After this very lengthy period, a re-joining fee of \$10 is necessary, together with the membership subscription of \$10.

KANGAROO ISLAND & TREES FOR LIFE

A delivery of 20 boxes of seed kits was handed out to 15 growers in mid November and we can report that most of us are seeing quite a bit of activity. This time we are growing three types of eucalypts, six varieties of acacia plus leptospermum and melaleuca.

It is a source of wonder that the tiny dust like seeds of the Eucalyptus camaldulensis (River Red Gum) grow breathtakingly fast into mighty trees.

Our September seedlings are coming along slowly.

PARKER AVENUE COMMUNITY GARDEN

A Garden is Always a Work In Progress.

Out in the garden the vegetables are growing well with pumpkins, cucumbers and zucchini in full production. Handfuls of beans are being harvested and the tomatoes are about to ripen. The capsicum and eggplant are flowering but fruit set usually starts as the days get shorter. The potatoes planted in the hay bales are growing well.

The fruit trees are also producing although being new the harvest will not be plentiful this year. Work has begun on installing the espalier trellising for each tree and during winter the trees will be pruned to suit and tied to the wires.

The plans for the large semi-permanent pergola, for which we received a grant, are with the Alexandrina Council and it is hoped that they will be approved before the end of January.

Once we have the pergola in place our plans include hosting harvest lunches where we will prepare and share the garden produce.

We will also spend more time under the shade preparing cuttings and sowing seeds for the plant sales corner and doing some garden arts and crafts so watch for details.

The grant also covered the cost of two smaller pergolas which have been purchased. One will be used to create

shelter over the plant sales corner.

If you are interested in participating in the Parker Avenue Community Garden, working bees are held every Wednesday morning 9am – noon and 1st and 3rd Saturday mornings 9am to noon.

Funds raised from plant sales are put back into the garden but donations of well grown cuttings, saved seeds, small hand tools and secateurs and cane garden stakes would help stretch the money.

In return, the garden always has a good supply of empty pots in all sizes which gardeners are welcome to take.

Once the large gazebo is installed the irrigation can be laid to the central garden beds and more raised beds can be added.

Now that the garden is progressing we can consider developing a plant rescue space to rejuvenate and care for plants in preparation for finding them a new home.
