EDITOR'S NOTE: In the 1850 Census of Madison County there is a 5 year old boy named Isaac in the household of Elisha and Mary Barker.

Private **Jeremiah Barker** (b. 1827; d. 9/25/1903 buried in San Pedro Cemetery, Madison Co.) enlisted 1/11/62 at Monticello. He was paroled at Burkeville, VA in mid April 1865.

## Capt. John L. Inglis, Cotton Capitalist

A giant came to Madison and stayed. And Madison was the better for it.

What is the Capt. John L. Inglis story? Let us explore our history.

John Livingston Inglis arrived in Madison by at least 1879. He left Madison in 1902 and died in Jacksonville in 1917. But what of those twenty some years?

Capt. J. L. Inglis (1838-1917). Capt. Co. D., 3<sup>rd</sup> FL, C.S.A. was one of the most enterprising as well as indefatigable men in Florida. In 1889, he build the largest cotton ginning establishment in the world, in which fifty gins (expansion potential to 75) would be run. The centralization of the Coats Spool Cotton Company business under one roof, was a mammoth undertaking, and kept the Madison area cotton growers employed.

#### **Humble Origins**

The achievements of Capt. Inglis were considerable. It is no less a tribute to the splendid opportunities Madison County represented after the Reconstruction, for without its advantages even the indomitable will of the indefatigable Inglis would have found much rougher seas than he did in the accomplishment of an enterprise which was without equal in the South.

The Madison Recorder of July 5, 1889, reports: "Coming here, almost penniless, working as a mechanic, he was quick to see the good things in store for good judgment, soon he had an establishment of his own, which was reduced to ashes and he was left with but little more than with which he began. Twice did this happen but with a will that was stronger probably than the fates he began anew and today is at the head of one of the most magnificent establishments in the South, without which, we believe Madison would suffer considerably. We need more Inglises here, and the field is broad and the harvest white for such men as he."

Capt. Inglis married Louise Olive Thomas, the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. B. Thomas, who were pioneer settlers of Madison in 1869. *The Madison Enterprise Recorder* of October 6, 1916 reported that they had five children.

A Madison Enterprise Recorder of November 1, 1922 records that a Mr. A. C. Sasser went to work for Capt. Inglis in 1879, but that Inglis was even then in business operating a "pepper box saw mill and a few Sea island gins."

The story continued that "Three years later (1882) Mr. Inglis interested New York capital and organized a company known as the Madison Cotton Ginning Co. (M.C.G.Co.). Then they put in a cotton oil mill, threw out the old gins and put in new and better gins."

1889: From M.C.G.Co., to Florida Manufacturing Co.

In 1889, the old gin building was torn down, and a new one built which was the best equipped and the largest Sea island ginnery in the United States. The name was changed to the Florida Manufacturing Co, and they did a prosperous business for a number of years until the pesky weevil shut them down.

The September 6, 1889 *Recorder* estimates that over 500,000 bricks were used to erect a new cotton ginnery and machine shops. "The ginnery is one of the most substantially built houses in the state. Its foundations are over four feet in thickness and the walls are correspondingly strong. The sills are immense pieces of lumber, probably measuring 6 x 15 inches. These are covered by flooring  $4\frac{1}{2}$  thick, or rather by a double floor of that thickness. There is room for 75 gins in the building besides the presses necessary to pack the lint from them. In a tower at the front end of the building is a tank with a capacity for 16,000 gallons of water which is connected by pipes with all parts of the building. These are supplied by caps which melt at a low temperature, thereby greatly lessening the probable loss from fire at any time, or whether any person is at hand or not."


#### **Peanuts**

In 1918, the plant was sold to a new company, known as The American Products Corporation., and was turned into a peanut oil mill and operated as such for several years.

John Livingston Inglis (1838-1917) was born in Liverpool, England. His parents, the late Andrew Inglis and Sarah Livingston were Scotch and Capt. Inglis was proud of his lineage as a Scotsman. He came to Florida in 1860 and was engaged in business in New Port when hostilities between the States began. He entered the service of his country as 1<sup>st</sup> Lieutenant of the Wakulla Guards and in a few months was elected Captain. He commanded his company in a number of serious engagements and always so as to deserve the commendation of his superior officers. He was wounded several times. He was a faithful soldier throughout the Western campaign until captured at the battle of Nashville, Tenn. He was then a prisoner of war at Johnson's Island for five months. His memory was a rich storehouse of the stirring events of the 60's. He religiously preserved everything connected with the war and recently sent a number of interesting relics to the Confederate Museum, which enriched the Florida room to a wonderful degree. He was a useful and active member of the Robert E. Lee Camp U.C.V. in Jacksonville. He was a grand old man whose "courage knew no bounds and his heart no fear."

After the surrender, he came to Madison and built the cotton manufacturing plant, which did a large business. His wife was well known as Miss Louise Thomas. She preceded him to the better land seven months ago. Capt. Inglis has made Jacksonville his home for the past fifteen years and it was in the city that he died on the 3<sup>rd</sup>,

surrounded by his devoted children. He was both generous and liberal and was never appealed to in vain. He has been a great traveler, enjoyed life and was fond of yachting and the beautiful things of life attracted him. His comfortable home shows evidence of his fondness for the things of beauty. He was a man of keen intellect and a close student of public affairs. He had unbounded energy and was well known as a successful factor in business circles. He leaves four sons and one daughter. Loving hands brought Capt. Inglis back to his loved ones. His coffin was draped with the "Stars and Bars," and there were oceans of exquisite flowers that come from his many friends, showing evidences of love and Capt. Inglis' life was one of far reaching esteem. influence and his example will be an inspiration to those who come after him. "There is nae sorrow there, There is neither could nor care, The day is aye fair in the land O' the Leal"



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#### ANDREW ELKINS PATTERSON & LAVINIA SWIFT PATTERSON

This is the continuing story of my GG Grandfather, Andrew Elkins PATTERSON.

When Andrew's story ended in the last report, his beloved wife, Sarah, , had died in childbirth, and he was left with a large family of children to rear. I'm sure he had lots of help from the older children, and Sarah had a younger sister named Lavinia, , that soon became an important part of this family. It wasn't long before a love story was starting in Andrew's life.

Lavinia SWIFT, was also a daughter of Ira SWIFT. She was born on September 7, 1854 in Madison County, FL. Ira SWIFT reared a large family in Madison County, Florida. He was on HEADS OF HOUSEHOLD list in 1840, voted in the 1845 Statehood Election in 1845, CLIFTON (Precinct 5), and was elected Captain of Company A, 8th Regiment of Florida Militia, July 18, 1846. Ira was also one of the early members of the first Masonic Lodge in the county, which received its charter on January 16, 1845. On the 1850 Madison County census, Division 11, Ira is living only a few households away from John H. PATTERSON, Andrew's dad. He lists the following family on this census: Ira SWIFT, age 43, Sarah, age 32 (Sarah Elizabeth O'STEEN), Emiline, age 10, Adin L. (Ada), age 8, Sarah E. (my G. Grandmother), age 7, Ezilpha, age 5, John, age 3, Rebecca, age 2, Ira, age 1/12. Living with Ira in this census were Henry CHAMBLESS, age 21, Rebecca BAKER, age 80 and Jonathan VAUGHN, age 19. By the 1860 Madison County, Florida census, Lavinia is born, and Ira lists his family as follows: Ira SWIFT, age 52, Sarah, age 42, Ada L. age 18, Zelea (Ezilpha) R. age 15, John J., age 14, Rebecca, age 13, Ira, age 10, Charles, age 9, Lavinia, age 6, Isaac B., age 4, and Caroline A., age 1. Ira's place of birth is listed as New York. Between the 1860 and 1870 Madison County, Florida census record, Ira's first wife, Sarah, died and Ira married Martha KIRKLAND on September 21, 1864. Emiline SWIFT married E. S. PERT on March 28, 1860, and she is not listed with Ira and Sarah in the 1860 census. By 1870, there is one more son listed for Ira, Isaiah, age 8. The 1880 census for Madison County lists the following family for Ira and Martha: Ira SWIFT, age 73, Mary M., age 60, Isaiah, age 19, and Augusta (I think this is Caroline A), age 20. By the 1885 Madison County census, I found Ira SWIFT and Andrew E. PATTERSON living only one family away from each other. Ira is 77, and Mary is 65; living with them is Oscar **ASHLEY**, age 11, and he is listed as a boarder.

On February 13, 1876, Andrew and Lavinia were joined in Holy Matrimony in Madison County, Florida and lived a long life together. Lavinia inherited a large ready-made family, which included 5 of Andrew's children with his first wife, Sarah. There was Ira S., Mary R., Joshua J., Ada L. and Agnes B. all living at home, and by the 1880 census record, a new addition to the family had arrived; their first child to be born to them. It was a son, and they named him Russell A.

Russell A. PATTERSON was born on October 17, 1879 in Madison County, FL. In the 1880 census record for Madison County, FL, he is listed as Russell A. and as Andrew and Lavinia's son. Andrew lists his family in this census as follows: Andrew E. PATTERSON, age 40, Lavinia PATTERSON, age 25, Ira S. PATTERSON, age 17, Mary R. PATTERSON, age 14, Joshua J. PATTERSON, age 10, Ada L. PATTERSON, age 8, Agnes B. **PATTERSON**, age 5 and Russell A. **PATTERSON**, age 1. Andrew lists that he is a merchant and his son, Ira, lists that he is a clerk in a store.

Russell married Francis Ellen (Fannie), maiden name unknown, about 1904. By 1910, we find Russell and Fannie living in Panama, Duval County, FL. He has two children at this time. His census record is as follows: Russell A. PATTERSON, age 30, Fannie PATTERSON, age 28, Susie PATTERSON, age 4 and Ira PATTERSON, age 1. Russell lists his occupation as a clerk in a grocery store, and that he has been married for 6 years. By 1920, Russell has moved to Odessa in Pasco County, Florida. In between the 1910 and 1920 census records, I found a record for Russell in his World War I Draft Registration card. These cards are very helpful in genealogy research, and Russell's gives us some new information. On this card he lists his name as Russell Alexander PATTERSON, date of birth, October 17, 1878, his home address as Odessa, Pasco County, FL, that he is a store manager for Lyon Pine Company, and that his wife's name is Fannie Ellen PATTERSON. He says he claims an exemption from draft because he has a dislocated left knee. He is of medium height, stout, has brown eyes and black hair. Another interesting item on this card is that the registrar was his brother, C. L. B. PATTERSON. The date of this card was August 12, 1918. So you see these draft cards are a wealth of information for us genealogy detectives. I learned his middle name, his birth date, where he worked, his wife's name and also how he looked. That's great! In the 1920 census for that year, he lists his family as follows: Russell A. PATTERSON, age 40, Francis C. PATTERSON, age 38, Susie L. PATTERSON, age 14, Ira A. PATTERSON, age 10, Francis E. PATTERSON, age 6, and living with them as boarders, are Fred G. SUNDERS, age 29 and Otis L. SCHMIDTH, age 36. He lists his occupation as Manager in a General Store. By the 1930 census record, Russell is living in Daytona Beach, Volusia County, Florida. His family is as follows: Russell A. PATTERSON, age 51, Fanny E. PATTERSON, age 49, Susie L. PATTERSON, age 23, Ira A. PATTERSON, age 21 and Frances PATTERSON, age 16. Russell lists his occupation as a Commercial Salesman. Susie lists her occupation as a teacher, and Ira lists his occupation as a messenger for the Telegraph office. I couldn't find a death record for Russell, but in Ira PATTERSON's probate papers, dated February 3, 1945, he is listed as deceased. His wife is not listed in the papers as a widow, so I think she was dead by this time also. His children listed in this probate were Sue PATTERSON, of Daytona Beach, Florida, Frances PATTERSON MOFFETT, also of Daytona Beach, Florida, and Ira PATTERSON, of Daytona Beach, Florida.

A second son was born to Andrew and Lavinia on April 4, 1882 in Moseley Hall, Madison County Florida, and they named him Finley Jesse **PATTERSON**. Finley is listed on the 1885 census record for Moseley Hall as Andrew's son and is 2 years of age.

We next find Finley listed as Andrew's son in the 1900 census record for Moseley Hall, and with them are all the children of Andrew and Lavinia, except Russell A. Listed with Finley are Charles L., Patterson, Grady, Gladis, Manda (Amanda) and Ruth. On this census they list they have 7 children living. By the 1910 census, Finley is not included with Andrew's family. He was educated in the schools of Madison County, a Seminary in Gainsville, in Florida Southern College and in Vanderbilt University. He married Grace S. RYDER, daughter of a Methodist preacher. Dr. Frederick PASCO performed the ceremony in the home of the bride on December 7, 1915. Finley became a fully ordained Elder in the Methodist Church in 1913 and served his church thirty-four years. He served in Sopchoppy Mission, which was previously called the Leon Circuit, Ft. Lauderdale, Jacksonville Mission, Cocoa, New Smyrna, St. Augustine, Quincy, Winter Haven, Springfield Church, Jacksonville, Tallahassee District, Bartow and Lake Wales. In 1917, I found Finley in Volusia County, Florida where he filled out a World War I Draft Card. In this card he stated his name as Finley Jesse PATTERSON and his birth date as April 3, 1882. In the 1920 census he is in New Smyrna, Volusia County, Florida, and his census record lists his wife, Grace S. age 25, and a daughter named Margaret S., age 6/12 months. By the 1930 census, Finley has moved his family to Winter Haven, Polk County, Florida. He now has another daughter, and they named her Jeanne. Jeanne is 6 in this census record and Margaret is 10. Living, as a boarder with Finley, is a Hazel R. BENNETT, age 33. Finley lists his occupation as a clergyman. Finley was named as an executor in Ira PATTERSON'S will, but he died before he could perform those duties. His widow and children are listed as heirs in this probate as follows: Grace PATTERSON, widow, 515 Sessions Ave. Lake Wales, Fla., Margaret PATTERSON, of the same address and Annette PATTERSON, same address. In the JOURNAL OF THE FLORIDA CONFERENCE, dated 1944, we find a tribute given to Finley. "Finley PATTERSON held a place of highest esteem among his brother Ministers. The same is true among the people in every charge where he was pastor. No man ever walked more circumspectly, in the home, the church, or the community. His heart was pure, his thinking unselfish, and his deportment in private, as well as public, was that which becometh the Christian Ministry." Finley died on April 8, 1944 at Lake Wales, Florida. His wife and his two daughters survived him. Finley's wife, Grace, died in December of 1962 in Polk County, Florida.

Andrew and Lavinia's third child was another son. They named him Charles L. Bertholdi **PATTERSON**. He was born on April 17, 1885 in Moseley Hall, Madison County, Florida. Charles married Ruby, maiden name unknown. Charles is living in Odessa, Pasco County, Florida in 1910 and lists his family as follows: C.L.B. **PATTERSON**, age 25, Ruby B. **PATTERSON**, age 20, and Russel A. **PATTERSON**, age 6/12 months. He lists he has been married for one year, thus making his marriage year 1909, and his occupation is bookke.eper for a sawmill. It seems that his brother, Russell must have joined him in this area sometimes after the 1910 census record. In between the 1910 and 1920 census records, Charles also filled out a World War I Draft Card. In it he states his name as Charles L. B. **PATTERSON**; he was born on April 17, 1885; he lives in Odessa, Pasco County, Florida; he is 33 years of age; he is a bookkeeper at Gulf Pine Company; his wife is Ruby Tesa (Vera); he is short, of medium build, brown eyes and black hair. He also states his disability as blindness in one eye. His brother, R. A., signs his draft card as a registrar. Charles is still living in Odessa Florida in 1920. He is listed there in the 1920 census, and he has two more children: Oland J. who is 6 years old and Rube V. who is 1. Charles is still a bookkeeper for the lumber mill. By the 1930 census record, Charles has moved his family to New Port Richey, Pasco County, Florida. His three children are still living with him, but their names have changed in this census.

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Russell A. is still the same, but Oland is now Claude, and Ruby V. is listed as Vera. Charles lists his occupation in this census as a manager for a lumber mill. His wife is listed as a seamstress, working at home, and Russell is listed as a deliveryman, delivering laundry. On the Florida death index, Charles is listed as dying in 1939 in Sumpter County, Florida. There is no widow listed in Ira **PATTERSONS** probate records of 1945 but his children are listed as follows: Russell **PATTERSON**, Miami, Florida, Vera **FINKLE**, Daytona Beach, Florida, Claud Charles **PATTERSON**, Daytona, Florida.

The fourth child born to Andrew and Lavinia was a girl they named Gladys Lavinia PATTERSON. She was born on May 1, 1888 in Moseley Hall, Madison County, Florida. She is listed as the daughter of Andrew in the 1900 Madison County, Florida census. She is listed as 12 years old. By 1910, Gladys is married to Tom E. CHAIRS. They are living in Precinct 13, Leon County, Florida. She and Tom have been married for one year, and Tom is a farmer with a home farm. They have one daughter named Mildred F., and she is 10/12 months old. In 1920, Gladys and Tom have moved to Odessa, Pasco County, Florida. They now have a son named Thalia (I believe this is Tholdi, short for Bertholdi, (named after his Uncle Charles L. Bertholdi PATTERSON)), age 4. Thomas E. CHAIRS and Gladys divorced in 1927, and I couldn't find Gladys in the 1930 census, but I did find two of her children living with their grandmother, Lavinia, in Pinellas County, Florida. The two children that were living with Lavinia were listed as Tholdie P. CHAIRS, age 14, grandson and Thomas D. CHAIRS, age 9, grandson. Mildred wasn't with them in this census. I found Thomas E. CHAIRS living alone in Putnam County, Florida in 1930 and a death record for him stating his death in 1952 in Gadsden County, Florida. Gladys was living in Duval County, Jacksonville in 1945 where she received an inheritance from Ira PATTERSON'S estate. Her address at that time was listed in the estate papers as 318 Monroe St., Jacksonville, Florida.

The fifth child born to Andrew and Lavinia was a son. They named him Grady Atticus PATTERSON. Grady was born April 3, 1891 in Moseley Hall, Madison County, Florida. He is listed as Andrew's son in both the 1900 and 1910 census records. In 1917, I found a record for him in his World War I Draft Card Registration. He states his name is Grady Atticus PATTERSON, he is 27 years of age, he was born on April 3, 1890 in Madison County, Florida, and he is employed in the grocery business. He is single, of medium height, slender build, blue eyes and light hair. This card was filled out in Tarpon Springs, Pinellas County, Florida on June 5, 1917. Sometime between this 1917 record and the 1920 census, Grady has married Grace V., and they are living in Tampa Ward 3, Hillsborough County, Florida. He lists his occupation in the 1920 census record as a bookkeeper for a bank. In the 1920 census, he and his wife Grace are living as lodgers in the household of Walter P. and Virginia GAILLARD. They have no children at this time. Grady is an heir in Ira PATTERSON'S probate dated 1945, and the probate lists his Tampa, Florida address. Grady lived the rest of his life in Tampa, Hillsborough County, Florida. He lived at 3816 Santiago Street in Tampa, Florida and worked for Hav-A-Tampa Cigar Company for 42 years. He was a member of the Hyde Park United Methodist Church in Tampa and had served with the US Army. Grady and Grace had one son that I know of: Aubrey Justin **PATTERSON**. Grady's death is listed as January 27, 1978, age 87, in the Florida Death Index. His wife Grace survived him, and she moved to Jackson, Tennessee after the death of Grady. She died about 1986 in Jackson, Tennessee at 91 years of age, but she was brought back to Tampa for burial. She is buried at Myrtle Hill Cemetery in Tampa, Florida. Her name is given as Grace Van Buren **PATTERSON** in her obituary, and the Van Buren could be her maiden name.

A daughter was born to Andrew and Lavinia on January 1, 1896 in Moseley Hall, Madison County, Florida, and they called her Amanda Ellen PATTERSON. She is listed as Andrew and Lavinia's daughter in the 1900 and 1910 Madison County, Florida census records. By 1910, Andrew's family was getting smaller, and listed in the 1910 census record living with him and Lavinia, are Grady, Amanda and Ruth. By 1920, Amanda is no longer living with Andrew, and I couldn't find her in the 1920 census record. She does show up in the 1930 census record, and she is living with Lavinia in Palm Harbor, Pinellas County, Florida. She is listed as Lavinia's daughter and is married to a John E. **DOWNING**. There are no children listed for her. She states she was married at 19, and it seems to be her first marriage, so I think she married John E. DOWNING sometime in 1915. In this census record, she lists her occupation as a private secretary. John E. DOWNING is listed as Lavinia's son-in-law and states his occupation as none. Since I can't find her in the 1920 census, I can't be sure that she wasn't married before. Amanda died soon after this 1930 census. The Florida Death Index lists her death as 1932. Amanda's obituary was posted in THE TAMPA SUNDAY TRIBUNE, March 6, 1932. It states she died on March 5, 1932, and her funeral was held in the Vinson Funeral Home. The Rev. Mr. HOLMES, of Palm Harbor, assisted by Dr. M. M. BALES of the First Baptist Church officiated. Her burial was in the Cycadia Cemetery, Tarpon Springs, Pinellas County, Florida. It also states she was the sister of Grady PATTERSON and Mrs. Gladys CHAIRS of Tampa.

Andrew and Lavinia's last child was a girl they named Ruth Inez **PATTERSON.** Ruth was born on February 2, 1899 in Moseley Hall, Madison County, Florida. She is listed in the 1900 census for Moseley Hall, Madison County, Florida as Andrew's daughter and is one year old. In the 1910 census, Ruth is listed with Andrew as Ruth I. and is eleven years old. They are in Madison, Madison County, Florida in this census. Ruth is still living with Andrew and Lavinia in the 1920 census record in Southerland, Pinellas County, Florida. Between the 1920 and 1930 census records, Ruth has married Clifford F. **ROACH**, who was born on July 16, 1897 in Michigan. Ruth is living with her mother, Lavinia, in Palm Harbor, Pinellas County, Florida and in the 1930 census, she is listed as Lavinia's daughter. Her age is 30 and Clifford's age is 32, and he lists his occupation as a machinist in offices. Clifford lists he was born in Michigan, and his mother and father's birthplace is listed as Michigan also. In this census Ruth says she married at age 22. They have one son, Clifford A. **ROACH**, age 6. Sometime after the 1930 census record, Ruth and Clifford moved to Eustis, Lake County, Florida. Ruth is listed as an heir in Ira **PATTERSON'S** probate in 1945, and she lists her address as 508 Ambassador Ave., Eustis, Florida. Ruth died on May 5, 1989. She was 90 years old, and her address is listed as 32726, Eustis, Florida. Clifford died a few years before her death, and his death date is listed as June 2, 1978 at the same address listed for Ruth in Eustis.

Andrew was in Homestead, Florida, visiting his daughter, at the time of his death. Here is a transcription of Andrew's obituary that was published in February 12, 1924 issue of <u>The Miami Herald</u>. "**PATTERSON**, Andrew Elkins, -, died in Homestead yesterday morning. He was visiting friends there. He was the son of the late Mr. And Mrs. John H. **PATTERSON** and was born in Madison, Fla., where both his parents were also born and reared. He was a retired merchant. He leaves a wife, Lavinia Swift **PATTERSON**, and a son, the Rev. Finley **PATTERSON**, a Methodist Pastor at St. Augustine. The body was shipped last night to Madison by the W. H. **McCombs** Funeral Home, accompanied by his wife and son. Funeral services and burial will be conducted there."

The names of Andrew's other children are missing in this obituary, and we know that Andrew's parents were not born and reared in Madison. His father, John HOWELL **PATTERSON**, was born in 1805 in South Carolina and his mother, Sarah **SMITH**, was born in Georgia in 1812. Also the "friends" mentioned was really his daughter from his first marriage, Mary Rebecca (Molly) **PATTERSON CAMERON**, wife of Samuel Batey **CAMERON**. On Andrew's death certificate, it states that his address was Southerland, Fla. This is the area where Lavinia is still living in 1930 and is in Pinellas County, Florida. His son, Finley Jesse **PATTERSON**, gave the information in his death certificate, and it states that Andrew's father and mother were John H. **PATTERSON** and Sarah **SMITH**. It also says that Andrew was a retired merchant, and that he was born in Madison County, Fla. His birth date is given as October 21, 1839 and his death date is February 11, 1924. Andrew is buried at the Old Oakland Cemetery in Madison County, Florida along side his first wife, Sarah Elizabeth **SWIFT**.

After Andrew's death, Lavinia is found living in Southerland, Pinellas County, Florida. She filed a Widow's Pension Claim on May 1, 1924 citing Andrew's service in the Civil War as follows: Claim for Pension by Lavinia **PATTERSON** of Southerland, Pinellas County; widow of Andrew E. **PATTERSON** of Company C, 4<sup>th</sup> Fla. Regiment. This claim was approved on May 2, 1924 and she received \$300.00 per annum.

On the 1930 census, Lavinia is the head of household, and living with her are two of her grown daughters: Ruth P. ROACH, age 30 and Amanda E. DOWNING, age 33, two son-in-laws: Clifford ROACH, age 32 and John E. DOWNING, age 39. Also included in this census, living with Lavinia, were three of her grandchildren: Clifford A. ROACH, age 6, Tholdie P. CHAIRS, age 14 and Thomas D. CHAIRS, age 9. Lavinia lists her age in this census as 75. Lavinia lived one more year after this census. She passed away on July 29, 1931. Here is the obituary for Lavinia that was printed in the July issue of The Tampa Tribune.

"MRS. LAVINIE **PATTERSON**, CLEARWATER, July 29---(Special)—Mrs. Lavinie **PATTERSON**, 76, widow of Andrew E. **PATTERSON**, died yesterday at her home in Palm Harbor. Funeral services will be held at Madison, her former home, where the body was sent today. Five sons and two daughters survive." I believe she is buried at the Old Oakland Cemetery, but I haven't found her gravesite at this writing.

So ends the story of my GG grandfather, Andrew Elkins **PATTERSON**. He was born on October 21, 1839 in Madison County, Florida, and he died on February 11, 1924 at the age of 84. He was brought back to Madison County to be laid to rest by his beloved first wife, Sarah Elizabeth **SWIFT**. Andrew lived most of his 84 years of life in Madison County, Florida, serving his country in the Civil War and rearing his large family there. He was the son of a Madison County Pioneer, John Howell **PATTERSON**, and was himself, a true pioneer of the county. He leaves us a rich and wonderful legacy that will never be forgotten and will live on in the lives of the ones he left behind.
