Whew!! 2010 was quite a year for the NvFRW:

The NvFRW celebrated its 60th anniversary. We were joined by eight of the past presidents of the Nevada Federation: former Nevada



Congresswoman Barbara Vucanovich; Joyce Anderson, Eleanor Mills, Paula Schlegelmilch, Lia Roberts, Mary Ellen Cushard, Connie Fent (representing also her mother Doris Johnson), and Michele Turner. We were also honored to have Sue Lynch, the NFRW President to help us celebrate our organization and the women who served as our Presidents.

- Our membership increased in 2010 by 9% over 2009!
- Mesquite Republican Women was chartered in 2010 and became a very dynamic addition to our other 19 clubs
- The NvFRW was able to help the Nevada Republican Party's Get Out the Vote efforts as we paid for over 69,000 phone calls to Republican women in November. Former Lieutenant Governor Lorraine Hunt donated her voice to the calls urging Republican to vote in such a critical year.

• Our clubs throughout the state made life better through their many "Caring for America" projects. How can we not be proud of our support of our military and our veterans, food banks and shelters, children, and literacy? And the Constitution Day project provided children in 25 schools in 4 counties with copies of the United States Constitution and instruction on why it is such an important document to all Americans.

• The NvFRW website was expanded to become such a great tool for not only our own Federation members but also those women looking for a Republican organization to join. In April, the site was even recognized as the "Winning Web of the Week" by the NFRW Website Committee.

• In September, the NvFRW was presented one of two Tom Weisner Awards by the Nevada Republican Party for our organization's support of the party and its candidates

• In January 2010, our Leadership workshops were attended by 145 members of the NvFRW. In January 2011, attendance had grown to almost 170.

So, the first year of my two-year term is complete. What an honor it has been to serve as your President! Wherever I go, it is such a pleasure to hear the contributions in time and effort of the NvFRW clubs are recognized!

BCRW closed 2010 celebrating the election of Republican candidates and thanking members for their many volunteer hours spent on the campaigns. During the year, we had 20 Republican candidates speak at our meetings. In October, members again completed the BCRW "elephant walk" - they spent two days stuffing 4,000 door hanger packets with Republican candidates' campaign material and then, with the help of 25 volunteers, including 13 high school students, distributed the packets to Boulder City residents.

A highlight for the year was the BCRW sponsored "Immigration Information Seminar" with speaker Susan Tully, F.A.I.R. National Field Director. At each club meeting we supported our troops by collecting items and money to help send care packages to those on the front line. BCRW placed wreaths throughout the year at the "Circle of Stones, Circle of Life" memorial on Veterans Memorial Drive in Boulder City. The site marker reads, "Freedom is not free. Our gratitude to those who have served our country. Boulder City Republican Women."

Carson City Republican Women President, Janice Baldwin, began January 2010 with a board with great ideas.

In February, Central Committee put on a successful Lincoln Day Dinner with our help. Caring for America Chair (CCRW and state), Carolee Berglan, orchestrated goals for the year, supporting "Food for Thought", Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA), and Advocates to End Domestic Violence. Supplies for 90 hygiene kits were gathered for Haitian earthquake victims.

St. Patrick's Day was celebrated with a fundraising dinner chaired by Maureen Stair. Many members worked on campaigns for Primary candidates, held meet and greets and helped with the county convention.

In April Campaign Chair, Carol Howell, put together a candidate's precinct walk in Carson City and rally at Mills Park attended by 800 people.

CCRW sponsored a "Meet and Greet" in May for candidates and to also honor volunteers who helped at the Carson City Republican headquarters.

In June our Americanism chair, Lori Bagwell, organized a "Salute Our Soldiers" event on Flag Day along with the DAR and Web of Support. Staff Sgt Eric Wood and his wife Angela were presented with ceremonial American flags. Six ladies worked with six at risk children and a parent to introduce them to the literacy

program. We had booths at both the Carson Rendezvous and Fly Over to register voters and sell our boutique items.

July was a time to spend with family in addition to normal CCRW activities.

In August a "90 Days to Victory" campaign was introduced to us by Carol Howell. A very successful fundraiser was held for Sharron Angle orchestrated by Alicia Eidel.

In September Angela LoGiurato, 2nd Vice President, chaired a new members lunch at the Governor's Mansion, also honoring our past presidents. Along with PACT (Project America Coming Together), we were able to get Liberty Day booklets out to 5th graders of six public and four private schools for Constitution Day.

Our successful Nevada Day Pancake Breakfast allowed us to again fund two \$1,000.00 scholarships, thanks to Mary Burgoon.

NvFRW President Lynne Hartung presided over the installation of officers in December.

Following are some of the Fernley Republican Women's achievements in 2010.

Fernley RW provided a forum for many candidates, including Governor Jim Gibbons, Mike Montandon, Danny Tarkanian, Senator Maurice Washington for Sue Lowden, Assembly Minority Leader Heidi Gansert for Brian Sandoval, Lyon County Sheriff Allen Veil and Sharron Angle. We also moderated debates between the Lyon County candidates for Clerk-Treasurer, Commissioner-District 5 and District Attorney.

Our Caring for America/Adopt-a-Soldier program consisted of (1) donating non-perishable foods for the Fernley food bank, (2) sending care items to our adopted Platoon of Apache Pilots deployed to Afghanistan, and (3) sponsoring a team to participate in the American Cancer Society Relay for Life event in Fernley.

Over the past several years, we entered a float in the Fernley 4th of July parade. In 2009 and 2010, we won 1st prize in the political float category.

For the Literacy program: (1) we presented 4 "MELP" approved books to local school libraries; (2) presented dictionaries to each child entering 3rd grade at the Cottonwood Elementary School; (3) delivered 176 children's

books to the Shriners Hospital in Sacramento; (4) provided Liberty Day to each 5th grader in Fernley and Silver Springs.

The editor of our newsletter, *The Right Side of Fernley*, produced six editions last year and received many compliments on the content and quality of our newsletters.

At the Lincoln Day Dinner, we announced our 2010 Woman of the Year: Cindy O'Toole. Cindy is an outstanding leader of our club, our community and the Republican Party. She has been the FRW Secretary for the last two years and was recently installed as FRW Vice President.

We opened our Campaign Victory Headquarters for the six weeks leading up to the election. Our volunteers made sure our visitors felt welcomed, acknowledged and informed. In conjunction with Nevada GOP Victory, we made 14,873 telephone calls. Campaign volunteers contributed 1,286.5 hours.

These accomplishments, and many more, were made possible by a group of women who are totally dedicated to the cause of electing qualified Republican candidates at all levels of government.

The Birth of the Mesquite Republican Women (MRW)

With the initial help of Linda Parson, the Las Vegas Federation Officers and 7 determined conservative women, the Mesquite Republican Women's Club was born with the Board granting a Charter in April, 2010. The MRW hit the ground, not walking, but running with the upcoming Primaries and November Elections. We formed a coalition with two other local conservative groups sponsoring campaign events for conservative Republican candidates, including Sharron Angle, with over 500 attending, and the entire Republican slate for state offices, including Brian Sandoval, Cresent Hardy and Dr. Joe Heck.

This exposure attracted both potential and new members, which we were unprepared to handle. We immediately developed a membership kit and business cards. The kit includes a brochure summarizing the history of the National & Nevada Federations and the MRW objectives and benefits of membership; a membership application and meeting calendar. Each member is encouraged to carry the kit and business cards at all times. Although we have lost several members since the Club's inception, we've increased our membership by nine (9), for a total of sixteen (16) Members and seven (7) Associate Members—all before our first birthday!

Note: Once a woman becomes a member, she receives a new member kit, including the Bylaws, the membership roster, our WEB Resource Bulletin and, starting this year, a membership card.

December was the installation of new officers at our Christmas Party held at Tahoe Ridge Winery. Jon Ralston came in and joined us for a question and answer session that always raises eyebrows. The new officers included myself (former VP for 2 years) VP of Programs Janet Asmann, VP of Membership Mary Porter, Treasurer Shari James, Recording Secretary Jan Muzzy (2nd term), and Corresponding Secretary Cathy Kite. We have an amazing team of go-getters this year with so many new ideas, including a host of ways to attract new members. January was our first meeting at Carson Valley Inn and we had lots of space and a terrific speaker, Eric Golub, a self proclaimed Jewish conservative blogger and entertainer. Eric was hilarious and informative. He opened up discussion for one of my themes for the year regarding how we make Conservatives "cool" to the next generation. We need to shed the spins and misconceptions about being a bunch of "squares", and show the younger generation that you can be conservative AND have a heart! As part of this theme, we are starting two Satellite groups in the evenings. One is Conservatives and Cocktails, which will initially attract about 12 people, as well as a Satellite group for 18-20 somethings for which we have not yet developed a name. The goal isn't only to draw new, younger members, but to keep them through education and political stimulation.

We started a Constitutional Law Committee which had its first lively meeting. We have County Commissioner Nancy McDermid and Former Chief of Staff Robin Reedy to help keep us on track of local laws. The group also has our own VP Mary Porter, who was a former attorney and studied constitutional law. We discuss issues that affect us by way of constitutional failings such as Obamacare, 2nd Amendment rights, etc. The group hopes to grow by leaps and bounds and will report every other month to the club at our lunches regarding HOT topics. We will also be handing out Constitution booklets to 5th & 10th graders in our school districts who are studying American History.

Sally Wiley has still graciously stayed on as our Caring For America Chair. She continues to stock the Coffee Corner at the VA clinic and tirelessly collects cards and packages to send to our troops. She does so much for the men and women that come home as well - her efforts are epic! Our literacy chair, Jan Vanderbur, also agreed to stay on. We are planning more book donations to our local library this year.

We also started a Website Committee comprised of five members who have each agreed to take over one page on the website for maintenance and updating. This will grow our website and create a better calendar and history for viewers of the site. One of the County Commissioners and associate member, Lee Bonner has agreed to co-chair and lend his website expertise with the hope of, again, attracting more young members. As my first year as President, I hope to add value and education to all members while helping to create a conservative movement to capture the 20 year olds and inspire the rest of us!

Sparks Republican Women had a successful 2010 in addition to all the emphasis on the election.

- ▶ We had a 21% increase in membership
- ▶ For a medium sized Club we had a large share of candidates for elective office.
- ▶ We had four full members run for office and one won election.
- ▶ We had nine Associate members run for office and five won election.
- ▶ A donation was made to Silver State Excellence in Public Service to train female Republican political leaders.
- ▶ A donation was made of 420 US Constitution books and 16 teacher packets for a 7th grade program on the constitution in five Sparks schools.
- ▶ A donation of \$1,500 was made to the Nevada GOP and \$500 each to 10 GOP candidates for state and local races.

The new NvFRW website www.nvfrw.org is up and running as of January 10, 2011.

As noted at the January Leadership Workshops, it is the responsibility of each club to post meetings and other events on the Calendar. This is a relatively simple process:

- * Click on the Calendar heading
- * Event Name - Enter your Club name/Event in the box (CCRW Luncheon)
- * Event Starts & Event Ends - Click on calendar icons; hit the correct day and move the time icons to correct **Start and End** times
- * Location – Enter the full address, including ZIP (This enables the posting of a meeting location map)
- * Description – Enter the event details in this box (Speaker info/et al)
- * Click on the Save button when done

Your event will not be entered on the Calendar until it is approved by the Website Manager (me). If I am at home, this is a rather quick process. If I am out of town, without my laptop, it will wait until I return! You may update your event by notifying me. I will notify the BOD whenever I will be gone for more than a few days.

In regard to posting Club newsletters – they are posted; however, if your newsletter is too big (too many MB's) it will take longer for readers to open – and discourage them from reading it.

As with all websites, updated information is the key to a successful project – this responsibility also lies with each Club. Please send me Club and Committee news and photos. I would like to create a separate News and Photo page for each Club; however, this cannot be done without your active participation.

Bylaws Report

If proposed changes to the NvFRW Bylaws are to be eligible for discussion and a two-third vote of approval, they must be sent out with the Call to the Spring BOD meeting. The Spring BOD meeting is scheduled for Saturday, May 21, 2011. The Call to Meeting must be issued at least 30 days prior to the meeting.

I am requesting all proposed changes to the bylaws be submitted to me no later than April 1, 2011. This will give me ample time to properly prepare and submit them to the President.

Bylaws may be presented from the floor at the meeting; however, any such proposals would require a unanimous vote for approval.

Anyone may submit a proposed bylaw change;

however, this should be done in the proper format – the form is available on the NvFRW website under Documents. Upon the April 1 deadline, I will compile the proposals and distribute them to the NvFRW Bylaw Committee for comment. Each Club may have a representative, appointed by the Club President, on the Bylaw Committee. I will check with Club Presidents to update my current list of 14 representatives.

Proposed changes to the governing structure of the NvFRW may be presented at the Spring BOD for discussion and a non-binding “vote of recommendation”. A final vote of approval/denial will be made by the membership at the 2011 Fall Biennial.

If there is one word to describe the accomplishments of Active Republican Women of Las Vegas (ARW) in 2010 it is "active". Under the leadership of current Past President Peggy Micco-Koning, ARW demonstrated "federation" values, all contributing greatly to Republican candidates, our dedicated men and women serving our country in harm's way, and the Las Vegas Community.

Being an election year, eight of the nine general membership meeting programs prior to the November election featured national, state and local candidates. ARW women were given the opportunity to hear from, as well as mix and mingle with candidates for most offices featured on the ballot. ARW women also volunteered thousands of hours working on various campaigns.

Caring for American Soldiers is one of ARW's most cherished responsibilities. In the spring, ARW shipped 500 boxes of Girl Scout Cookies and Starbucks Coffee to our military in Iraq and Afghanistan. In the summer, seventy pounds of goodies were stuffed into mini beach bags and shipped giving soldiers a "Fourth of July Beach Party". In an unexpected gesture of gratitude, ARW received an American Flag flown over Camp Monsoor in Ramadi, Iraq, on July 4, 2010, in our honor. For Christmas, ARW provided Christmas cheer in the form of 600 pounds of goodies, much of it stuffed into Christmas stockings. Not to forget our honored Veterans on Veterans Day, ARW donated gift cards redeemable at local restaurants to Veterans living at the Boulder City Veterans Home.

The community benefited from ARW's charitable generosity and volunteerism through numerous collection drives targeting clothing, books, backpacks, school supplies and mother's day gifts for at-risk children. Also, ARW volunteers went into these at-risk schools to read to children.

In conclusion, ARW leaves a legacy for 2010, the launching of its "ARW Scholarship for Republican Women". Proceeds from ARW's 40th Anniversary Ruby Jubilee held Saturday, October 16th at the Alexis Park Resort, provided the initial funding for this project. A hit of the evening was the 10-minute ARW retrospective video covering ARW's 40 year pictorial history. This video was professionally produced and narrated by club historian Alice Shillock-Clark and her husband Bob Clark.

"Federation" guests included Sue Lynch, President NFRW; Kay Butchko, NFRW Vice-Chair Membership; Lynn Hartung, President NvFRW; Anita Trone, President Fernley Republican Women; Vicky Maltman, President North Valleys Republican Women, and ten Past Presidents of ARW. Also attending were State Senator and ARW Member Barbara Cegavske, State Assemblyman and ARW Associate Member John Hambrick, Judge Dave Barker, Judge and Associate Member Michael Villani, City Councilman and Associate Member Stavros Anthony, Chairman Board of Regents and Associate Member James Dean Leavitt, and Mark Amodei, Chairman Nevada Republican Party,

Legislative Report

January—March 2011

We have just finished a major election year for Nevada. Now our focus must turn to following the work of our legislators, informing our members and friends about legislation, and holding our legislators accountable to support our Republican platform, principles and values.

To be added to the NvFRW Legislative email list, send an email to nvfrw_legis_chair@hotmail.com requesting to be added, include your name and the name of your club. Emails are sent using bcc to maintain confidentiality and to save header space. You will receive emails on significant status updates on major bills on Voter Fraud, Katie's Law, Taxes, Education and Reduce Spending/ Budget, and Redistricting.

I urge you to get informed and inform your friends about the issues and bills. Email, call or write your legislator about your opinion on the bills.

It is a good time for Republican women and friends to learn more about the legislative process and increase our effectiveness in the cause of good government through active political participation. Plan to attend NvFRW Legislative Day on May 20 in Carson City and meet your legislators.

Applicants must be at least a junior in college, or a college student at least 21 years of age or older.

The state federation or local clubs can sponsor an essay contest with suggested topics:

- a. What the Flag means to me?
- b. Is Voting Important?

If you had an interview with George Washington what questions would you ask him and why? You can choose any American History subject. Winner can be awarded a Savings Bond and be invited to attend your state federation annual meeting.

Set up a committee to select a topic and judge the essays. Contact principals of local high schools or put an ad in the local paper announcing the essay contest sponsored by your federation or unit club.

Set up a study group on Women's Voting Rights. And learn the history of your state federation. Did women in your state have: Voting rights prior to 1920? Were their rights limited to education or library issues?

When did your state ratify the Suffrage Amendment? When and who was the first Republican woman elected to public office in your state?

Visit returning veterans in hospitals. When travelling, if you see military personnel, please make a point of greeting them and thanking them for their service to our country. You can also offer to buy them lunch/dinner.

Do a program on Flag Etiquette; i.e., care of the flag, demonstrate folding the flag, discuss the meaning of the colors of the flag, etc.

Create a program for public school children in your district; donate a copy of the U.S. Constitution, the Declaration of Independence, and/or a dictionary to teach students; i.e. 5th graders. Copies of the Constitution can be obtained through your U S Congressman or U. S. Senator. You can obtain a teacher's guide to the Constitution on the internet. Google: Teaching the Constitution to students.

Ronald W. Reagan Centennial Birthday Celebration:

- a. Open up your club meeting by appointing a different member each month to speak or quote something from President Reagan's life and his contributions to American values.
- b. Plan a birthday celebration to honor Reagan in 2011.

REVIEWING THE "BASE"ICS FOR PROGRAM PLANNING

It is no secret that having interesting programs is one of the top reasons that Republican women join our clubs and remain active. Ideas for great programs can come from anywhere. Some of the best experiences can come from visiting other clubs all over the state and seeing the kinds of programs other Federated Republican Women plan and enjoy.

Thought: In planning your programs for the year, take a look at the NFRW Achievement Form. This information will be very helpful. You will find that qualifying for national awards also gives annual program ideas! You will have many other ideas – let your imagination go!

Ideas for Club Program Speakers

Political – local Republican elected officials, local Republican Party officials

Voter Registration – Director of your county board of elections

Republican activists – State Federation officer; National Federation officer; Central Committee Chairman; State Party Chairman; members of neighboring clubs; workers for a Republican president; political consultants

Candidates for school board, town council, etc.; for party office

Legislators – speaking about legislative session and/or specific legislation

Speakers Bureau – go to state or national think tanks that provide speakers

Members with special expertise – for instance those who have experience & expertise on specific legislation, campaign knowledge, etc.

Political Topics – e.g. Katy's Law, Jessica's Law; property taxes; voter ID Project, Caring for America Project speakers.

Ideas for Club Events

Book discussion/book signing – authors: order their books at a discount, see them, and get them to autograph them. Then you have a program and a fundraiser! Community forums for candidates – Gubernatorial/senatorial/congressional (statewide); Presidential; Republican congressmen in your state; Republican congressmen from other states; former cabinet members.

Sponsor Cultural/Musical Events,
Forums About Issues – domestic violence (local community organizations and district attorney's offices); property rights.

Workshops/training for members and non-members – public relations, leadership development, fundraising, parliamentary procedure, membership recruitment and retention, lobbying and legislation, club president training, club treasurer training, veterans; experts on technology, internet, Twitter, Facebook, etc.

Always remember: We are REPUBLICAN clubs. Our job is to promote Republican ideals, Republican candidates and Republican goals!

KNOWLEDGE = LEADERSHIP = KNOWLEDGE

Education is the future of our clubs, our federation and our party. Education leads to knowledge and knowledge better equips us to develop better leadership.

Presidents' Day

Ask half a dozen people who Presidents' Day is meant to honor, and you may get half a dozen different answers. There isn't even universal agreement on whether there is an apostrophe in "presidents."

To the U.S. government, Presidents' Day is still recognized as "Washington's Birthday." On the government website's list of official holidays, sandwiched between Valentine's Day and Easter, it says: "Washington's Birthday is a federal holiday observed the third Monday of February to honor George Washington, the first President of the United States. This date is commonly called Presidents' Day and many groups honor the legacy of past presidents on this date."

In fact in some states the day jointly honors the birthdays of Washington, born February 22nd, and Abraham Lincoln, whose birthday is February 12th. But in others, the day is meant to honor Washington and Thomas Jefferson but not Lincoln, or all of the presidents.

Here's a brief history of the day:

- ▶ February 22nd, Washington's actual birthday, became a U.S. government holiday in 1885.
- ▶ In the early 1950s, there was a movement led by a coalition of travel organizations to create three-day weekends by moving the celebration of some holidays to Mondays. One of the suggestions was to create a Presidents' Day between Washington's and Lincoln's February 12th birthday. Lincoln's was a holiday in some states but was never made a federal holiday. A few states tried the new arrangement but it was not universally adopted across the country. Also, in the early 1950s, there was a proposal to make March 4th the original presidential inauguration day—a day to honor all presidents.
- ▶ In 1971, some holidays moved to Mondays under a U.S. law that created three-day weekends for federal employees. Individual states, however, were not required to honor them.

Today, there is no unanimous name for this holiday, but it always on the third Monday in February.

Even when it is called Presidents' Day, sometimes the apostrophe is missing, sometimes it is between the last two letters, and sometimes (as used here) after the last letter.

In Virginia, the first president's home state, the holiday is called George Washington's Day. But not in Alabama—there it is "Washing and Jefferson Day", in honor of George Washington and Thomas Jefferson, even though he was born on April 13th. Lincoln isn't mentioned. *Washington Post*

We need a President Reagan Holiday also!

Satellite Groups - A New Idea to Build Your Existing Club

Satellite groups are made up of those women who cannot attend regular meetings for whatever reason. Usually, this means that the group should be oriented to today's young homemakers, career women, and students.

NFRW Clubs should provide opportunities for political involvement to every segment of their communities. Young Republican women are very attracted to this concept - working women, college students, mothers at home with children -- women who are otherwise committed during your regular club meeting time. Senior citizens who have difficulty traveling would also be well-served by satellite groups.

The Satellite Group offers busy women the opportunity to be educated by hearing good speakers, but it relieves these members of the responsibilities of regular club commitments. Young Republican women are very attracted to this concept - working women, college students, mothers at home with children.

10 Steps To Form A Satellite Group

Satellite Groups are an exciting way to grow your Club membership. These Groups function like a committee and are a fundamental part of the parent Club. They are governed by the Club Executive Committee and can be as diverse as your leader's imagination!

It's as easy as 1 to 10:

1. Analyze your club's "community". Are there women who would become members or more active if offered a different meeting time, format, or venue? Commit to meeting those needs! You may develop more than one group!
2. Appoint a Satellite Committee Chair to explore opportunities to meet individualized needs. Chairman reports directly to the Club Executive Committee.
3. Establish Club "Standing Rules" for how a Satellite Group operates.
 - Functions as an extension of the

Federated Club and is governed by the Club bylaws.

- Club Executive Committee appoints a Chair and/or Co-chairs for each Satellite Group.
 - Satellite Group Chair or Co-Chairs will establish purpose, guidelines for their Group and recommend group leadership for approval by the Club's Executive Committee
 - Club budget will have a line item for each Satellite Group similar to a committee within the club. Satellite Group projects and fundraisers will be approved by Club Executive Committee. All funds will be held in Federated Club account under Satellite Group line item.
4. Focus on the demographic underserved in your Republican community. Be creative and open to new ideas. Here are some suggestions:
 - Working Business Women who need a different meeting time
 - Young Republican Women
 - "Moms and Kids" meet where children can play: Libraries, Community Centers, McDonald's
 - "Moms Day" - meet at Starbucks or breakfast place while children are in school
 - Saturday morning coffee/round table
 - Book club
 - "Mothers Night Out" - Dad babysits!
 - Dinner Discussion Group: Members or couples who wish to study issues (perhaps a dinner group at member's home) Plan ahead the topic for research and discussion.
 - High School Republicans and Home School Republicans - Parents host Satellite meetings. (Students make great campaign workers.)
 - Neighboring town to form the nucleus of a New Club
 - Study Group-meet in someone's home during the day or lunch
 - Senior activity group-lots of possibilities here
 - Start a Satellite club with the idea of mentoring to club charter -- the next town, county or neighborhood.

- Candidate Support Group-- Meet with candidates; offer grass roots support; become surrogate speakers; attend candidate events.
5. Set a **convenient time** to attract target group: evening, right after work, Saturday coffee, etc.
 6. Set a **convenient location**: restaurant, member's home, meeting hall.
 7. Plan an **agenda**; keep to promised meeting length.
 8. Invite an **informative speaker**. Interesting programs and exciting speakers energize your group and attract new members.
 9. **Advertise!** Use your club newsletter, website, and your club's Facebook page. Develop your Communications email list to notify members, community leaders, friends, and anyone who needs to hear your Republican message!
 10. **Welcome** Club members while you **Recruit** new members to Satellite Group who join as a Federated Club member. Nurture enthusiasm and activism!

Satellite Groups Can Become New Clubs

- New clubs develop from independent groups, from within an established club and in new locations. All are healthy growth and can be encouraged and nurtured through the satellite concept.
 - An independent group can benefit from starting as a satellite to an established club through learning about the Federation and how a club operates. As a satellite, they develop a cohesive identity to build leadership and objectives.
 - Healthy clubs grow and understand the outreach of developing new leadership. Like raising a family, we want to give them "roots and help them to fly"! A healthy start can be accomplished in a satellite group.
 - Your club can "adopt" the next town or county and seek out women to start a new club. Establish the nucleus group as a satellite to your club and help them grow.

The Petition requests that a bill be presented to the Legislative Operations and Elections Committee no later than Thursday, March 31, 2011. As of this date, no Bill Draft Request supporting Voter I.D. has been read on the floor and assigned a Bill Number.



Nevada Federation of Republican Women Jo Marshall Memorial Scholarship Fund Guidelines

Application forms for the Jo Marshall Scholarship may be obtained from the president of any club affiliated with the Nevada Federation of Republican Women or by contacting the scholarship chairman. The applicant must be female, a Nevada resident and a registered Republican. She must be attending or be accepted to attend a Nevada college or university. The president or first vice president of the sponsoring club must sign her application.

Any applicant must have a minimum 3.3GPA and must have carried 12 credit/hours during the last semester of school, whether high school or college. Grades or hours cannot be combined from two different sessions of school (i.e., a spring semester and summer school combined to apply for a fall award).

A club president or first vice president, denoting sponsorship of the applicant, must sign her application. The executive board of each respective sponsoring club should approve sponsorship. The applicant must then submit her completed application, two letters of recommendation (these may be from a teacher, minister, businessperson or employer), and a personal goal statement, emphasizing her need for this scholarship. The applicant must request that the most recent school attended send a copy of her latest transcript to the scholarship chairman no later than July 20, 2011, at the address below.

Two awards will be made under the scholarship; \$1,000 will be awarded on a one-time basis only to two first place students, one from northern Nevada and one from southern Nevada. Only one award of \$1,000 per student will be given. Whether an applicant is to be considered for an award in the north or south is determined by where she resides, not where she plans to attend college. The scholarship checks will be sent directly to the Bursar or financial aid office at the respective schools of the two scholarship recipients to be put on account for their educational expenses.

The deadline for all items (application, two letters of recommendation, a statement of personal goals and most recent transcript) to be received by the scholarship chairman for consideration is July 20, 2011, without exception.

Applicants are encouraged to contact the scholarship chairman by telephone or email if they have any questions or require further information. However, no applications or supporting documents will be accepted by email. Official transcripts must be mailed directly to the chairman from the applicant's school office. Requesting such transcripts is the sole responsibility of the applicant.
