During this month of July, we continue to read the Book of Numbers (Bemidbar) and learn about how our people evolved its understanding of morality and justice. We further understand the first push for women's and minority rights ever mentioned in any religious text. In this day and age of the Black Lives Matter movement in our country, we see that even the ancients in the Bible had to grapple with these issues as well. The Torah, and especially the Prophets, constantly talk about treating the widow, the orphan, the underprivileged, the stranger, and the slave (in those years) with more respect and dignity than was happening at the time. Those who were not part of the majority needed to have their rights championed, and the Torah and Prophets do that, and make it abundantly clear that all lives matter. We learn that it takes more than lip service and cerebral understanding to change how people are treated. It takes education and changes in public policy to effect real change. Remember, Jews have been, and in some cases, still are discriminated against only because they are Jews. Bemidbar teaches us that we need to learn, through our struggles, that we can be an illuminating force for positive and effective change to create more appropriate treatment of all who live in the world. May we so learn and promote all these ideals for the betterment of all.

Parashas Devarim

The Parasha Devarim is read throughout the world on the fourth of the month of Av (July 25th). Devarim is the Hebrew for “words”, and is used in conjunction with many adjectives and adverbs. It is also the name of the fifth book of the Torah. In this book, Moses was the speaker who said G-d spoke to me (see Devarim 1:42, 2:9, 3:2). Moses chose the words and conveyed the commandments as he understood them. This earned him the title of “Moses the Teacher” (Moshe Rabanov in Yiddish).

There are 11 parashas in the book of Devarim in which Moses summarizes the most practical and essential parts of the previous four books. He does this by presenting Torah portions as a guide to Jewish living and as a timely stimulus for positive not boasting, positions on the challenges of life.

First Devarim Parasha Summary There are two significant areas in this parasha: 1. The introduction to the farewell discourses of Moses. 2. The First discourse-review of the journey from Sinai to the wilderness of Kadesh.

Making Judgements To aid him in his leadership of the Israelites, Moses appoints judges whom will be impartial in their deliberations. In his presentation to the Israelites, Moses suggests three significant rules: 1. “hear out” those with conflicting views; do not show partiality to high or low, Israelite or stranger; and fear no one when you render your decision. These guidelines elaborate his character in that he loves his people and the art of achieving justice in human relationships (Deuteronomy 1:17).

Mitzvot—The appointment of judges When Israel was an autonomous people dwelling in its own land, and all its religious activities were centered around the Temple, judges were not elected, they were selected. Those who were commissioned to make the appointments were forbidden to show any favoritism. The candidates had to be men and women, such as Deborah, of the highest level in every respect.

Courts The highest court was the Great Sanhedrin composed of 71 judges. The head of this body of jurists was called the nasi. Moses was the first nasi and every succeeding nasi was to be considered in the same light as Moses in his day.

A lower court called the Small Sanhadrin was composed of 23 judges. Such a court was appointed for every community of 120 or more people.
