Counting the Omer and Counting Our Regrets

Printed from a recently delivered sermon

Late last year, a huge blackboard stood in a park in Brooklyn with the following question written on it: What is your biggest regret? For an entire day, New Yorkers opened up about some of the deepest, most intimate parts of their lives. As the day went on, the blank blackboard quickly filled. "Not saying I love you enough." "Burning bridges." "Not staying in touch." "Not being a better friend." "I focused on the wrong things." "I didn't call my grandma enough." "I spent too much time working." By the end of the day, the production team that was filming a documentary on

regrets noticed a common theme among almost all the responses. The regrets people shared were about chances not taken, words not spoken, mistaken priorities and dreams never pursued. I would imagine that the regrets of New Yorkers are not dissimilar to our own regrets. We wish we would have done something differently – made that phone call, taken that job, learned that skill. We may also realize that having regrets, and addressing those are not necessarily bad things. Experiencing regret means that we are not so cavalier as to think that we have done everything right. That we have all the right answers. Having regrets also means we are a normal person functioning within our society. Writer Kathryn Schulz teaches, "The inability to experience regret is actually one of the diagnostic characteristics of sociopaths. It's also, by the way, a characteristic of certain kinds of brain damage. So if, in fact, you want to live a life free of regret, there is an option open to you. It's called a lobotomy. But if you want to be fully functional and fully human and fully humane, perhaps we need to learn to live, not without regret, but with it." And perhaps, when we address our regrets, we can begin to move forward with our lives.

Did you know that there is a period of time within our tradition that asks us to engage in self-reflection? It doesn't just happen in the Fall, there is another period of reflective time called the Omer. And we happen to be in that Omer period right now. You may be asking yourself, what is this Omer thing he's talking about? Here's the deal: between the second day of Passover, and the holiday of Shavuot, where we celebrate receiving the Torah, there are 49 days. We are instructed to count each of those 49 days and acknowledge them. An omer is a measurement of grain that was brought to the Temple after the second day of Passover. The Torah instructs us to count each day from the Omer offering to Shavuot. The big question is why? There is a great explanation from Rabbi Jacob Milgrom, who is probably the world's greatest expert on the book of Leviticus (aside from Rabbi Apothaker). Rabbi Milgrom thinks the solution lies in the number of days that the Torah tells us to count. Shavu'ot is observed on the fiftieth day. The Hebrew word for fifty: Hamishim. The Arabic Word for fifty: Hamsin.

In Israel, a Hamsin is also a weather pattern. It is a rapid drop in the humidity, followed by a ferociously hot desert wind, so destructive that it can wipe out a crop overnight. Nowadays, meteorologists can predict a hamsin before it arrives. Now imagine a time when there were no meteorologists, and the dreaded hamsin could not be predicted. Farmers held their breath for the entire hamsin season, counting each day as a blessing if the hamsin did not come and their crops were not suddenly destroyed. That is why you had the counting, says Dr. Milgrom, and that is why you had the dread and the fear. The Sefirat Ha-omer was a period of fear and trepidation and a period of good behavior, lest God think us so cavalier about the great blessings of rain and dew and harvest that He gives us that divine punishment like hamsin, the hellish dry wind. That is why the Israelite farmer counted, and that is why the Israelite farmer was in semi-mourning, or, to be more exact, in fear and dread during these days. It makes sense. Each day that there is a chance your livelihood could be ruined and it's not, should be counted and acknowledged. We thank God for our blessings during the Omer.

There's another interpretation too. The kabbalists, the Jews who were into mysticism, explain that the 49 days that connect Passover with Shavuot correspond to the forty-nine drives and traits of the human heart. They understood it as a time of serious introspection and preparation that each person has to go through in order to receive the Torah anew on Shavuot. Each day of the counting represents a different aspect of our personality and of our relationship with God that we have to think about and set in order before we can receive the Torah. One of those Jewish values that we are asked to focus on confronting regrets to live a fuller life. This confrontation with regret takes courage and self-awareness. But our tradition argues that once we make peace with our past decisions and learn from them, we can begin the process of t'shuva, of turning back, then we will be spiritually ready to receive the Torah on Shavuot after the Omer period has ended.

Regrets require two things from us. It requires, first of all, some decision that we had to make in the first place. And second of all, it requires imagination. We need to be able to imagine going back and making a different choice, and then we need to be able to kind of push this imaginary scenario forward and imagine how things would be playing out in our

present. What if I had taken that job with that other company? What if I had made contact with my estranged family? What if I had been there when my loved one passed away?

During the omer, we are thankful each day for our lives. We are instructed to think: If a hamsin were to come and blow us away tomorrow, what would we want to make right? Who would we want to speak with today? How could we leave this earth with the fewest regrets possible? A number of years ago, Hopspice nurse Bronnie Ware, wrote an article that turned into a book about the five most common regrets her patients had as they were dying. In case you missed the original article, here is an abbreviated version of her list. 1. I wish I'd had the courage to live a life true to myself, not the life others expected of me. 2. I wish I didn't work so hard. 3. I wish I'd had the courage to express my feelings. 4. I wish I had stayed in touch with my friends. 5. I wish that I had let myself be happier. She goes on to say that every step of life is a choice. While it may sometimes feel like the universe is making decisions for us, that's not the case. It is YOUR life. Choose consciously, choose wisely, choose honestly.

I think one of the reasons this list is so powerful, is that it is authored by patients who know that they're near the end, who have the clarity to assess their lives meaningfully. Perhaps we can take their essential message and use it in our lives to make a change. We still have time to change. We can address our regrets. We can embrace the positive aspects of our lives, change what we can change, and improve ourselves in the coming year.

We must take the opportunity while we have it to ask for forgiveness if we think we have wronged somebody, or offer forgiveness if someone has hurt us. Maybe we regret spending too much time at work, and not enough time with our families. Maybe we regret treating somebody badly. Maybe we regret not standing up for someone when we should have. During the omer, we have not only the opportunity to make amends, we have a mandate to do so. Regrets between ourselves and other people who are still alive and accessible to us, bein adam l'chaveiro, can be mediated, but it takes patience and courage. Perhaps even in our healthy and happy relationships, we regret that we haven't spent enough time or energy telling the people closest to us how much they mean to us. We don't want to regret never having told them how we feel, or telling them too rarely or too reservedly. Sometimes the people we love most get the least of our attention. I suggest we need to say to them directly and unequivocally: "I cherish you;" "I am fortunate to know you;" "I am grateful for you, all you have done, and for all that you do for me." "I love you." We can reinvigorate the relationships that are the most meaningful, those in need of repair and those thriving - this day is meant to help us reflect on how to deepen all our connections.

We all have regrets, we are all imperfect, we are all human beings. The question we are instructed to answer during the Omer, is, are we going to address our regrets and deal with them? During this Omer period, may we have the strength and determination to make a real, substantial change in our lives. May we turn our regrets into lessons, our demons into angels, our shortcomings into our strengths; may we have the courage to confront our regrets, to address them, and erase them from our hearts and our souls whenever possible. May this Omer period inspire us to address our regrets, free ourselves from their chains, and be whole again.

TBS 7th Graders Learn About the Holocaust at The Maltz Museum

Thanks to a very generous grant from the Rolf Kaufman Memorial Fund for Holocaust Studies, on April 15th, 11 of our Religious School students and 2 teachers visited the Maltz Museum of Jewish Heritage. Our students delved into their shared heritage, which not only served to educate, but also to create an experience with their teachers outside their normal experience.

The trip culminates classroom learning of what happened during the Holocaust and why/how it happened. Our TBS students toured the exhibit called "Stop The Hate", which integrates the Holocaust into the larger framework of a pattern of intolerance, ignorance, and hatred. Teacher

Dani Hopping felt this exhibit "was the perfect way to end our focused discussion of the Holocaust and enter into a conversation about current national and global news".

The teens' experience was incredible, sobering, and meaningful. "Our students were particularly shocked to see a child-sized KKK uniform and voiced mature opinions about other examples of indoctrination into hate groups, such as the Hitler Youth" says teacher Aliyah Cohen

The Maltz Museum is dedicated to diversity and tolerance, it opened in 2005 with a simple mission: to build bridges of tolerance and understanding by sharing Jewish Heritage through the lens of the American experience.

This trip was funded thanks to generous donations in honor of Rolf Kaufman, of blessed memory, to create a fund to focus on Holocaust studies. Rolf was an active and valued member of Temple Beth Shalom for over 20 years, who served in many capacities as a board member, finance committee member, and usher. He went about his work in a very respectable manner, with patience, and with a big heart. The son of Holocaust survivors, Rolf was thankful to arrive with his parents in the United States when he was 3 year old. As a way of honoring Rolf's memory, his wife Ellie understood educating our TBS students on this important history was something Rolf would feel good about.

Presidential Address



Not quite gone, but almost forgotten?

Perhaps you're reading our column in time to attend Temple Beth Shalom's General Meeting on Sunday, May 6th at 10:30 am at the New Albany JCC/CJDS building at 150 E. Dublin-Granville Rd. If not, you might be one of our few members who was not in attendance for the sumptuous brunch that was served that morning. In either case, we would like to give you a synopsis of the final remarks that we

planned on making in our capacity as lame-duck co-presidents. At the beginning of our two-year term, the responsibility that you placed upon us and our Board of Trustees sometimes felt like a life-long mission. However, with the support of all three of our rabbis, our executive director and her staff, our officers and trustees and you, our members, the time has passed as quickly as the average Trump administration appointee's tenure in office.

We were honored to help complete our congregation's transition from Rabbi Apothaker to Rabbi Bar Lev and our addition of the very capable Rabbi Herzog. Beth Shalom's number of Bar and Bat Mitzvahs in 2016-17 was probably a record. Our religious school enrollment is the largest in central Ohio. Our first mortgage was paid off freeing our income to be spent on personnel and programming rather than on principal and interest. Our House of Peace has not been in such good condition since it was newly dedicated more than 20 years ago. Over \$100,000 was spent on security enhancements at our property in 2017-18. Our fundraisers in the last two years have exceeded our expectations in terms of both financial and spiritual commitments. Temple Beth Shalom's endowment, although much smaller than it should be, is larger than it has ever been.

The names of George Armstrong Custer (commanding officer at the infamous "Last Stand" in the Battle of Little Big Horn), Edward John Smith (captain of the short-lived Titanic) and Lord Cardigan (leader of the celebrated charge of the British Light Brigade at the Battle of Balaclava in 1854) are long remembered. The names of those who succeeded them and performed their duties adequately are lost to almost all of us. We hope that on July 1st few of you will notice that Dave Segal and Bonnie Cram have taken the reins of TBS lay leadership from our hands. Such a seamless transition would be the biggest compliment that could be bestowed upon us. We thank you for allowing us to serve our beloved Temple Beth Shalom for the last two years and look forward to Immediate Past Co-President status on our Board of Trustees.





B.R.E.A.D. Mission: People of faith building power to "do justice".

B.R.E.A.D. Vision for Doing Justice:

Most congregations are very good at pursuing the humble walk with God and they are often strong at demonstrating kindness (or mercy). But when it comes to doing justice, most of those same congregations fall significantly short. One of the primary reasons for this shortcoming is that a single member, clergy or congregation does not have enough power to hold key decision makers accountable for protecting the weak from the strong. BREAD provides a vehicle for congregations to practice justice by joining together large numbers of people. These large numbers of people give us a chance to "do justice." Since congregations gather weekly (52 times a year) to remind themselves of their humble walk with God, we challenge them to gather that same number of people once a year to take action and "do justice" at the Nehemiah Action Assembly (52/1).

The Kosher Bookworm



Psalms

Recently, the TBS Library acquired Songs Ascending: The Book of Psalms: A New Translation with Textual and Spiritual Commentary, a two-volume set, by Rabbi Richard N. Levy and published by the Central Conference of American Rabbis (CCAR) Press. While cataloging this set and before putting the books in their rightful place on our library shelves, I browsed through these books. I learned somewhat like the Torah,

there are Five Books of Psalms and the Psalms are numbered sequentially from 1 to 150. I then turned to Psalm 23 - A Psalm of David (Mizmor L'David). For most people, this is arguably the most familiar of all the Psalms, which begins: The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. What I discovered is this often-recited Psalm is the King James Version (KJV) of the English translation from the original Hebrew. Rabbi Levy offers an alternative translation, which he claims is a more accurate translation. Let us side-by-side compare the two translation versions.

<u>Verse</u>	The KJV Version	The Rabbi Levy Version
1	The LORD <i>is</i> my shepherd; I shall not want.	Adonai, my shepherd: I lack for nothing—
2	He maketh me to lie down in green pas- tures: he leadeth me beside the still wa- ters.	In meadows thick with grass You lay me down, Across streams serene You guide me.
3	He restoreth my soul: he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake.	My life You restore, Leading me serenely in well-worn paths of justice To glorify Your name.
4	Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou <i>art</i> with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me.	Even when I walk in a valley dark as death's shadow I shall fear no ferocity, For You are with me, Your staff and Your walk- ing stick—they reassure me.
5	Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over.	You set a table before me along with my enemies, You rain rich oils 'round my head; My cup? Overflowing!
6	Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I will dwell in the house of the LORD for ever.	For certain, goodness and the love of your covenant Will run after me all the days of my life, And I shall abide in God's house For long days, Long, long days.

I don't know about you, but I much more prefer Rabbi Levy's Version. It provides a Modern English translation (same as the way we talk and write, today) versus the archaic Old English translation in the KJV. I also appreciate the fine-tuned differences of Levy's more precise translation of the Hebrew text. I even prefer the third person pronoun "You" usage to the second person "He" because it sounds more like we are speaking to God; not about God. Moreover, the Rabbi Levy Version provides opportunity for us Jews to depart from the Christian tradition of the KJV when reciting the Psalm.

As he does for all 150 Psalms, Rabbi Levy provides an insightful Psalm 23 text commentary—verse-by-verse. Also, as is the same for the rest of the Psalms, Rabbi Levy provides a spiritual commentary including customs associated with the Psalm. In the Psalm 23 commentary, he mentions its recitation at funerals, houses of mourning and on Shabbat. Additionally, for those who enjoy studying text, he makes mention of the following recurring Psalm themes, which are suggested in Psalm 23: Awareness of God's presence, dealing with enemies (within and without), God's house, inner peace, justice, prayer, the nature of death, trusting in God, making the most of our lives, and the Sabbath.

To learn more about Psalm 23 and the other 149 Psalms, borrow this set of books from the TBS Library. The Kosher Bookworm will be glad you did and so will you!


