Luke 12:13-21



"Someone in the crowd said to Jesus, "Teacher, tell my brother to share the inheritance with me." He replied to him, "Friend, who appointed me as your judge and arbitrator?" Then he said to the crowd, "Take care to guard against all greed, for though one may be rich, one's life does not consist of possessions." Then he told them a parable. "There was a rich man whose land produced a bountiful harvest. He asked himself, 'What shall I do, for I do not have space to store my harvest?' And he said, 'This is what I shall do: I shall tear down my barns and build larger ones. There I shall store all my grain and other goods and I shall say to myself, "Now as for you, you have so many good things stored up for many years, rest, eat, drink, be merry!" But God said to him, 'You fool, this night your life will be demanded of you; and the things you have prepared, to whom will they belong?' Thus will it be for all who store up treasure for themselves but are not rich in what matters to God."

Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Anthony & St Pius Families,

18th Sunday Ordinary Time

Year C Luke 12:13-21

Intervention! Someone in the crowd demands that Jesus intervene in a fraternal dispute. Of course, the intervention favors the person requesting it! Some people are surprised by Jesus' pushback and refusal to judge the case – Jesus actually goes on to share a parable against greed (as if saying, "Don't take the bait of greed and let riches divide you from your brother") The crowd petitioner demands that Jesus force a brother to share some more of a family inheritance with him (this petitioner must be a younger brother, as the inheritance laws dictate that an oldest son received a double portion, & other sons only ½ that - Deuteronomy 21:17). Keep in mind that the petitioner would have received an inheritance, just, not as much as the older son. This helps us understand why Jesus does not want to be involved in a petty dispute between two brothers regarding possessions and wealth. The younger son was not destitute (but even if he was, 'Follow Jesus' – Jesus will provide! -Luke 22:35) The younger son just wanted MORE! Jesus is challenging the greedy 'acquisitive' spirit that can creep up in our human nature. The desire for 'more-more-more' (Is that in a TV commercial?)

Jesus cautions all of us today, against two hazards that can destroy relationships 1)loving possessions more than people & 2) seeing others only as means to get what we want (or more of it). The first is obvious in the crowd petitioner's demand for more inheritance – he wants a bigger piece of the family estate. But secondly, Jesus also has a problem with the pressuring and demanding part, in the tone of the man's claim. 'Tell my brother' Luke 12:13). Brothers should love of themselves, and not have to be made to do so. This scene reminds me of two young fighting siblings. Maybe a mother steps in between them and then demands, "Now make up, hug your brother and tell him you love him.....and mean it!" Okay! A parent can stop the fight, can make brothers hug, and can even make brothers say things to one another, but no one can make another person mean it! That is a voluntary 'heart' issue. The brother can only mean it himself, when it comes from his own heart, and of his own initiative! Jesus knows this and so he calls the 'demanding' brother in this story to consider again what he is asking for. For example, say that Jesus could make the older brother give more inheritance to the younger - now what? Is that going to increase the love and affection between them? So, what does the demanding brother really want? Does he want a brother? Or more stuff/wealth to acquire and accumulate?

Jesus' parable about the greedy farmer who builds ever larger and larger barns, reminds all of us to be careful of how we interact with possessions in this life. When we gain, or increase holdings in our portfolio, we need to ask, "For what purpose, do I multiply and grow my accounts?" We have to remember that we aren't taking anything with us out of this world! What do they say, but that "No one ever saw a U-Haul follow a hearse to the cemetery"! Or an African proverb says "Death shrouds have no pockets!"

In Luke 12:15, Jesus says, "one's life does not consist of possessions" and then as Jesus ends the parable (Lk 12:21), He warns us not to "store up treasure for oneself but, rather, be rich in what matters to God." I understand this 'Wealth in what matters to God" as the same concept as what Jesus talks about in Matthew 6:20, when he advises us to "store up treasures in heaven." But we might ask, "What are these treasures in heaven? And how can we work for them?" I suggest that heavenly treasure is our investment made through 1) deeper devotion to God & 2) greater service of other human beings. I think about the guy who tells me that he likes to give away and loan out generously his tools to friends, but he knows where they are, and when he calls upon the person to use the tool again, he also draws in the person to help with his job, too! The tool's value is nothing compared to the bond with the friend and their future help. I think Jesus is telling us that relationships and good will, our experienced connection to God and other people will provide and get us through everything. Jesus calls us to invest more in bettering our relationship to God and each other. That is the true 'bond' market we should be spend our resources on! Invest in goodness! Toward God and our Neighbor! Treasure in heaven is our good life of faith & service to God & neighbor. Specifically, as Micah 6:8 sums it up, "do justice, love goodness, & walk humbly with your God."
