Women's History Month

During the month of March, a little extra attention is given to all of the amazing accomplishments of strong, determined women. Since 1987, the United States has formally recognized March as National Women's History Month. Every woman has a story to tell and gifts to share with the world. One such individual is Katherine Johnson.

Katherine Johnson, an African-American mathematician who made critical contributions to the space program at NASA, died Feb. 24 at the age of 101. Johnson became a household name thanks to the celebrated book "Hidden Figures: The American Dream and the Untold Story of the Black Women Mathematicians who Helped Win the Space Race," which later became a movie. Her legacy provides lessons for supporting women and other underrepresented groups in mathematics and science.

1. Mentors make a difference

While at West Virginia State, Johnson took classes with Angie Turner King. King taught Johnson as she worked to become one of the first African-American women to earn a Master's Degrees in math and chemistry. King taught Johnson geometry and encouraged her mathematical pursuits. Thirteen years older than Johnson, she modeled a life of possibility.

2. High school mathematics adds up

Mathematics concepts build on one another and the mathematics Johnson learned in high school helped her in her work at NASA many years later. She used these analytical skills to verify calculations for John Glenn's orbit around the earth and to help determine the trajectory for the 1969 Apollo 11 flight to the moon, among others.

Johnson modeled the stalwart characteristic of grit. In 1940, she agreed to serve as one of three carefully selected students to desegregate West Virginia University's graduate program. She also had to be "assertive and aggressive" about receiving credit for her contributions to research at NASA. In 1960, her efforts helped her become the first African-American and the first woman to have her name on a NASA research report.

4. The power of advocating for yourself

When NASA was formed in 1958, women were still not allowed to attend the Test Flight briefings. Initially, Johnson would ask questions about the briefings and "listen and listen." Repeatedly, she asked if she could attend and was eventually included in the briefings.

5. The power of a team

3. Grit matters

Johnson joined the West Computing Group where women "found jobs and each other." They checked each other's work and made sure nothing left the office with an error. They worked together to advance each other individually and collectively as they performed calculations for space missions and aviation research.

6. The power of women advocating for women

Dorothy Vaughan, then the West Computing department head and Johnson's former boss, insisted that Johnson's new boss, Henry Pearson, "either give her a raise or send her back to me." Pearson subsequently offered Johnson a substantial position and a raise.

7. The legacy of possibility

In March of 2014, movie producer, Donna Gigliotti, received a nonfiction proposal about African-American women mathematicians at NASA. Ultimately Gigliotti was instrumental in the making of the movie "Hidden Figures" and now an entire generation of young people are learning about the possibilities of math and science through the legacy of Katherine Johnson and others.
