## National Day for Truth and Reconciliation/Orange Shirt Day

September 30 is the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation in Canada. While this commemoration has not come about in the United States, we do well to take a look at the work done, and being done, by our neighbors to the north.

This day has been set aside by the Canadian government to honor the children who never returned home, survivors of residential schools, as well as their families and communities. Public commemoration of this tragic and painful history and the ongoing impact of the residential schools is a vital component of the ongoing reconciliation process.

Orange Shirt Day – also September 30 – is a commemorative day led by Indigenous communities to raise awareness about the intergenerational impacts of residential schools on children, families, and communities. It honors Indigenous children who were lost in the residential school system. The orange shirt symbolizes the loss of culture, freedom, and self-esteem that many Indigenous children experienced. This day reminds us that "Every Child Matters".

I highly recommend reading The Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Report (Canada) as well as The 94 Calls to Action. These documents are life-changing and if the government in this country has been slow to respond to the need for truth and reconciliation in our relationships with the Indigenous people of this land, it doesn't mean we have to be. These documents provide ample material for deep thinking, discussion, and calls to action.

Canadians view this day not as a holiday, but an opportunity. This day is an invitation to build relationship, and to continue the collective story on these lands in a better way. In commemoration of this day, and in recognition of our own needed work, I share the following list of books by Indigenous authors. They provide opportunities to hear a story, to understand an experience that is different than your own and different than the dominant story most of us have known all of our lives. I received this list from author Sarah Bessey. This is a list of spiritual books – please also consider exploring Indigenous history, poetry, political perspectives, children's books, memoir, and fiction.

## 10 Spiritual Books from Indigenous Leaders

- 1. First Nations Version: An Indigenous Translation of the News Testament and First Nations Version: An Indigenous Translation of Psalms and Proverbs (just released). Led by Terry M. Wildman (Ojibwe/Yaqui) and a council of twelve from various tribal heritages.
- 2. Shalom and The Community of Creation: An Indigenous Vision by Randy S. Woodley and Journey to Eloheh: How Indigenous Values Lead Us to Harmony and Well-Being by Randy and Edith Woodley
- 3. Native: Identity, Belonging, and Discovering God by Kaitlin Curtice. Curtice also has a new book which will release on October 7. It is called: Everything is a Story: Reclaiming the Power of Stories to Heal and Shape Our Lives
- 4. Becoming Kin: An Indigenous Call to Unforgetting the Past and Reimagining Our Future by Patty Krawec.
- 5. Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants by Robin Wall Kimmerer.
- 6. We Survived the End of the World: Lessons from Native America on Apocalypse and Hope by Steven Charleston (retired Episcopalian bishop and Choctaw Elder)
- 7. Unsettling The Word: Biblical Experiments in Decolonization edited by Steve Heinrichs. This is a collection of essays from more than 60 different Indigenous and Settler authors who are grappling with the Bible.
- 8. Rescuing the Gospel from the Cowboys: A Native American Expression of the Jesus Way by Richard Twiss.
- 9. Unsettling Truths: The Ongoing, Dehumanizing Legacy of the Doctrine of Discovery by Mark Charles and Soong-Chan Rah.
- 10. Wearing a Broken Indigene Heart on the Sleeve of Christian Mission by Carmen Lansdowne.
