- 16:00 The I-VI-II-V pattern played with dominant 9 and 13 chords.
- 17:20 Dominant 9 and dominant 13 are interchangeable.
- 18:54 The I-VI-II-V progressions are also called "rhythm changes."

19:25 Section Three - Skeleton form of the 12-bar jazz blues progression.

19:30 Combining the rhythm pattern with the blues

21:10 **Playdown #3**

Basic skeleton form

Play the jazz blues progression using the I-VI-II-V rhythm pattern twice after bar six.

23:45 Section Four

Adding the jazz walkdown at bars 7 and 8.

27:30 Playdown #4

Jazz blues progression with walkdown at bars 7 and 8.

28:54 Use the *walkdown* sometimes or every time. It's your creative choice.

29:38 Scale ideas

32:15 Section five

Use jazz substitution chords for the turnaround. (Bars 11 and 12.)

35:07 Playdown #5

With singing - Demonstrate the jazz blues progression using the walkdown at bars 7 and 8 and substitution chords at the turnaround.

36:28 Mix and match elements

37:20 Mix and match jazz turnarounds with rock turnarounds.

38:26 **Section six – Jazzy alternatives.**

38:30 Play ii minor 7 chords instead of dominant II chords.

41:23 Playdown #6

With singing - Demonstrate the jazz blues progression using the minor 7 chord instead of the dominant 13 at the walkdown and again at the turnaround.

47:41 Section seven - Playing in different keys.

43:30 Key of E

46:17 Cycle the rhythm pattern to get familiar with it.

46:58 Key of D

47:50 Key of C

50:03 Turnarounds – Bars 11 and 12

50:57 Practice switching from 9 to 13 and from 13 to 9.
