

- Earn higher grades and test scores
- Have better social skills
- Show improved behavior
- Graduate from high school
- •Go on to postsecondary education and careers.

Barriers to Parents Being Involved at School

- Language differences
- Cultural perceptions and misperceptions
- Time (work schedules and availability)
- Transportation
- Immigration issues
- No internet or computer at home
- Feeling not welcome at school
- Fear of being judged
- Information overload
- Basic needs and problems at home
- Historic perception of the school
