From the President's Aerie by, Betty Fisbeck

Did you know that ordinary people like you and me can contribute something to science? (You can now even join Audubon as a Citizen Science member.) One of the contributions any member can make is to participate in monitoring bird populations. The **Christmas Bird Count dates from** 1900 when a handful of birders began the tradition of recording species and their numbers in 25 circles around the continent. Today tens of thousands birders gather data in those same circles and 1900 additional sites. The Great Backyard Bird Count is only six years old but this data will become more valuable with each year. Project Feeder Watch is fifteen years old and collects data on feeder birds. All of these projects contribute to monitoring bird population patterns. So consider becoming a citizen scientist and joining the thousands of other birders in one of these projects. More information will be forthcoming.

At Feather Lake by, John Sproul

Our Feather Lake Wildlife Sanctuary is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux in El Paso, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave. It is open 8 a.m. to noon on Saturdays and 2 p.m. to dusk on Sundays. Admission is free. Some things to look for on your next visit:

- Late-October rains brought the water level to 3.56 feet on Nov. 2, the lake's highest level in several years. Feather Lake might have water all winter this year. That's good news for wintering water birds, but it complicates our plans to remove cattails from part of the basin this winter.
- The Feather Lake visitor center is a brighter place today, with new lighting both inside and out. Thank you, Charles Simpson and Jonathan Mims, for installing these latest enhancements to the visitor center!
- Look along the inner berm on the east side of the lake, near the middle, and you'll see a small, lonely stand of saltcedar. They're the last of their tribe. On October 5 and 12, Eagle Scout candidate Ben Connell and fellow scouts from Troop 2 removed most of the remaining saltcedar from the inner berm. Thanks, Ben! At Feather Lake, the end for this exotic tree is drawing near.

Volunteers staff Feather Lake during visitor hours. Want to help in this way? Contact John Sproul, 545-5157. Want to help with habitat-management at the lake? Join us for our next workday on Sat., Jan. 25. We'll start at 2 p.m., work a few hours, then enjoy the lake at the end of the day.


RIO BOSQUE WETLANDS PARK

El Lobo: Forum Focuses on Mexican Gray Wolf

On February 7-8, 2003, historians, wolfexperts, and ranchers will discuss the history and future of the Mexican gray wolf at a public forum in Las Cruces, New Mexico. "El Lobo" will open on February 7 with a keynote session at the New Mexico Farm and Ranch Heritage Museum. The session will feature Susan Flader, the historian, biographer of Aldo Leopold, and author of Thinking Like a Mountain; L. David Mech, the country's foremost wolf biologist and author of The Wolf: The Ecology and Behavior of an Endangered Species; and Caren Cowan, executive director of the New Mexico Cattle Growers' Association. On February 8, a day-long symposium at the Corbett Center auditorium, New Mexico State University, will include talks and a round-table discussion with leading environmental historians, biologists, policy-makers, environmental activists, and ranchers on both sides of the issue. Hank Fischer, Special Projects Coordinator for the National Wildlife Federation, will be the featured speaker at dinner. The event will be free and open to the public, although there is a charge for lunch and dinner. Seating will be limited, and advanced registration is required by January 24, 2003.

ON THE TRAIL

CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNTS

The El Paso/Trans Pecos Audubon Chapter calls upon volunteers in the El Paso area to join with birders across the western hemisphere and perticipate in one of Audubon's winter time traditions, the annual Christmas Bird Count (CBC). This years count will be the 103d.

Today, over 55,000 volunteers from all 50 states, every Canadian province, parts of Central and South America, Bermuda, the West Indies, and Pacific Islands count and record every individual bird and bird species seen in a specified area. During the 102nd CBC last year, about 52 million individual birds were counted. Last year saw a new record high of 1,936 individual counts. Each individual count group completes a census of the birds found during one 24 hour period in a designated circle 15 miles in diameter-about 177 square miles.

People are asked to contribute \$5.00 to help defray the expense of publishing "American Birds", This is the volume detailing all 1900 plus counts. The El Paso/Trans Pecos Audubon Chapter will cover \$3.00 of this for the Hueco Tanks and El Paso counts. Any questions call Bob (915) 757-1876 or Jimmy (505) 541-8083.

HUECO TANKS CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT

The first count in this area will be conducted in and around Hueco Tanks State Historical Park. Lets see if we can get over 65 species this year, a number that has been achieved only a couple of times since 1970. To accomplished this I will need at least 10-12 counters, *Please call and volunteer*. With the montane invasion this year it could be accomplished, during the Nov. monthly BIT for a period of 3 hours and only in the park we had 37 species, unusal were Stellar's Jay, Townsend's Solitair, and Mountain Chickadee.

CBC's will also be conducted in Bosque Del Apache NWR, Carlsbad, Gila, Guadalupe Mts., La Luz/Otero County, Loving, Portal, Roswell, Ruidoso and Silver City. The dates for these will be between December 14, 2002 and January 5, 2003, for information on whom and how to contact get in touch with Bob the Hueco Tanks compiler.

BOSQUE DEL APACHE NWR

One of the more popular National Wildlife Refuges in the country (there are over 500) is located about 180 miles north of El paso off of Interstate 25. How about 20,000 Snow Geese with a number of Ross's included, see if you can tell them apart, 12,000 Sandhill Cranes, 25,000 plus ducks and MANY Bald Eagles.

Start off your 2003 bird list with some great entrys. Last year 74 species were recorded on our trip, these included 15 waterfowl species, 8 Raptor and 3 grebe, also a number of passerines. The Refuge reported over 40 Bald Eagles, and we saw over 17 at one time in one water cell.

We are trying to arrange a tour in a large refuge van, so try to call Lois if you think you might attend, we need an approximate count.

You probably will see Snow Geese, maybe Canvasbacks, and some wading birds, perhaps Great Egrets, Longbilled Dowitchers.
