

Happy 104th Birthday, Florence

Florence Hirshon hates the way she looks right now. She prefers to have the "old" picture where she was "beautiful". But, Flo looks pretty good for having weathered two World Wars, the Depression Era and 104 winters and summers. The year Flo was born - 1913 - saw the invention of the modern zipper, the bra and crossword puzzles. She could not have seen a traffic signal until her 10th birthday and had to wait until she was 14 to taste Pez candy. Scotch tape didn't arrive until Flo was 17 and not until she was 21 could she play a game of Monopoly. Flo's memory is failing somewhat and she doesn't hear very well, but she loves to read and

to visit. The first of two children born to German immigrant Bruno Hirshon, she was born in Brooklyn NY on July 12th but her family

Brooklyn, NY, on July 12th but her family moved to California when she was eight years old and Flo never looked back. She says she lived "all over the place" but specifically remembers living in Hawaii three times and being in Los Angeles for a while.

Flo joined the Navy when the war broke out because her friends asked her to join with them. Her other choice was to go to



school, and she hated school. It was during the depression and she said she neither wanted nor could afford to attend college.

MWAN records show Flo joined the Navy in May 1943 and was discharged in October 1945 as an "SpX2". According to Flo, she made Chief Petty Officer just before she got out when the war was over. She added that she used to have that uniform but she "can't seem to find anything these days."

Her fondest - and possibly only - memory of being a WAVE was the dances. She loved to dance and said there were always "so many partners!" She said many of the sailors asked her to marry them, but she didn't want to choose, so she never married.

She doesn't recall much about her job in the Navy. The best she could recall was that she worked at a desk and couldn't wait to finish her work so she could go dancing.

After the war, she stayed in the Washington, DC, area and worked for the IRS for 6 years, but can't remember what happened after that. According to her niece Carol's husband, Dennis Kemp, Flo worked for the IRS most

of her life and lived in a small, studio apartment in Los Angeles until she retired and moved to a mobile home park. Dennis added that she loved to travel, often going to Mexico with friends. Flo's niece Carol, daughter of her deceased brother Harold, is her only living, blood relative.

Flo was given a pink ballcap and said she loved it because it said "Navy" and had a WAVES pin on it. Before the visit ended, Flo said she "woke up today ready to leave", but then she couldn't remember why. She then said she wanted to go to LA, but didn't know why she should go there in particular. The staff announced dinner and Flo apparently decided that having dinner was a better choice and off she went! What a lovely, little lady!

Presidential Ponderings

I continue to be amazed at how many Military Women do not know about the **Women in Military Service to America** (WIMSA) Memorial. Dedicated 20 years ago this October, the memorial was established by the U.S. government to honor women who have served in the U.S. Armed Forces.

Located at the entrance to Arlington National Cemetery near our nation's capital, the 33,000+ square-foot memorial features a curved, main gallery lined with 14 niches containing displays about the service of women in the military.

The memorial is maintained by the WIMSA Foundation which also operates the Memorial Education Center; manages an archive and research collection relating to women in the military; conducts an education program; and continues to register servicewomen past and present.

The Memorial's Register is perhaps the most significant and unique feature. Twelve computer terminals provide access to the register which contains names, details and some pictures of women who served in the U.S. armed forces from the American Revolutionary War through today's war on terror.



There's no charge to register - although donations are always appreciated. Those eligible to register include all US servicewomen - past, present and those who serve in the future, including deceased women veterans; Active Duty, Reserve, Guard and US Public Health Service uniformed women; and women in the Coast Guard Auxiliary and Civil Air Patrol. The Memorial also honors women who served overseas during conflicts, in direct support of the armed forces, in organizations such as the Red Cross, USO and Special Services; and members of the US Public Health Service Cadet Nurse Corps.

Deceased servicewomen from any era or those civilian women who served with other civilian organizations can be registered by family members, friends and organizations. Unfortunately, as of 2010 less than 10% of the 2.5 million eligible women were registered.

To help support the memorial, consider:

1. If you are not registered, sign up today

2. Register a friend or family member who is not registered.

3. Finally, consider a donation to accompany any registrations. Names currently on the register may be verified by calling 703-892-2606 or by using the contact form at womensmemorial.org. Registration may be completed online at womensmemorial.org.

This is our memorial. Please help keep it alive.

Volunteers Desperately Needed!

MWAN has had a member on the VAVS board for more than 20 years. However, we are in danger of losing that position. To have a member on the board we must have representatives volunteering in 25 VA medical treatment facilities. Due to the passing of some members and resignations from others, we currently only have 14 facilities with representatives.

Participation as a representative requires attending four (4) VAVS committee meetings locally per year and completing an Annual Joint Review. While it would be nice if the representative volunteered at the VA medical treatment facility on a regular basis, that is not a requirement.

Additionally, MWAN is one of only 20 organizations nationwide with a representative on the VAVS National Advisory Committee (NAC).

During the past 20 years, we have seen many improvements in the services offered to women veterans through the U.S. Veterans Administration, especially at medical treatment facilities. Having military women positioned as representatives on the local level and on the NAC have been instrumental in making these critical changes happen.

Military Women Around the World An essay by Pamela Elizabeth Slack

Driven. Determined. Courageous. Focused. Brave. Educated. Committed. All these things and more describe women.

I am the middle child in my family of three children. My life's dream is to become a physician, psychiatrist. My plan is to incorporate music with healing mental illness for both children and adults. This is not something widely done today. However, I have the courage to study then grow my practice in such a way that I become a pioneer of change in medicine. It is exciting to forge forward, implementing new solutions that will help heal people. I have had to pave the way in many areas in my young life already. For example, during my high school years, I have conquered honors classes and some college classes, been a team leader for the YMCA leadership camp, Youth Trust, and other organizations that have helped to build my character. Other community service activities also helped. I have volunteered at the local Food Bank, local nursing homes, returned to Get Charmed, A Charm School for Girls volunteering to assist other young ladies and supported various community events. These opportunities made me a dreamer that I will someday help people bring wholeness to their lives. Hopefully they will learn to love the life they live.

As I researched the 2017 topic for my essay, I thought to myself, "That's it!". That is what military women want also. They want to do their part in this world to help others love the life they live. There are various reasons a woman might serve in the military but ultimately it comes down to protecting the country she loves and its citizens. To do her part to help them live a safe, hopefully fulfilled life. On this topic, I had the pleasure of interviewing a woman I have known all of my life. My Aunt, Tracy Slack, has shown me over the years the importance of being a strong, independent, successful woman. However, I did not know all of her accomplishments and contributions to our country, The United States of America, until now.

Pamela's sponsor is her aunt LCDR Tracy L. Slack, U.S. Coast Guard (Retired) of Lemoore, CA.

She enlisted in the U.S. Coast Guard (USCG) in 1985 as a junior in college because a recruiter came to her school to spark interest in African Americans. At the time, the number of African American officers in the Coast Guard was extremely low. When she was commissioned, there were only four other black female officers on active duty in the entire Coast Guard. Being a double minority, they endured some very hard times getting and staying there with limited experience. However, she didn't let any of this stop her. Is she a pioneer? Yes, my aunt went on to graduate Officer Candidate School in 1986. She held all types of jobs while in the Coast Guard such as Marine Safety Officer, Commercial Vessel Inspector, Hospital Administrator, Medical Admin Director and Commanding Officer of Enlisted Personnel, to name a few. She got to travel the country with job locations in Washington, D.C., New Orleans, LA (where she met my wonderful Uncle Kenneth), San Diego, CA and Portsmouth, VA among other locations.

My Aunt is now retired. However, during our interview, listening to some of her experiences and about her network of friends, many of whom some have become like family, has given me more interest and respect for women in the military. My Aunt Tracy has made me so proud to be a young American woman. She told me that she had the honor of being the guest speaker for the first African American Female Officer to retire from the USCG. My Aunt Tracy went on to become the first African American woman to receive a Meritorious Service Medal in the USCG. Proud of her? Yes, I am! Inspired by her? Yes, I am! Just as I dream of being a pioneer of change in medicine, I see her as having been a pioneer of change in the military. She has paved the way for many generations coming behind her to follow.

After my interview with my Aunt Tracy, I was interested to know how her experiences and those of other woman in the USCG compared to women in the Japanese Coast Guard. I found out that in Japan, their Coast Guard recently tried to find new ways to have women join. There are about eight hundred women in the Japanese Coast Guard. Most of them are worried that they won't ever be able to grow their families or take care of the family they have already. This concern is because of the commitment and dedication they have to put forth in the Japanese Coast Guard. Despite all of the hard work the Japanese Coast Guard women do, in April 2016, reportedly there was no woman ranked higher than that of Coast Guard Station Head. This is unlike my Aunt Tracy who reached new heights in the US Coast Guard. However, female Japanese Coast Guard Officers are now beginning to take an active role in various work places. Some are captains, station chiefs and pilots.

That is a long way from 1979 when nine females became the first female students to enter the Japanese Coast Guard School. As of fiscal year 2015, the Japanese Coast Guard had 797 female officers out of a total of 13,400. In contrast, in the 1950s, the USCG Women's Volunteer Reserve was opened. Not until 1973 was the reserve ended and women were first officially integrated into the active duty Coast Guard and the Coast Guard reserve. Overtime, despite having concerns for raising their children and being away from family, females in the USCG can now be found in various ranks. For example, in 2016, the first African American female took command of Marine Safety Unit Chicago to command a Prevention/Marine Safety Unit/Office.

With this information, it showed me that women all around the world, no matter the culture, can endure some job challenges. Women play a massive part in protecting the world in various ways. They are nurturers, wives, mothers, grandmothers and encouragers, to name a few. With the load of all these titles and then proudly wearing the title of "Military Woman", their roles are reaching new heights and women are overcoming various barriers. Military women are becoming widely respected all around the world. They want to protect the country they love and its citizens.

My aunt believes that all "people should demonstrate some civic duty". She is so proud of how far the US Military as a whole has come. She looks forward to watching all of the branches of the military protect and serve as one.
