The timetable has changed and there will be significant changes to our weekday operation. As well as the time of services changing, many services also have different calling patterns. It is therefore going to be really important for customers, particularly regular travellers, to check the timetable before travel.

This is the biggest change in 40 years, and GWR will be watching closely to make sure all goes as smoothly as possible. Making changes is the culmination of Network Rail's investment in electrification and improved infrastructure, combined with investment in more staff and new trains.

PANGBOURNE ACTION FOR THE HOMELESS

The spirit of Christmas came to Pangbourne in November. In that month Pangbourne Action for the Homeless held two collections in aid of needy people in Reading. The first was on Saturday 9th November when six volunteers stood in the biting cold for an hour each. They were fund raising on behalf of Launchpad Reading and made £95.34, which was further increased by donations amounting to £110. These will be added to others at the food bank warehouse where parcels are being made up for many needy families at Christmas. This generous donation complements the regular gifts made throughout the year because the Co-op has a standing collection point available every day for donations. These are taken regularly to the warehouse where they are much appreciated and very necessary. Unfortunately the need for such support is increasing, not decreasing.

ACTION FOR PANGBOURNE TOILETS (APT) COMMUNITY TRUST

The latter half of 2019 has been a busy period for APT, particularly on the fundraising front and planned upgrades and as a result 2020 promises to be a year when significant improvements are made to the Station Road Community Toilets.

As reported in issue 152 APT was selected to be one of the charities supported by the Glastonbury festival and as a result we recently received £2,400 from them for which we were very grateful.

In October we were granted a New Project by the Good Exchange (Number 17267) to raise funds for our running costs for the next operational year (ie, October 2020 – September 2021). The Greenham Trust has also agreed to match fund the first £5,000 donated to this project. So, if you would like to support us please go to https://www.thegoodexchange.com and search for 'toilets' and any donation you make will be matched by the Greenham Trust.

On Friday 22nd November we were presented with a cheque from the Coop for £5,305 (see below) for being one of the three local charities that they had supported during the last 12 months. We were very pleased to be selected by the Coop for this scheme, and very grateful to all the Coop Members who nominated us as their chosen local charity. This was a project set up with the specific aim of raising money for the upgrading of the Disabled Toilet facility.

APT have received permission from West Berkshire Council (WBC) for the installation of a Public Drinking Fountain and Bottle Filling station on the outside of the toilets, near the car park ticket machine. This is being partly funded by Pangbourne & Whitchurch Sustainability (PAWS) group, who wish to encourage use of refillable bottles to reduce single use plastic bottles. APT has purchased the necessary components and will be installing it in early Spring, after the frostiest months!

WBC has also given APT permission to upgrade the Disabled Toilet. This requires moving the current wall between the Disabled Toilet and the Ladies Toilet (at the expense of one of the four Ladies cubicles) to ensure the space in the Disabled Toilet meets current standards. APT are seeking advice from the British Toilet Association (BTA) regarding fittings and fixtures to ensure we have a pleasant, good quality toilet, that meets all current recommendations, not only for those with physical difficulties but also those with cognitive impairments. The upgrade is expected to be done in the Spring.

We have been so successful with our 'upgrade' fundraising that we are considering bringing forward the Ladies toilet upgrade (previously scheduled for 2021) and implementing it at the same time as the Disabled Toilet. A decision will be taken early in 2020 after we have received quotes for the work.

Considerable work has been taking place on the 'shrubbery bed' between the toilets and the car park wall. Our thanks go to our Trustee, Lyn Higgs and Supporter, Ian Lewis who have been working with local people to clear and start replanting it. Golden Privet has been planted to form a low 'hedge' alongside the wall and skimmias have been planted alongside to provide a contrast. More work is planned for the Spring.

Finally, the toilets are well used with 80-90 users a day during the Summer months and we continue to get thanks from grateful users.

New City Photographic Society are our host, Milton Keynes is the venue. Same rules, different opponents this time, Stoke Poges and Woodley (car sharing?)


February 26th: Print Competition, Round 3




RHS

The short cold days mean that it's a quiet time on the allotments: a time to plan what and where to plant next year. This year, 21 people joined the National Society for Allotment and Leisure Gardeners (NSALG for short), which gives us access to legal and horticultural advice, insurance and heavily discounted seeds amongst other things. Two orders have already been received from King's Seeds, so we look forward to spring.

By the time this article appears, the last stretch of fencing should be completed round the allotments, so maybe some brave souls will risk planting sweetcorn again – having lost at least two years' worth to badgers/deer. The Parish Council has funded the fence, with a hefty contribution from the PAA thanks to The Good Exchange, Greenham Common Trust and some allotment holders. Plans are afoot to plant more hedging and trees along the line of the fence.

BEES IN WINTER

Today (6 December) my car temperature recorded 13 degrees Celsius. When I got home I saw that the bees were flying freely. Once the temperature is above say 8 degrees they will fly freely. Honey bees do not hibernate. Instead they cluster together, rotating from the inside to the outside a bit like Emperor penguins, so the coldest on the outer part of the cluster get a chance to be warmer nearer the centre where the queen and newly developing bees are. Today lots of them were out and it is always great to see. There is little for them to forage at this time of year so often their flights are to gather water (to dilute their honey) or for 'cleansing' flights. Soon the winter honeysuckles will be in flower and they will be on them. You can tell that they are alive and well by placing a hand over the opening at the top of the hive and feeling and smelling the warm current of air. Early days for this winter but so far all is well.



Pangbourne Valley Playgroup is happy to welcome the new management committee members as appointed at the Annual General Meeting held on the 21st of November 2019. Pangbourne Valley Playgroup is a non-profit, registered charity, managed by the local families whose children attend Playgroup sessions. It has been successfully run by the community for the community for the last 25 years and it continues to offer a much needed childcare

option for local families.

Pangbourne Valley Playgroup aims to enhance the development, education and welfare of children aged 2 to 5 through a wide range of activities and social experiences in a safe and happy environment with a "family atmosphere." The welfare, happiness and development of the children is at the heart of everything we do, and children just love going to the Playgroup. Pangbourne Valley Playgroup welcomes children from all backgrounds ensuring that they are integrated, support and develop their self-confidence through structured play and a variety of experiences.



At Pangbourne Valley Playgroup, children learn and gain their independence through play, the method that allows them to explore and make sense of the world around them, as well developing their imagination and creativity. The weekly activities include cookery, music, singing, painting, water play, craft and dressing up. There is a secure garden area where the children can play with a wide range of outdoor toys. In addition to this, there are a number of outings and visits organised throughout the year (e.g., library, park and allotments).



Pangbourne Valley Playgroup operates alongside the West Berkshire school term timetable, providing morning and afternoon sessions as well as lunch club from Monday to Friday. The charity is registered and regularly inspected by Ofsted (currently rated Good), and as a member of the Pre-school Leaning Alliance, its staff and members regularly review and update their skills and undertake any relevant training courses. In order to ensure the quality of the day care, a childcare development worker from the Early Years Development and Childcare Partnership pays regular visits to Pangbourne Valley Playgroup offering help and advice in all aspects of the pre-school.

Pangbourne Valley Playgroup is very fortunate to share the grounds with Pangbourne Primary School, which means that children get access to the well-planned and stimulating curriculum at the Foundation Stage 1 class offered five mornings a week during term time by Pangbourne Primary School to all 3-4 year olds. Our staff members have close relationships with the teachers from the school and support our children during the transition from pre-school to school. We offer a service to collect children from FS1 and bring them to Pangbourne Valley Playgroup for lunch club and afternoon sessions. Pangbourne Valley Playgroup provides 15 and 30-hour funded places to eligible children, with the possibility to split those with another provider (ie, FS1 Pangbourne Primary).



Y4 NEWBURY MUSEUM TRIP


'Take Over Museum Event' This was a fantastic trip where the pupils were able to take over Newbury museum and do presentations about artefacts to others.

Dan, who was shortlisted in the top 10 athletes, came in second place at the awards ceremony on Tuesday 19 November. He will be provided with a kit allowance by global sportswear brand Nike thanks to an ongoing partnership with SportsAid, and will receive £2,750.

The former Harbinger student dominated at major junior events in 2019 as he earned himself gold medals at both the Junior World and Junior European Championships in the K1 men's

200m discipline. He also swooped gold medals in the K1 men's 200m and the K2 men's 200m at the National Junior Championships this year, whilst tackling his A Levels at Pangbourne!

Dan was in fine company in terms of current nominees and past winners. Other athletes in the running this year included representatives from Taekwondo, Squash, Cycling, Boxing and Swimming, with ages ranging from 13 up to 19. Former winners of the award, launched in 2006, include Tom Daley, Amber Hill, Courtney Tulloch, and Morgan Lake.

The 18-year-old from Pangbourne commented on the assistance SportsAid has provided him so far, saying: "It's been a massive support – at the moment I don't have any other funding from my sport and sponsorship is quite hard to come by in kayaking. It allowed me to train more comfortably not really worrying about money. For me, kayaking is the sport I care about and love." He also discussed his wins earlier in 2019, saying: "The [world title] win was pretty eye-opening to be honest because it was the first time I'd thought to myself, 'wow, I can actually do this'. I am so happy that I could do it for all my coaches and the sport itself."

Dame Katherine Grainger presented the prizes on the night, much to the delight of the young athletes. Daniel said: "Meeting Katherine Grainger was amazing – she's done everything you can do in a sport and gone on to achieve all her goals and that's inspiring. This gives me the confidence to go on and do exactly what I want to do. I'm being recognised for my efforts and that gives you a bit of grounding and allows you to realise you're doing something substantial."

Everyone at Pangbourne College would like to congratulate Dan and continue to wish him well on his path to even greater achievements within the sport.

PANGBOURNE PLACE-NAMES

MARSH PLACE

Marsh Place is a development that was completed in 2005, built on the site of the former Marsh Farm Farmhouse. The house itself




Marsh Farm cowman's cottage in the 1930s (bottom right on the plan).

had fallen into disrepair in the 1960s and was demolished. The cowman's cottage and the milking parlour stood on the site of the Primary School, and all that now remains of the farm are the cottages, dating from 1730 and renamed in modern times Coach House Cottages.

Marsh Place recalls Pangbourne Marsh, an extensive area of marshy ground on the eastern side of our village bordering Sulham Brook. Marsh Place is on the north side of Reading Road, but on a map of 1840 the marsh is shown as only starting from the south side. This marsh stretched well up towards Tidmarsh, where in Anglo-Saxon times it may have been 'in common ownership' (Tid-).

There is on-going scholarly debate about the exact difference in place-names between *mersc* (marsh) and *mor* (moor), both of which feature in our village place-names. As the late Professor Margaret Gelling observes, the general tenor of English place-names suggests

that the Anglo-Saxons were much more aware than we are of the importance of drainage arrangements, and it would seem that, broadly speaking, a *mersc* represented more valuable agricultural land than a *mor*. This certainly appears to be borne out down to the present day in our own parish, where the land towards Sulham Brook, historically called *Pangbourne Marsh*, is more productive than the land beside the Tidmarsh Road, where many of our local *mor* names lie.

Further up the valley of Sulham Brook, beyond Sulham, the volume of water passing down that stream becomes less significant. This is implied in the name **Malpas**, Theale, which, unusually for a minor name, is of French origin. Meaning 'bad (Mal-) passage (-pas)', it seems certain that the reference is to marshy ground that was difficult to cross. The same was true at the marsh (*strod*) at **Stroud Green**, Greenham, so a route through it may have been marked by the stakes (*pil*) which led to **Pile Hill**.


There is a range of words in our area referring to areas of marshland in different conditions. The marsh was 'overgrown with brushwood' (*strod*) at **Stroud's**, Bradfield. At **Wash Common**, Newbury, simply called *Le Weshe* in a document of 1547, the low-lying ground was 'liable to flooding', and the same problem was encountered at **Wash Water Farm**, Enborne. **Laggs**, a field-name at Warfield, was a 'narrow marshy meadow by a stream'. Other unusual words for marshy or swampy ground are recalled at curiously colourful names in our area, like **Quab Hill**, East Hendred (*cwabba*), **Big and Little Gogs**, Sonning Town (*gogge*), **Snap**, Aldbourne (*snaep*), and **Van Place**, Eversley (*fenn*). At **Spring Galls Farm**, Swallowfield, there was a 'wet spot in a field' (*galla*), as too as **Gormoor Cottages**, Easthampstead, *Gall Moare* in 1607.

Slough presents an interesting problem. If one follows the Celtic linguists, the settlement takes its name from a granary, *ysleow*, that must have stood at the crossroads where in pre-Anglo-Saxon times the road to Windsor, the 21st century A332, met what is now the Great West Road. Later, not recognizing this word, the Anglo-Saxons took it to be *sloh*, meaning just a 'muddy place'. Only later did 'slough' develop a marshy meaning, as in the 'Slough of Despond' of Bunyan's *Pilgrim's Progress*, where it is a deep bog that Christian has to cross in order to get to the Wicked Gate. The original meaning of *sloh* is borne out by the closely related *sol* 'wallowing place for animals', as at **Grazeley**. Called *graegsole* in a document said to be dated 950, this was the wallowing place of a 'grey (*graeg-*)' animal, thought to be either a badger or a wolf.

On occasion, marshland is implied in the place-name, although not actually stated. At **Drayton** there was an estate (-ton) where sledges (Dray-) were used instead of carts, being no doubt easier to propel over the marshy ground on the land there by the Thames. **Cholsey**, 'Ceol's island', which is some way from the Thames, represents, not literally an island (eg, developed to –ey), but an area of dry ground in a marsh. Similarly, at Bucklebury, the curiously named **The Forty** is an 'island' (-y) standing out from surrounding marsh. It is thrust 'forth' (Fort-), lying on a spur of land between two streams. More colourfully, **The Bellows**, Sulhamstead, refers, not to some long abandoned piece of blacksmith's equipment, but to a narrow belt of marsh perceived as being shaped in that way.

As land has been drained over the centuries, it is difficult to comprehend that many areas were originally marshland whose condition is now only recalled in a place-name. **Marsh Farm** is surely a case in point.



ENVIRONMENTAL NEWS







I was speaking to someone who had been shopping yesterday, just for socks in Marks and Spencer, and came home with seven pairs of multi coloured socks packaged on a plastic ladder held together by a cardboard sleeve. Ten marks for no outer plastic covering, but minus ten marks for the moulded plastic unless of course Marks and Spencer make it clear that they will have it back and recycle it! I know many people are removing plastic packaging and leaving at the till, but is there a policy of reusing these moulded plastic hangers? The plastic problem does not just lie with bags and bottles, but with the infrastructure of modern packaging and marketing. We need socks, but we do not need to be seduced into buying them by the way they are displayed.

Extinction Rebellion? Love them or hate them? The press is having a field day as indeed is our Prime Minister, but by whatever means they are trying to bring our environment crisis to the heart of all decision making. Britain has already had a few days of all power being generated by renewables and our offshore wind farms are proving very successful. There is already a success story in some areas of renewables, but why is it not consistent? Why is it no longer financially viable for homeowners to install solar panels? Why is it not possible to have a consistent, equable recycling policy across the country avoiding the frustration many people feel about recycling because they do not have the knowledge or provision to avoid their waste going into landfill?

PAWS continues to investigate alternative recycling projects. Many thanks to Jathan who organised a trip to Ardley. This is his report:

"At the beginning of September a group of PAWS members visited the Ardley Energy Recover Facility near Bicester in Oxfordshire which was built in 2014. The location is a significant archaeological site, and we saw within the grounds the longest run of dinosaur foot prints in Europe of a type of megalosaurus. (The one in the picture by the way is a life-size model made completely of rubbish.)

The group was shown round the plant by Education and Visitor Centre Officer Susan Benson. After an introductory briefing at the visitor centre we were escorted to parts of the plant. The 'bunker' is where unrecyclable domestic and business waste is lifted by giant grabbers, rather like an oversized amusement game, onto conveyors. The facility treats 326,300 tonnes of non-recyclable waste each year, diverting more than 95% of Oxfordshire's residual municipal waste away from landfill. There are two lines of waste flow into the incinerator furnace which is burnt at over 850°C. The heat drives a turbine producing up to 30MW of electric power. (The cooling towers apparently house peregrine falcons which can sometimes be seen flying from their nest.) The remaining waste output is processed into gases including carbon monoxide which are processed and released to the atmosphere under Environment Agency supervision and solids which are turned into a form of limestone used for building materials. This was a fascinating visit, looking at a method of energy recovery and waste disposal – a 'less bad' option until we can make our economy more fully circular with respect to processing our rubbish. Enjoying a break in the rain about thirty people joined in, bringing apples from gardens and collected from fallen apples on the roads and paths around the area. Nature's bounty was not overlooked and instead of wasting we were able to take home bottles of extremely sweet apple juice.

The Barn Dance provided an evening of fun and relief from the weather raising money for the drinking water fountain to be installed by Action for Pangbourne Toilets. Thank you to all who came, to those organising the food and to the band for a lovely evening's music and dancing.

In November we spent an evening looking at the history of the electric car. Did you know that



from 1899 to 1920 the electric car dominated the market, certainly in the USA, but fell out of favour when the self-starter was invented allowing petrol cars to be started without the crank handle? This coincided with the new love affair for cheap oil.

Fast forward to the 1990s when General Motors spent over \$1 billion producing a fleet of electric cars which by 2005 were mysteriously withdrawn and shredded. Why? There were many potential suspects: the power of the oil moguls, US state politics, fear of change, lack of demand? We don't know but the few thousand customers who did manage to lease one maintained that it was the best car they had ever driven; they had to see their cars reclaimed and destroyed. Where might we be now if this story had ended differently?
