Love Your Neighbor: Concrete Actions or Abstract Notions

This is a continuation of the teaching of Jesus that began in Matthew 22:34-38. A lawyer asked Jesus this question:

"Teacher, which is the great commandment in the Torah?"

This is the answer Jesus gave him:

"You shall love Yahweh your Elohim (God) with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind."

This is the first and great commandment.

And then Jesus added (Matthew 22:39):

And the second is like it: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

In the exploration of Matthew 22:34-38, I discussed the popular style of teaching Jesus used called "<u>remez</u>" ("<u>hinting</u>"). He hinted at Deuteronomy 6:4-6 to make his points. This time he is hinting at Leviticus 19:13-18, which I call, "<u>The Neighbor Code</u>." We will need to watch for "*you shall love your neighbor as yourself*" in that context.

I will use a typical English translation, except when the name of God appears.

- "13 You shall not cheat your neighbor, nor rob *him*. The wages of him who is hired shall not remain with you all night until morning. 14 You shall not curse the deaf, nor put a stumbling block before the blind, but you shall fear your Elohim: I *am* Yahweh.
- **15** You shall do no injustice in judgment. You shall not be partial to the poor, nor honor the person of the mighty. In righteousness you shall judge your neighbor. **16** You shall not go about *as* a talebearer among your people; nor shall you take a stand against the life of your neighbor: I *am* Yahweh.
- **17** You shall not hate your brother in your heart. You shall surely rebuke your neighbor, and not bear sin because of him. **18** You shall not take vengeance, nor bear any grudge against the children of your people, but you shall love your neighbor as yourself: I *am* Yahweh."

Once again we find a list of "<u>concrete actions</u>," not "<u>abstract notions</u>." In order to "<u>do this love</u>," people must do the following. This time I will translate the ancient meanings of the Hebrew words:

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- 1. You shall not "defraud, oppress, be cruel, or slander" your neighbor.
- 2. You shall not <u>rob</u> him "<u>the wages of him that is hired shall not abide with you all night</u>" until the morning.
- 3. You shall not "curse, insult, speak evil of" the deaf.
- 4. You shall not put a **stumbling block** before the blind.
- 5. You shall **fear** your Elohim.
- 6. You shall do no "unfaithfulness, wrong, unjust, perversity" in judgment.
- 7. You shall not **respect** the person of the **poor** in judgment.
- 8. You shall not **honor** the person of the "**mighty**, **great**" in judgment.
- 9. You shall in "loyalty and faithfulness" judge your neighbor.
- 10. You shall not go up and down as a "<u>talebearer</u>, <u>detractor</u>, <u>whisperer</u>, <u>slanderer</u>" among <u>your people</u>.
- 11. You shall not "stand against, be a false witness" the "blood, life" of your neighbor.
- 12. You shall not **hate** your brother in your heart.
- 13. You shall "earnestly, openly, certainly" "rebuke, lecture" your neighbor.
- 14. You shall not "suffer, bear, incur" sin because of him.
- 15. You shall not "take vengeance, make attempts to get equal with, seek revenge," nor "bear any grudge" against the children of your people.
- 16. You shall "love your neighbor as yourself."

In order to "<u>love your neighbor as yourself</u>" (#16), you must do the 15 things that came before it. In Hebrew they appear in the form of what we call a <u>parallelism</u>. Below is an example. #12 and #13 are written in parallel to each other.

- Line 1: You shall not hate your brother in your heart.
- Line 2: You shall "earnestly, openly, certainly" "rebuke, lecture" your neighbor.

Lesson:

If you do not correct your neighbor when he sins, you will hate your brother in your heart.

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This teaching of Jesus has listed **27 things** people can "**do to love God and their neighbor**."

But Jesus hasn't finished the lesson yet. In Matthew 22:40 he says:

"On these two commandments hang all the Torah and the Prophets."
