Brothers and Sisters,

May God's grace give us the necessary peace, joy and patience to love our neighbors.

This comic is amusing but not quite right. Yes, the church is a hospital for sinners, but the pastor is not the physician. Jesus is the physician. The pastor is more like the receptionist or nurse who directs people to the Great Physician.

Welcome to part one of the four-part series, "The Four Ways to Understand Church." In part one, we look at the church as a hospital for sinners. Next month, we will look at the church as a holy family, then, in January, we will look at the church as a non-violent army. We will end the series in February by looking at the church as a worshipping community. To effectively obey the two great commandments (Matthew 22:37-40, Mark 12:28-34 & Luke 10:25-28) and great commission (Matthew 28:18-20), the local congregation must look upon itself as a hospital for sinners, a holy family, a non-violent army, *and* a worshipping community.



When the religious leaders asked Jesus why He was spending time with tax collectors and sinners, what we might call the dregs of society, Jesus replied, "It is not the healthy who need a doctor but the sick." (Matthew 9:12, Mark 2:17 & Luke 5:31) Whether we admit it or not, we all need to be healed of a sinful nature. If you ever had an unloving thought, uttered an unloving word, or committed an unloving act, you have sinned and are infected with a sinful nature. We go to church to be healed of this sinful nature by Jesus.

This healing is a process. Just as it takes several doses of chemotherapy to heal a person of cancer, it takes a lifetime of being in a relationship with Jesus to be healed of our sinful nature. As we develop our friendship with the Lord Jesus, our sinful nature fades away. As time goes by, we discover that the fruit of the Spirit (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, faithfulness and self-control) dominates our hearts more and more and things like hatred, racism, greed and selfishness dominate our hearts less and less. This is the sanctification process whereby the Holy Spirit changes our hearts, so we become more loving like Christ. The Holy Spirit changes our hearts through the 'Means of Grace' (Bible study, prayer, worship, fasting, serving others.)

So, a local congregation that thinks of itself as a hospital for sinners would emphasize evangelism and discipleship. Evangelism occurs when people tell their stories about how Jesus changed their lives. Inviting people to church so they can meet Jesus is also part of evangelism. Discipleship provides the opportunity for people to develop a deeper relationship with Christ. A discipleship program consists of Bible studies, small groups, worship services, prayer gatherings, and opportunities to serve. A local congregation that thinks of itself as a hospital for sinners emphasizes evangelism and discipleship because everyone needs to be healed by the Great Physician Jesus.

To be a hospital for sinners, the local congregation must welcome all people. Like the emergency room in a medical hospital, the church must care for any person in need. However, unlike the emergency room, the church must provide its best care to both the insured and uninsured. Remember James 2:9, "But if you show favoritism, you sin and are convicted by the law as lawbreakers."

To be a hospital for sinners, the members of the local congregation must also practice patience with each other. Since we are all in the process of being healed of our sinful nature, we still might mistreat one another. When this happens, we must repent, forgive, and patiently pray for each other. This is why the first word to describe love in 1 Corinthians 13:4 is patient.

So, for us to be an uncommon church for common people, we must be a hospital for sinners. We must also be a holy family. I will write about that in December's Beacon Article.
