

"Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out."



He said: Hello, my name is Conrad M and I am an alcoholic.

Here we are at step 11 and here's my take on it. I've read that in the beginning of AA in Akron, Anne Smith (Dr. Bob's wife) would have a sunrise or morning prayer and meditation meeting at their house daily. It sounds like a great way to start the day and for the early AA's to connect and get prepared and focused for the day ahead. It wasn't mandatory, but they would all show up. For those involved, including Bill W, they all found it very helpful.

In the Big Book and 12x12, a lot of emphasis is put on this Step to help us realize the importance of prayer and meditation. This is the most important thing we can do daily to help stay focused, balanced and closer to our HP.

I'm a skeptic. I had a lot of "religion" baggage that kept me at arms length from really embracing this Step. I started to pray very cautiously, on my knees at first, mainly asking for the pain and insanity to be relieved. Eventually it was.

Then I progressed to my version of "humbly asking" and thanking my HP for the grace given to me.

Time went on and I began to incorporate meditation into my routine. Honestly, I found it hard at first to focus and relax. It took some time and practice but eventually I found my groove and was able to get some meaningful meditation time in. For me it took a while and I slip in and out of my routine. When I do get the groove back I always feel better and closer to the group and my friends.

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She said: There are as many ways to connect with our higher power as there are people on the planet. As a matter of fact, there are as many concepts of a higher power as there are people seeking this connection. The best part? We get to choose!! I don't know what it was like was for you, but when I first learned that I get to choose the God of my understanding, I was elated. What a freedom!! My understanding of my higher power has morphed over the years as I have grown and changed. I have always believed in "something" yet it wasn't necessarily always loving, nor did it feel personal to me. One of the only guidelines that I received early on in my steps was that my higher power MUST be a loving God. I have used many words to identify my higher power as I have prayed and meditated over the years. I used to get hung up on the word "God", however what I have come to understand is that it absolutely does NOT matter what I call this higher power, the point is that I CALL it!

The most practical and simple way to achieve this connection is through prayer and meditation. Having a choice of what this looks like for me has allowed me to try several different techniques. How fun, baffling and sometimes frustrating it has been to try all these different methods. Yet, they always brought me into myself to connect with my higher power. I no longer have to go "out there" to make a connection. I have a direct connect. I cherish the connection I have created and I personally need to nourish it each and every day. Generally, my prayers consist of asking for guidance and how I can be of service. I no longer feel the need to negotiate terms to get me out of trouble this one last time. No more fox hole prayers of

November in Our History:

~ Highlight for this Month ~

November 21, 1939: The first AA Meeting on the west coast of the United States was held in a small room at the Cliff Hotel, San Francisco, California. Ray W., a New Yorker, was in this area for a sales course. He was given the names and phone numbers of Ted C., Dave L. and Don B. by our "Alcoholic Foundation Office" in New York (now called the General Service Office). Before he left for California all three showed up for this first meeting. Bill W. vividly describes this historic meeting in our book "AA Comes of Age".

November 25th, 1846: "Carrie Nation", born Amelia Moore in Grand City, Kentucky, lost her entire family and two husbands due to alcoholism. She became violently opposed to alcohol and as a young woman began leading raids on saloons throughout the western states, destroying all establishments that sold alcohol.

November 26th, 1895: Born to Gilman and Emily Wilson, East Dorset, Vermont, our co-founder Bill W.

November 1936: Bill W. and Hank P. found Fitz M. in Towns Hospital and gave him the message of sobriety. From this time on the two became a trio.

November 11th, 1940: The first 'Box 459" was mailed out to approximately 155 known groups from our New York Office (later re-named "The General Service Office").

November 1st, 1947: The first Alaskan Group is registered with our "New York Office", "The Sourdough Group" Anchorage.

November 3rd, 1975: Neil Wing, Bill W.'s longtime secretary, formally opened the AA Archives at our General Service Office in New York. From 'Big Book Dave', Elected Archivist, Interior Alaska ~ Submitted by Mathea A.



In Alcoholics Anonymous November is commonly known as gratitude month. Every year the District hosts an Annual Gratitude Luncheon to acknowledge and thank members of the community who support and assist AA. These members could be a pastor at the church where your home group has meetings, the county worker who sweeps the pavilion, a parole officer or judge who refers people to meetings, or a Dr. who allows us to place pamphlets in their offices. The idea is to let the people who cooperate with AA know how much we appreciate them and to give them an opportunity to see recovery in action. Some people who work with or are affected by practicing alcoholics never get to see that we do recover. The Gratitude Luncheon is a great opportunity for us to show our appreciation to the community that supports us and an opportunity for them to see how our lives are transformed by AA. This year the Gratitude luncheon is being hosted and organized by Happy Hour and Sunrise Sobriety. The luncheon will take place at Sun Village on November 9th from 10:30-1:30. To attend, ask your home group to purchase a table for \$100 at 10 seats per table. Invite members from the home group and members from your community that your home group would like to honor for their service to AA. Last year's luncheon was a huge success. We had 5 honorees and approximately 50 AA members in attendance. The food was fantastic and we had a great speaker. We hope you can attend and continue to make the Gratitude Luncheon a wonderful event! As we must continue to take personal inventory to maintain our emotional sobriety, we must take inventory at the

district level. Why do we do this? We do this to see if there are any areas within our District that could use improvement while we are carrying the message of AA. How does the inventory happen? There are 14 proposed inventory questions recommended by our General Service Office. Each GSR will pick 2 questions out of a hat and bring those questions to their home group. The home group will discuss the questions and the GSR will bring the group conscience back to the District and we will discuss them as a group. Some of the questions include: 1. What is the basic purpose of the District Committee? 2. What additional activities can we engage in, to carry the message? 3. Considering the number of alcoholics in our district, are we reaching enough people? 4. What has the District done lately to bring the AA message to the attention of professionals who can be helpful in reaching those who are in need of AA? These are the types of questions we ask ourselves so we do not become complacent in our efforts to carry the message to the alcoholic who still suffers. When these questions are brought up at my home group, there is usually someone there who has never heard of service at the District level. When someone asks, "what is the District Committee", it gives our group an opportunity to discuss it and we all become more informed. If we are continuously uninformed, service at the Group and District level suffers. It creates apathy and we lose our enthusiasm. There is no better way to carry the AA message than with enthusiasm. When your GSR approaches your group with the inventory questions, please give them your support and attention. Just as are our personal inventory is for our own spiritual growth, the District Inventory is for the spiritual growth of our entire District. The feedback your GSR brings from the home group to the District will then be shared at the Area level at the Inventory Assembly in January. This will give our entire state an opportunity to assess how well we are carrying the message to alcoholic who still suffers. Thank you all so much for your service and for the participation we have throughout the island. At the last District Meeting there were 20 members present. There is so much enthusiasm and excitement to carry the message of AA. It's a privilege and an honor to serve as your DCM. Please come join us every 3rd Saturday at the Lihue Neighborhood Center at 9:30 am. Everyone is welcome, please come join us and find out what it's about!
