The Rector writes

Dear Friends

I wonder if you have ever waited anxiously for something to arrive. Maybe it's a gift you have ordered for someone for a special occasion? Maybe it's a significant day in your calendar like a holiday or a birthday or a concert for which you have tickets? Maybe it's a wedding or the birth of a child and there's a sense that when this day arrives things will never be the same again.

As Christians journey through the season of Lent it can seem like a long season. Although the days are getting brighter, the weather is often cold and wet. You perhaps miss those little creature comforts you may have given up for Lent. You long for the day you believe to be significant, the dawn of Easter and all that the day means and symbolises in human experience. As we look forward to that day, I wonder what it means for you or to you? Is it about an opportunity to get together with family and friends? Is it about hope breaking through after a season in the wilderness? Is it about light breaking through the darkness or about Jesus rising from the dead? What difference does this make to our ordinary everyday lives in 2025? What impact might it have on our children or grandchildren?

If you've never thought much about it before or attempted to explain it to someone else, it can be a bit tricky to unpack. When I talk to other people who know what I do, they are conscious in many cases that Easter is a busy time in the life of a church. When I try to describe it, I usually talk about it as an experience. If you have always lived your life without any reference to God or Jesus it doesn't necessarily make a great deal of sense to you. It's only when you come along and try to understand it and why it might be significant, that things start to happen that might be hard to explain.

In the life of our church, Easter is quite an immersive experience. We can't force anyone to come on the journey but if people engage with the events of the last week of Jesus' life (what we usually call Holy Week) they rarely remain unmoved and often they are changed.

Why not come to something during Holy Week ($13^{th} - 20^{th}$ April)? Please see our list of services and events on page 5. These will not only reflect on some of the key moments in that week for Jesus of Nazareth and their significance, but they will also offer an opportunity to think about our own lives.

We will be welcoming guests to come and share something of their journey from Psalm Sunday to Easter Day. They might describe the difference it has made to have a sense of God's presence or what their life looks like as a result of that decision to follow Jesus.

On Good Friday we have a special creative morning starting at 10.30am for people of all ages (see page 17) and in the afternoon a special quiet meditative service starting at 2.00pm.

On Easter Day there will be a celebration of Holy Communion at 10.30am. (Continued on page 5)

SEVERN VALLEY COUNTRY PARK

Over the winter, our volunteers have been working on an artificial Kingfisher nesting bank as an addition to our wetlands. Chairman Dave Hack and volunteer Paul Wright have kindly told us more about the project.

"The Kingfisher nesting bank has been dedicated to the memory of volunteer Colin Jevons who sadly passed away in December 2024. Colin played a key role in the project and will be sadly missed by all at the Country Park.

Some years ago there were discussions between volunteers and rangers about creating an artificial kingfisher nesting bank at the back of the wetland pool. Unfortunately the pandemic came and other projects took precedence. The idea was shelved until early 2024 when it was revisited, mainly due to the fact that kingfishers were continually present in the wetlands.

An initial investigation was conducted by volunteer Colin Jevons who presented his findings to the volunteer committee in April and it was agreed the volunteers would fund the project if it was determined to be feasible. Colin was tasked with further research, and aided by Mal Groombridge, a detailed design and associated costs were presented to the committee. The go-ahead for the project was given in September 2024. Building started the following month with Colin as the project lead, and it was completed at the end of February 2025, just in time for kingfisher mating season. The build was the most difficult the volunteers have undertaken at the Park and it was not helped by the very wet weather conditions, especially to the deteriorating track used to transport the materials into the wetlands. The build consisted of 15 tons of sand, some of which was mixed

with 375kg of cement to fill over 250 sandbags. Three cement boards (1200mm x 800mm) were fitted to the front of the nesting bank with 2 access holes connected by man made tunnels to 2 terracotta nest chambers. These were all supported by aluminium and recycled plastic frameworks. The top was completed with hardwood chippings, topsoil and a scattering of grass seed.

The total manual effort was in excess of 600 volunteer hours, plus significant time and effort from Guy Border, the ranger who moved the 15 tons of sand from delivery point to the build area. It is now a case of fingers crossed and hope that all the volunteers and rangers efforts result in kingfishers nesting in the man -made nesting bank."

During April, the cafe and visitor centre will be open Wednesday to Sunday and the toilets will be open daily. The boat play area should reopen in April. All the new equipment is in the ground and the fencing has started to be installed with the new all-weather surface going in at the end of March.

During April, our car park costs will be changing. It will be £2.50 to park, however long you are staying. Parking is still free before 10am and after 4pm as our charging hours will remain 10am-4pm. In addition, the annual car parking permit will be increasing from £35 to £45. The permit lasts 12 months from the day of purchase and covers parking for 2 vehicles at our Alveley and Highley car parks. If you buy an annual permit, and visit us at least once a week, your parking cost will be the equivalent of 87p per visit. All income generated from car parking costs does help maintain the high standards at the Country Park

SUSTAINABILITY NEWS

Bridgnorth held its first Repair Café on 1st March (10am - 1pm) at St James's Church Hall, focusing on fixing small electrical items and textiles. 29 items were successfully repaired on the day. Attendees had the option to enjoy a cuppa and a biscuit while their item was being fixed, or to learn how to repair it from the volunteer. Repair Cafés help reduce landfill waste, save money, and share skills. The plan is to hold these events quarterly at first, with the possibility of increasing their frequency if there is enough demand. 'Pantry Severn' at Lasyard House is a new low-waste refill shop in Bridgnorth, taking over from 'Our Green Shop'. They will be offering a range of products (including organic and locally supplied) to refill your pantry without extra packaging. They will be open weekdays from 10am to 6pm (5.30pm on Mondays), with a convenient car park outside. Furthermore, they will soon be opening an in-house deli, offering lunches made with locally sourced ingredients.

For their March meeting, Sustainable Bridgnorth held a film showing of 'The Economics of Happiness'. This award-winning and inspiring documentary explains the social, spiritual, and environmental costs of globalisation, while also showing the many advantages of focusing on local economies. The hourlong full or 20 minute abridged versions can be watched for free on YouTube. April 22nd is Mother Earth Day. Countries that are part of the Paris Agreement will soon share their updated climate plans, known as Nationally Determined Contributions. Experts believe these plans could lead to significant green growth and attract trillions of dollars in investment. They could also help reduce poverty, improve health, boost food security, and increase access to energy. Additionally, the 196 countries that agreed to the Convention on Biological Diversity (including Russia but not the US) have pledged to raise at least \$200 billion (£155 billion) annually by 2030. This funding will support developing nations in their efforts to protect biodiversity.

HUMANS IN SHROPSHIRE

The earliest prehistoric evidence of humans in Shropshire are some scrapers and other implements made of local pebble flint. They are found chiefly in the Worfield, Claverley and Alveley parishes. They probably date from around 4000 BC and would have been used by semi-nomadic tribes of hunter-gatherers. By about 2000 BC there were settled communities in most parts of Shropshire and there is plenty of evidence of these bronze age people. Stone circles, burial mounds called barrows and dug-out canoes have been found. The most visible evidence in Shropshire are the county's 25 or so hill forts. These were really more hill towns and became prominent in the Iron age around 600 BC. There is one on the Wrekin which would have held around a 1000 people and another on the Brown Clee. Shropshire would have been ruled by the Wrekin tribe called the Cornovii. However in AD 43 the Romans arrived and by about AD 50 they were in the West Midlands and by AD 57 were establishing their base at Wroxeter. The indigenous Britons were gradually pushed westwards and it is believed that the ancient Cornish and Welsh languages along with that of the Bretons in Brittany and the now extinct Cumbrian language are all derived from the original Celtic language. The Romans were writers so we have a good idea where they lived and what they did. Julius Caeser mentions Jesus and the Druids on Anglesey but not Alveley, although we know they were in the region with a small base at Chesterton near Worfield and a river crossing near Quatford.

When the Romans went back to Italy in 460 AD to sort out their own problems the vacuum was filled by the Anglo-Saxons and we enter the Dark ages so called because they didn't write anything down so we're in the dark about what they got up to. We do know that around 690 AD Christianity had reached Shropshire and the monastery at Much Wenlock was established. Then in 1066 the Normans invaded and at last we got some good records. In 1086 William the conquerer sent out his clerks (scriveners) to document the lands and the people and their possessions. Our village is called Alvidelege, there were 13 households consisting of 8 villagers (with wives and children presumably 4 smallholders with the same and one priest. There were 9 ploughlands. A ploughland is the area of land ploughed for sowing crops such as wheat and would be about 15 acres. There was 6 acres of meadows and some woodland. 6 Men's plough teams and 2 Lords plough teams. A plough team was normally about 8 oxen tied together in pairs.

Oxen are simply male cattle castrated to calm them down to become workable. The Lord at the time was one Earl Algar, a saxon, and he is recorded as having 155 places before the conquest and 0 afterwards. His father was Leofric, Earl of Mercia, and his mother was Lady Godiva. She who rode through the streets of Coventry naked after her husband said if she did so he would not raise taxes on the locals. The other person mentioned is Earl Roger of Shrewsbury. He had 0 properties before the conquest and 281 afterwards. He was given these for helping William. His son was Robert de Belleme who built Bridgnorth castle without the King's permission and had it taken off him and given to Guy LeStrange, another of the Kings favourites. It was he who founded St Mary's in 1140. There are 3 more pieces of evidence. Alveley derives from Alvidelege which comes from Aelfythes ley a saxon woman's name. (a ley is a field or clearing). The layout of buildings at the top of the village suggests that it started as a small saxon settlement. The Saxons were builders in wood and there was probably a church, the head man's house with farm attached and a few of his followers living close by all inside a small enclosure or stockade roughly the size of the upper churchyard and the car park in front of the church. Livestock would have to be brought in at night as there were still wolves and bears in the huge forest that surrounded the village. The buildings would have been single story and about the size of a large garage but as local squabbles settled down a village would start to expand and I suspect if we could dig underneath the nearby farms we would find evidence of original saxon settlements. And finally, the landscape around Lowe Lane and the farm there show signs of being the most ancient in the parish. Many of the fields have banked boundaries and there is evidence of old ridges and furrows in these fields. The name 'Lowe' derives from the Anglo-Saxon 'Hlaw' which means a burial mounds, tumulus or barrow. This place is therefore associated with the earliest Anglo-Saxon occupation of the area.



Also 150 years ago, on 17th April 1875 the game of snooker was invented by Neville Chamberlain, a British army officer stationed in India.

100 years ago, on 10th April 1925 F Scott Fitzgerald's novel *The Great Gatsby*, was published.

80 years ago, on 30th April 1945 Adolf Hitler, Austrian-born German Nazi Party Leader, Chancellor of Germany (1933-45) and dictator (1934-45) committed suicide along with his wife, Eva Braun.

70 years ago, on 5th April 1955 Prime Minister Winston Churchill announced his retirement because of failing health. He was succeeded by Anthony Eden on 7th April.

65 years ago, on 1st April 1960 Dr Martens boots went on sale in the UK.

50 years ago, on 4th April 1975 Microsoft, the computer software/hardware company, was founded by Bill Gates and Paul Allen in Albuquerque New Mexico.

Also 50 years ago, on 23rd April 1975 US President Gerald Ford gave a televised speech in which he announced that the USA's involvement in the Vietnam war was over, and all US aid to South Vietnam had ended. The war itself ended on 30th April, when North Vietnamese forces captured the South Vietnamese capital Saigon.

40 years ago, on 23rd April 1985 the Coca-Cola Company changed the formula of Coca-Cola and launched it on the market as New Coke. The public were out-raged, and the original formula was restored within three months.

25 years ago, on 12th April 2000 that Queen Elizabeth II awarded the Royal Ulster Constabulary the George Cross in recognition of its collective and sustained bravery during the Troubles in Northern Ireland.
