



## **POSTLUDE**

Karl Kloster, 84, educator, father, husband, went to be with his Savior on Easter Sunday, April 20, 2025. Survived by Noreen (wife of 61 years); daughter, Cami (Jonathan) of Honolulu; son, Cary (Shaughna) of Seattle; grandchildren, Saul (Honolulu), Tessa (Seattle); sister, Karen (Dan) of Marysville.

Karl spent his first 10 years in rural Idaho. Then his family moved to a small dairy farm in Marysville where his father also worked in the sawmill. Karl was active in 4-H and FFA from ages 10-18.

Karl attended Everett Junior College (Everett Community College) prior to graduating from Western Washington State College (Western Washington University) where he met Noreen. He went on to get his Masters in Education and Curriculum Development from Seattle University.

Karl began his teaching career in the Edmonds School District at Mountlake Terrace Junior High. At Christmas of his first year of teaching, he and Noreen

married. He moved on to the newly opened Alderwood Junior High and helped open Brier Junior High. After 14 years of teaching, the family moved into the house they built on acreage in Marysville. Karl taught at Marysville Junior High for 16 years, rounding out his first 30 years of teaching. He loved teaching and was able to finish his career in education by teaching math for 20 years at Everett Community College.

Karl's hobbies were gardening and fishing. He liked coaching and helping others. He was happy to move into independent senior living at Woodland Terrace in Bothell, taking part in several activities. His quick wit and sense of humor were appreciated, as well as his friendly and calm, caring nature.
