Middle School News

Sixth Grade News

Grade 6 Social Studies: Students have just completed their unit on Ancient China (chapter 5). Our next unit will be on Ancient Greece - home of the Parthenon, mythology, and the Olympics. The next time you and your child are watching and reading about sports, lead a discussion about the Olympics.

Grade 6 Literature: We have read up to chapter 25 of Jennifer Nielsen's *The Shadow Throne*, in which King Jaron of Carthya is trying to protect his country from the combined forces of Avenia and the Pirates. Ask your child whether they think Jaron is a good leader, and why. Ask your child if they think Jaron and Amarinda should honor their betrothal and get married.

Grade 6

Vocab: In Vocabulary, the students had their Unit Review test on units 7,8, and 9 before vacation. The students will be starting Unit 10 when they come back from break. As previously mentioned you can follow your students progress in Vocabulary by signing into their Sadlier account.

Science- In science, the students have been working hard on their science fair projects. They have just handed in their research paper for their project and will be starting running tests this week. The

science fair will be on March 22. Also, the students will be starting a unit on owls.

Seventh Grade News
Grade 7 Social Studies: In Social
Studies, we are reviewing the
events leading up to the American
Revolution. Please ask your child
about Natural Rights, and ask
them what is considered the key
issue behind the taxation of the
colonies. Ask them about
consent, and why the colonies
were unable to consent to taxation.

The ideals of revolutionary America still play a major role in shaping the society we live in. For example: Americans still exercise their right to protest laws they view as unfair. Citizens have the right to present their views freely. Lastly, Citizens have the right vote, and elect representatives.

Grade 7 Literature: In Literature, we have just finished reading "Puritan Girl: Mohawk Girl", by John Demos, which recounts the true story of the capture of Eunice Williams in 1704 by Mohawk Native Americans, and her assimilation into the tribe. Ask your child if you think Eunice should have returned to Massachusetts, or if she should have stayed in Canada.

When we return from break, we will be reading "The Color of my Words" by Lynn Joseph, which is set in the Dominican Republic. In this story, the protagonist witnesses the denial of Natural Rights by the government, including the freedom of speech. Ask your child what free speech means to them. Share with your child any information or stories you have about the Dominican Republic.

Seventh Grade

Vocab-In Vocabulary, the students had their Unit Review test on units 7,8, and 9 before vacation. The students will be starting Unit 10

when they come back from break. As previously mentioned you can follow your students progress in Vocabulary by signing into their Sadlier account.

Grade 7 Science- In science, the students just finished learning about the uses of water in the world. They will start to learn about how water is polluted and ways to prevent it. In addition, the students have been working hard on their science fair projects. They have just handed in their research paper for their project and will be starting running tests this week. The science fair will be on March 22.

Eighth Grade News

Grade 8 Vocab:

In Vocabulary, the students had their Unit Review test on units 7,8, and 9 before vacation. The students will be starting Unit 10 when they come back from break. As previously mentioned you can follow your students progress in Vocabulary by signing into their Sadlier account.

Grade 8 Science: In science, the students are studying Newton's Laws of motion through hands-on activities. Also, the students have been working hard on their science fair projects. They have just handed in their research paper for their project and will be starting running tests this week. The science fair will be on March 22.

Grade 8 Social Studies:

In Social Studies, we have been looking at the Civil War. Ask your child to tell you three causes of the Civil War. The war itself introduced modern military innovations such as railroads, the telegraph, and conscription. The Civil war permanently changed the nation by abolishing slavery, strengthening the power of the federal government, and putting the burden of an unprecedented death-toll on the fractured nation.

Each student has been assigned a specific battle to research, along with a topic of their choosing, and have been assigned a Google Slides presentation due March 1st. Ask your child what their battle assignment is, when the battle took place, and who won the battle. Also, ask your child what their topic is, and why they chose that topic.

Grade 8 Literature: In Literature, we have been reading *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* by Mark Twain. Some essential questions during this unit are: How can one influence positive changes in social behavior? What prejudices are people taught? What is a person's responsibility towards his or her actions? How are people products of their society?

Ask your child if they think Huck Finn is racist. Why or why not?

The sixth grade **Math** class is beginning a unit the addition and subtraction of fractions as the seventh grade prepares for a chapter test on a unit covering exponents, factors, and fractions. The eighth grade class continues to explore the wonders of slope intercept form.

In **Religion**, the sixth grade class continues its' study of the reign of Solomon and the impact he had on the development of the nation of Israel. Jesus in His role as a physical and spiritual healer is the topic of discussion in the seventh grade focusing on our responsibility to act in a similar way. The eighth grade class is learning that Monasticism not only had effect on the Church but would impact social thought from the Middle Ages to Modern times.
