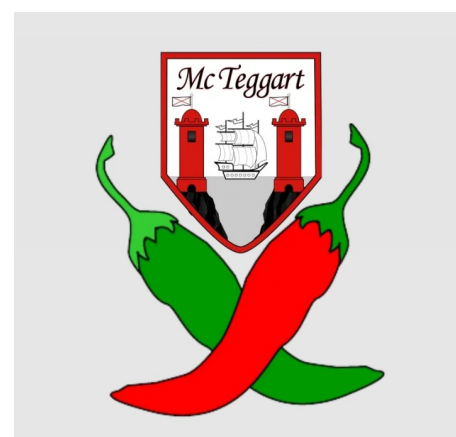

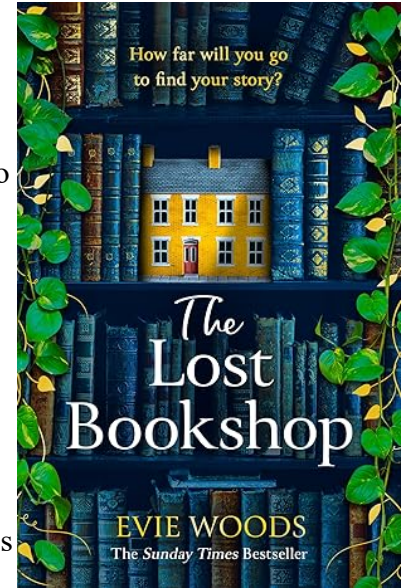
The Irish Book Club

If you are on Facebook, just type The Irish Book Club into the search bar (or click on <https://www.facebook.com/groups/2022642747761043/>) and you'll find us. Our book for December was *The Lost Bookshop* by Evie Woods; for January, we read *Amongst Women* by John McGahern; and for February, we'll read *The Ginger Man* by J. P. Donleavy.

The Lost Bookshop by Evie Woods

Amazon's description: "On a quiet street in Dublin, a lost bookshop is waiting to be found. For too long, Opaline, Martha, and Henry have been the side characters in their own lives. But when a vanishing bookshop casts its spell, these three unsuspecting strangers will discover that their own stories are every bit as extraordinary as the ones found in the pages of their beloved books. And by unlocking the secrets of the shelves, they find themselves transported to a world of wonder, where nothing is as it seems."

Ellen's take: "This book was so much fun to read! (Thanks to my sister Trisha Dowling for gifting it to me!) It's a combo murder mystery/romance/ghost story/feminist manifesto all wrapped up in a quite cleverly plotted novel. And it's all about books! Indeed, the book itself is dedicated 'To all the book lovers.'"



Evie Woods sums up the plot nicely in her Author's Notes at the end: 'This story began, as they often do, with a few lines hastily captured on paper before they had a chance to fly away, and the image of a man standing in the space where a bookshop should be. Little did I know then, the journey that Opaline, Martha, and Henry would take me on! All I knew was that I wanted to write a story about a very unusual bookshop with its roots in the golden age of rare book dealing and a little bit of magic, mystery, and romance along the way.'

And this from Wikipedia: 'Although a letter from her publisher addressed to Ellis Bell indicates that Emily [Bronte] had begun to write a second novel, the manuscript has never been found.' Did Opaline find it? Did she sew the words of the novel into her skirt, the same words Martha has tattooed on her back? Perhaps only the bookshop itself knows."

Kathy Wimmer's take: "After Scottish country dancing, I drove home, listening to the last part of the book and then drove around and around my neighborhood looking at Christmas lights and not being able to find my way to my driveway because I wanted to listen more. Finally went home and settled on the couch to stay awake until I finish listening to the last few chapters. I fell in love with Evie Woods like I fell in love with Jess Kidd after reading *Himself*. It helps that the narration of the audiobook was terrific, too. The magic, the joy, the wonder, and the triumph (yes, knowing that Opaline made it out of that horrific place was the only way to get through those chapters)—all elements that made this book so special."

Kathleen Stanton says, "I loved it—Woods is just a terrific storyteller, it contained some tough history, but woven into a romantic mystery that kept the narrative from getting too dark. And I do love me some magical realism. This is the kind of literature that makes me so glad I found this book club."

Team Ireland at the 2026 Milano-Cortina Winter Olympics

When I think of Olympic winter sports, places like Canada, the Nordic countries, and the US come to mind. During the 2022 Beijing Olympics, I was watching short track speed skating and I saw Sean McAnuff (pictured back row, right) skating for Ireland. I thought that was pretty cool since Ireland is not especially known for winter sports, let alone short track. Nevertheless, the athletes work very hard to get to this level, and I would like to highlight the ones who qualified and those who have a good chance once re-

allocation lists are finalized at the end of January.

Cross-country skiing: Countries like Ireland are considered small within the winter sports scene, so securing two male quotas for this upcoming Olympics is good. Depending on successful outcomes of qualifying races, the athletes to look for are:

- ♣ Thomas Maloney Westgård (pictured center back) will be representing Ireland for his third Olympics. The 30-year-old was raised in Trondheim, Norway and his dad is Norwegian. His mom is from Dunmore, Co. Galway.
- ♣ Irish born Dylan Longridge, a geophysicist, is hoping this will be his first Olympics.

Freestyle Skiing (Moguls): If successful, Claire Dooley will be Ireland's first ever freestyle mogul skier. She is waiting for the re-allocation list to be finalized.

Freestyle Skiing (Halfpipe): There are two athletes anxiously waiting for news of their chance to represent Ireland:

- ♣ Anja Barugh was born in and competed for New Zealand in Beijing 2022. Family in Kerry and Tyron qualifies her to ski for Ireland.
- ♣ Benjamin Lynch was raised in and competed for Canada. In 2025 he decided to compete for Ireland, where his mother is from and where he was born.

Alpine Skiing: Ireland secured one male and one female quota:

- ♣ Cormac Comerford (pictured back, left), Ireland's top ski racer, is the male athlete to keep a watch for in the slalom, giant slalom, super-G, and downhill.
- ♣ Finlay Wilson is currently ranked #1 for U18 in Ireland. His mother is from Cookstown, Tyrone. He will have to compete with Cormac for the male quota.
- ♣ Elle Murphy (pictured front, left) is American from Colorado with dual citizenship because her father was born and raised in Ireland.
- ♣ Eabha McKenna is Irish born, but lives and trains in Switzerland. She will have to compete with Elle for the female quota.

Skeleton: Éire Rowland-Evans got in under re-allocation. She will be the first ever woman to represent Ireland in Skeleton.

Luge: Elsa Desmond, a.k.a. the 'flying doctor' (pictured front, center), is waiting for the re-allocation list to be finalized. If successful, this will be her second Olympics. She qualifies for Ireland through her grandparents from Cork and Cavan.

Short Track Speed Skating: Sean McAnuff and Liam O'Brien (pictured front, right) are both vying for the one quota spot on Team Ireland. It appears that O'Brien has edged out McAnuff and is waiting for the re-allocation list to be finalized.

The 2026 Winter Olympic Games will take place in Milan and Cortina d'Ampezzo, Italy from February 6 to February 22. All events will be streamed live on Peacock in the US.

What's on Your Irish Bucket List?

Slea Head Drive, Dingle, County Kerry

Watch the majestic Atlantic sweep in and see the sun's rays glance off the towering mountains and witness scenes unchanged for centuries. Watch as the little fishing boats make their way to sea and the early morning stillness is broken only by the seagulls' cries. In the distance see the starkly beautiful Blasket Islands.

Visit WB Yeats's Grave

The greatest poet arguably in all of literature is buried in a quiet grave "under Ben Bulbin's head" in Sligo. See the little church where his family worshiped and feel the presence of the great master. His epitaph has inspired for decades: "Cast a cold eye on life, on death – Horseman pass by."

Visit Kilmainham Jail in Dublin

Here you will find the stories of the last moments of many of the men who led the Easter Rising 1916 and the incredible bravery they showed in the face of death. Stand in the actual cells they waited in before their execution. A sacred place.

The Ulster American Folk Museum in Omagh

Witness how the great migration of the Scots Irish began from this very area in the 18th century. See the uncanny reproduction of the era from schoolhouse to little town to forge.

Newgrange at the Winter Solstice

Just twenty or so miles from Dublin, where the ancients built their equivalent of the Egyptian pyramids, which they predate, the winter sun passes through the burial chamber at the winter solstice.

Spend an Afternoon in Dublin's National Museum

Home to over two million artifacts, dating from the Stone Age. Learn about the incredible culture from earliest Celtic days to the dawn of Christianity and beyond. Marvel at the genius and creativity instilled deep in the Celtic soul.

Hill of Tara, County Meath

Where the high kings of Ireland were crowned and where the great assemblies of the Irish race took place. A lonely windswept hill where you easily step back in time and imagine what the ancients felt.

Doolough Famine Walk, County Mayo

Every year a tragic walk is recreated when hundreds of starving Irish peasants in Mayo had to walk 12 miles in desperate conditions to seek relief. Many women and children died along the way and a Famine cross remembers their sacrifice.

Stroll Down Dublin's Grafton Street on a Saturday Morning near Christmas

All of Dublin comes alive with buskers, street artists, bustling crowds. School kids sing Christmas hymns, festive fare is everywhere and all is well with the world.

Guinness Storehouse, Dublin

After all the history, it's time to enjoy a pint – and where better than at the home of the Black Stuff. A fun tour, well worth taking, to finish up your bucket list trip!
