## HELPING HANDS

I know everyone is familiar with the old saying "it takes a village" when referring to raising children. The same quote can be applied to maintaining a safe and healthy community. The great City of Phoenix has many entities working together, as helping hands, to help ensure our communities remain amazing places to live. The police department utilizes some of these entities regularly to help alleviate some of the non-crime issues we may be having in your community. The most commonly used resources include; The Neighborhood Services Department (NSD), The Streets Department, and The Parks department. All these departments can also be utilized by you, to maintain your community long term.

The Neighborhood Services Department is an amazing asset for the City of Phoenix. I jokingly refer to them as the city's HOA. NSD's main function is to address any blight-type problems you may be experiencing in your area. There are eight common blight violations that NSD can help alleviate. They include: overgrown vegetation, junk litter and debris, outside storage, inoperable vehicles, vacant structures, fences in disrepair, on property parking issues, and finally graffiti.

NSD has a team of individuals who inspect every blight related complaint they receive. When a complaint is called into NSD, these inspectors will work with the owner of the property to fix the problem. If the owner does not show an effort to fix the violation, the inspectors can eventually issue a citation. Within the Black Mountain Precinct, we utilize their services for a large majority of the long-term community complaints we receive. We also have a monthly meeting to discuss properties we have in common and long-term solutions. The greatest thing about The Neighborhood Services Dept. is the complaints do not have to be police initiated. Anyone can contact NSD to make a complaint by calling 602-534-4444.

Another amazing tool for any community in the city of Phoenix, is the Streets Department. The Streets Department handles a multitude of different issues pertaining to (you guessed it) the city streets. The Streets Department has inspectors who regularly vet complaints and do inspections of our city streets, ensuring safe travels for members of our communities. They handle problems which include abandonment of alleys, flooding, street sweeping, crosswalk maintenance/improvement, road grading/improvement, and everyone's favorite...the speed hump program.

Whether it be impatient drivers using your street as a cut through or an inconsiderate neighbor, every community has its challenges when it comes to traffic. The speed hump program was designed with the purpose of slowing traffic in residential areas. According to the program, listed on the City of Phoenix website, speed humps can reduce vehicle speed on a residential street by 7mph. As the City of Phoenix rapidly grows, we will continue to have our challenges with traffic related issues. It is vitally important to have the Streets Department to help maintain our busy streets. Being in contact with this department regarding street related issues is imperative to maintain a safe community. Questions regarding the speed hump program and other programs maintained

by the Streets Department can be answered by calling 602-262-4659.

The Parks and Recreation Department may be one of the most underrated divisions within the City of Phoenix. They maintain a multitude of recreational areas such as city parks, community centers, mountain preserves, several golf courses, public pools, the Phoenix Center of the Arts, and many other recreational areas and programs. No matter where you live in this large city, I would venture to say you are within walking distance of an amazing park of some sort.

In the Black Mountain Precinct alone we have multiple mountain preserves, a city run golf course, and too many parks to count. All are being run and maintained by the Parks and Recreation Department. Every district has Park Rangers who work tirelessly to keep the parks and preserves clean and safe for members of our community to use every day. They open gates to hiking trails, open parking lots to parks, and deal with trespassers and other issues that may arise in these areas. They also enforce the Park Code of Conduct set forth by the city. Parks and Recreation also has numerous employees who work at community centers across the city. These community centers give programs, like block-watch and other community groups, a safe place to have meetings and events. The Park Rangers can be reached at 602-495-5458 and community centers can be reached at 602-262-6862.

This is just a small sample of the many different departments throughout the city helping our communities flourish. The helping hands made for communities that the City of Phoenix has created, makes this one of the best cities in this great country. I would strongly encourage you to research all the available programs and departments within the City of Phoenix to help you make your community great. ## WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

"Call if you can. Text if you can't." was the key message rolled out during a press conference on April 2nd as text to 9-1-1 service capability becomes available for the first time in the greater Phoenix region. If you are in imminent danger and unable to talk to a 9-1-1 operator, you now have the ability to text to 9-1-1. The service goes live following months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community.

- **What** - is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- **What** - happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- **When** - did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- **Was** - anyone hurt?
- **Weapons** - are there weapons involved?
- **What** - manner did they leave or arrive – foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- **Who** - did it? –Suspect description
- **Where** - did the suspect go? – What direction
- **What** - did the suspect obtain? – type and amount
- **Who** - is calling? – Give your name location and phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

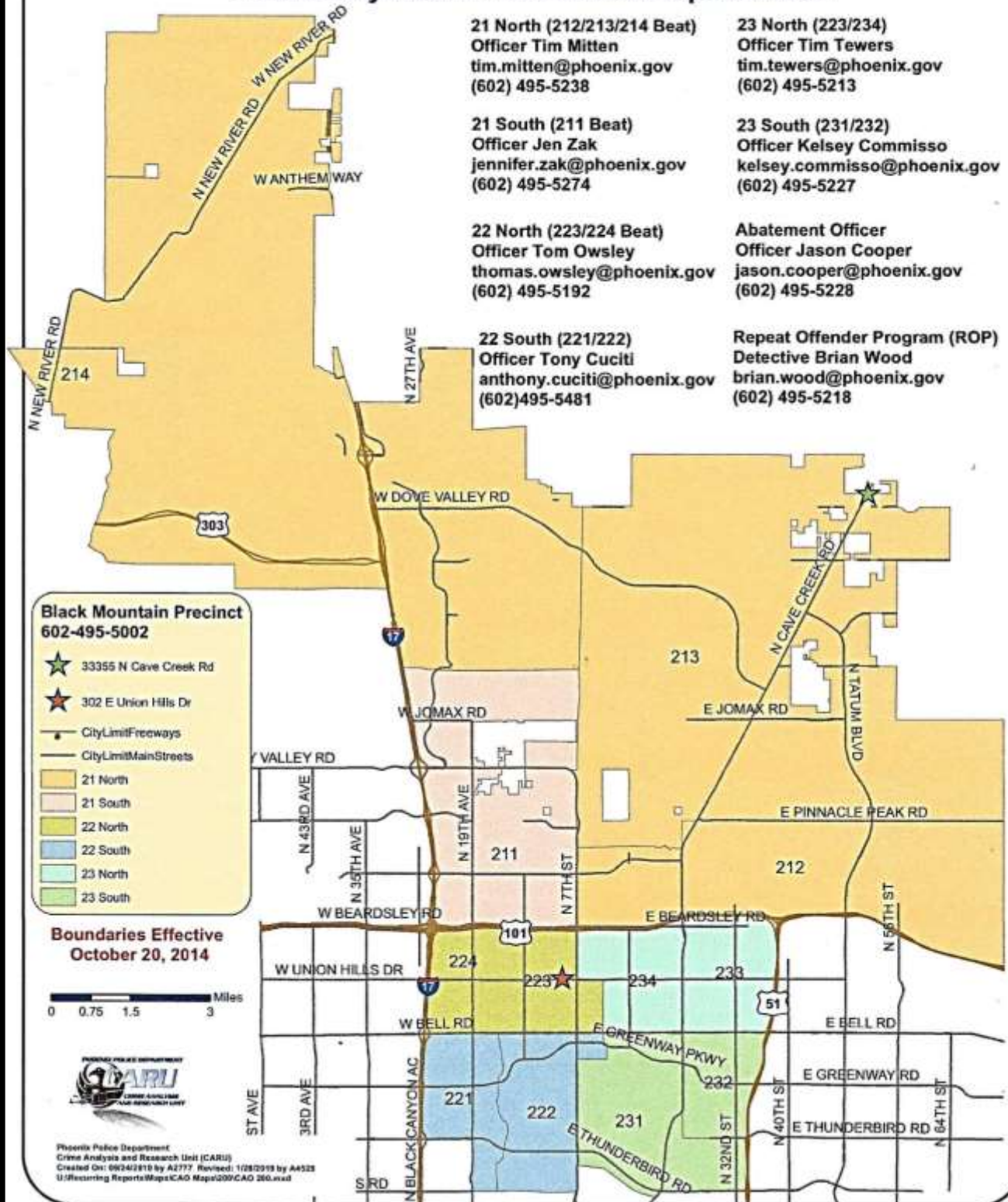

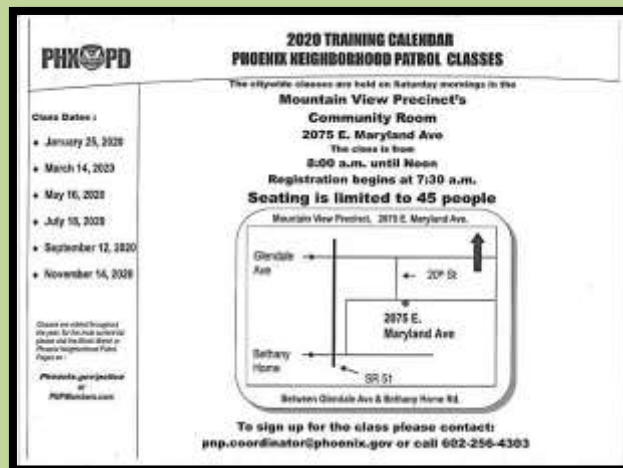

# CRIME TIPS:

## SOME SCAMMERS MAKE THINGS PERSONAL

Some of the most heartless scammers will tug at your heartstrings as a way to get into your wallet. Two examples of this are romance scams or the grandparent scam. In romance scams, scammers will target potential victims on dating sites, through social media or on chat boards. They'll be smart, attractive and personable. After they've earned your trust, comes an urgent request for money. Usually it comes with a promise to repay, but more often than not, your match disappears – with your money – for good.

In the case of the grandparent scam, criminals try to tap into your love and concern for a close family member, typically a grandchild. They will claim that your grandchild is in distress and needs you to send money to help. They hope that you will act swiftly in your concern, and before you are able to look into the claim of distress.

### HOW IT WORKS:

In each of these scams, scammers are working to gain your trust and then tap into your emotions.

They will often create a sense of urgency, whether they are asking for money for themselves or on behalf of your grandchild. They want you to act before you can give that thought or confirm if the story is true.

### WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

In both of these scam types, requests for payment will typically come in difficult-to-trace forms. This could be in the form of prepaid cards or by having money sent to a specific Western Union office.

To make their stories sound more credible, scammers will use information gathered from your social or public profiles. They may also gather small details during conversation or messaging.

### WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

Look for the red flags you just read about, and if anything seems off, take a pause. Hang up the phone. Talk to a trusted friend. And trust your instincts. If something doesn't feel right, it probably isn't.

Make your social networks private. It makes it harder for potential romance scammers to find you, and it also makes it harder for grandparent scammers to get the personal info needed to convince you of the scam.

## DO ILLEGAL ROBOCALLS HAVE YOUR PHONE RINGING OFF THE HOOK?

You're in the middle of dinner and your phone rings. Maybe the number looks familiar. Perhaps the first few digits are the same as your number ... you may even be looking at your entire number.

You answer the call, and on the other end is not a live person but instead ... a robotic voice

You are the recipient of a robocall. And while many robocalls are made by legitimate entities looking to conduct legitimate business, it is estimated that 40% of all robocalls are fraudulent.

### HOW IT WORKS:

Illegal robocalls made by scammers often use "spoofing" technology to mask their true origin, and may change the caller ID to look similar to your own phone number. A recent AARP study showed that 59% of us are more likely to answer if the caller ID shows a local area code.

The robotic voice on the other end might claim to represent a utility, a name-brand company or a government agency, or it may offer you a free trip, cheap health insurance or a low-interest loan.

You may be prompted to press "1" to be removed from the list.

### WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

Illegal robocalls make up a fast-growing share of phone traffic, making it all the more important to be on guard for automated scams.

Even just pressing a key or answering a question alerts scammers that they've hit on a "live" number, and your number will be added to even more lists that are bought and sold among criminals.

### WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

Let calls go to voicemail or your answering machine if you aren't 100% sure who is calling you. Listen to the message and if it's a threat from a government agency, a utility company or some other entity, know that it is a scam.

If you do pick up on a suspicious robocall, once you realize it's suspicious, hang up without engaging. If the caller claims to be from a legitimate-sounding entity, hang up and call that entity on a number you know to belong to them.

Explore free and low-cost call-blocking options, such as apps and services that screen calls and weed out spam and scams. Ask your phone service provider if it offers any such tools.

Report scam calls to the proper authorities. Every report helps authorities piece together a fuller picture of what scammers are doing.

When it comes to fraud, vigilance is our number one weapon. You have the power to protect yourself and your loved ones from scams. Please share this alert with friends and family and visit the Fraud Watch Network for more information.





## ADOR: Taxpayers, be on Look Out for Identity Theft Thieves During Tax Season

The Arizona Department of Revenue (ADOR) treats detecting and stopping fraud with paramount importance and reminds taxpayers that tax filing season is a time to be aware of identity thieves looking for ways to commit tax fraud.

The department points to phishing schemes, card-skimming devices, unsecure Wi-Fi networks, data breaches, computer viruses, unsafe smartphone apps, and hacking email accounts as ways identities are stolen.

### Tips to help prevent being the victim of identity theft:

- Do not carry identification with your Social Security Number (SSN) on it.
- If someone wants your SSN, always ask why because it is not always required.
- Keep personal and confidential information in a secure place.
- Take extra precautions when discarding personal or confidential information.
- Protect personal computers, smartphones, and other devices by using anti-virus software.
- Use strong passwords and never share your passwords.
- Never give personal information through unencrypted email, social media, or text messaging.

**One scam that targets companies and continues to be reported is the W-2 scam**, which is when a phishing email is sent to someone in a company's human resources or payroll office that appears to be from an executive of that business and asks for payroll information containing confidential information, be emailed immediately. The Arizona Department of Revenue advises staff to never respond to the email, and instead, connect with the person whose name is on the email by phone or in person to confirm its authenticity. ADOR recommends companies establish specific internal policies to address these requests and take steps to protect employee information.

The Arizona Department of Revenue's fraud prevention system has stopped more than \$120 million in fraudulent income tax refunds since 2015.

## Taxpayers should ask questions when hiring tax preparers: ADOR

The Arizona Department of Revenue (ADOR) says taxpayers need to be mindful when selecting their tax preparers this tax season, because they are ultimately responsible for what is filed, regardless of who prepared the return.

### Taxpayer responsibilities:

- Ensure the tax preparer provides you with a copy of the entire return.
- Insist the preparer provides copies of all schedules, especially if there are itemized deductions or credits.
- Ask the preparer to explain the return, including deductions, credits and wages claimed.
- Review the tax return before submitting to ensure numbers are correct and schedules add up to source documents provided to the tax preparer.
- Ask the preparer to sign the return and list their preparer tax information number (PTIN).
- Know preparers are prohibited from charging a percentage of a taxpayer's refund as their fee.

The IRS says roughly 60 percent of tax filers used tax preparation services in 2019. While the majority are professional and qualified, there are cases where tax preparers have submitted fraudulent returns or promised larger tax refunds by making unwarranted changes to the tax return. **Some key questions to ask:**

- What kind of formal training does the preparer have and how current is the training?
- Does the preparer hold any professional licenses or designations? These include: accredited tax preparer (ATP), accredited tax advisor (ATA), certified public accountant (CPA), enrolled agent (EA) or registered accounting practitioner (RAP).
- How long has the preparer been doing tax returns?
- Does the preparer offer e-file services?
- Is the preparer available year-round?
- Will the preparer explain how the return was prepared in the event of an examination by ADOR or the IRS?
- Did the preparer explain charges for services in advance?
- Does the preparer provide copies of complete returns to clients?

## Arizona Individual Income Taxpayers have Free Tax Preparation Options Taxpayers Encouraged to E-file

Individual income tax filers needing additional assistance this tax filing season can take advantage of the following free tax filing services that are available in the state:

- **Free File Alliance** – Is a public-private partnership between ADOR and a consortium of tax preparation software companies. The free file program offers a free file program to Arizona taxpayers who meet certain criteria. Please visit <https://azdor.gov/e-services/free-electronic-filing-individuals> for more information.
- **Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA)** – Offers free tax help to people who generally make \$56,000 or less, persons with disabilities and limited English speaking taxpayers who need assistance in preparing their tax returns. For more information, visit [www.irs.gov/Individuals/Free-Tax-Return-Preparation-for-You-by-Volunteers](http://www.irs.gov/Individuals/Free-Tax-Return-Preparation-for-You-by-Volunteers).
- **AARP Foundation Tax-Aide Program** – Offers free assistance to individuals 50 and older who cannot afford a tax preparation service to file federal and Arizona returns. In an effort to help more people gain access to treatment, and avoid felony prosecution in low-level and non-violent crimes, I directed this office to stop collecting a \$630 fee required of participants. We also announced a new organization would be treating those in the program and their treatment would be based on an individual's needs.

Last month, we hosted a Red Sand Event to commemorate Human Trafficking Awareness Month. With a symbolic pouring of red sand into the cracks of the walkway in front of our office building, we marked our commitment to create greater awareness and help victims who often fall through the cracks. Human trafficking is an intimidating topic but with education it is something we can all take part in preventing.

For the fourth year in a row, MCAO was part of the Speak Up, Stand Up, Save a Life youth conference. Held at Grand Canyon University, this event brings in thousands of students and teachers from dozens of schools to talk about the struggles kids face such as bullying, substance abuse and depression. This event encourages students to stand up and intervene to help someone in need.

## ADOT MVD Commercial Driver License services now available at all full-time MVD offices

### *Change vastly expands choices for CDL statewide*

The days of Commercial Driver License (CDL) customers only being able to go to a handful of MVD offices for those services are over.

The Arizona Department of Transportation Motor Vehicle Division now offers most CDL services at all full-time MVD locations statewide. Previously, CDL customers were required to travel to a limited number of MVD locations.

"As part of our continuous improvement efforts under the Arizona Management System, we're training all MVD Customer Service Representatives to perform commercial license transactions," said MVD Stakeholder Relations Manager Jennifer Bowser Richards.



She added, "That means someone who needs to get a CDL or most other commercial driver service doesn't have to go to a special CDL office anymore; they can be served at any full-time MVD office. The only exception is commercial driver road tests, which are available at many, but not all, MVD locations."

The expansion of CDL into more MVD locations is in addition to the existing CDL system. The existing CDL offices, some of which are separate from MVD locations, will continue to operate. This change means staff at all existing CDL offices now serve as examiners who are able to provide a larger number of skills tests by appointment.

**"MVD is always looking for ways to improve customer service," Bowser Richards added. "Adding literally hundreds of employees who can serve commercial customers will speed up those transactions and make all of MVD more efficient."**

## PHOENIX PARKS & RECREATION DEPT. BEHAVIOR POLICY

### Behavior Policy:

For the purposes of this policy, a facility is a City-owned building operated by the City or by an organization authorized to operate the building on the City's behalf.

### The following is not permitted in any Phoenix Parks and Recreation desert park, mountain preserve, park or facility (collectively "Park or Parks"):

- Abusing or vandalizing a Park or its amenities in any way
- Entering or using a Park or its amenities at any time other than during the posted hours of operation
- Using, possessing or selling illegal drugs or possessing drug paraphernalia
- Possessing or consuming alcohol without obtaining proper approval
- Possessing weapons inside any City facility, as posted
- Aggressive intimidation or harassment of patrons or City staff members including physical, sexual or verbal abuse
- Obstructing other park guests' use of Parks and Park amenities, or maintenance of the Park and Park amenities by City staff members
- Using amenities, including picnic tables and playgrounds, outside of their intended or approved purpose • Bathing, sleeping, storing personal belongings or doing laundry in restrooms or facilities
- Storing or leaving personal belongings unattended within any Park
- Use of shopping carts as posted, or other wheeled devices when they create obstructions, unnecessary clutter or damage to landscaping
- Charging for services, including exercise activities, guided hikes, sports and other special interest classes and activities, without obtaining proper approval
- Assembling groups of 50 people or more without obtaining proper approval
- Use of one or more ramadas in a Park for more than four hours per day, for two consecutive days, without obtaining proper approval
- Use of amplified sound without obtaining proper approval
- Smoking/vaping within 20 feet of a building entrance, playground, ramada or patio, and within restrooms and other enclosed public spaces
- Animals inside facilities, except for service animals, which are permitted
- Entering facilities without appropriate attire, as posted
- Unlawful conduct that violates the Arizona Revised Statutes, Phoenix City Code, or posted Park Rules or Behavior Policy
- Activities that may endanger self, others, wildlife or Park property

### In addition to the rules listed above, the following is not permitted in any desert park or mountain preserve:

- Endangering children or vulnerable adults on difficult trails or in adverse weather conditions
- Endangering dogs on difficult trails or in adverse weather conditions, such as temperatures over 100 degrees
- Playing personal music via speakers; use of headphones is encouraged, as a courtesy to fellow hikers, on trails, at ramadas and in parking lots
- Disregarding trail hierarchy; hikers and bicyclists yield to horses, bicyclists yield to hikers
- Disregarding trail etiquette; downhill trail traffic flow yields to uphill trail traffic
- Smoking/vaping
- Defacing natural areas with chalk, marker, powder materials or other non-natural products

- Moving rocks or other native material along a trail or altering the tread in such a way as to facilitate or encourage illegal trail use or to cause personal harm
- Riding electric bicycles or other types of motorized vehicles on trails or off established park roads
- Operating a metal detector and removing any found items
- Placing of geocaches in a location within a park or preserve that does not fall within management guidelines for that area – all geocaches must be reviewed and approved by park management or they will be removed
- Unauthorized off-trail activity

### Trespass Policy:

Park guests whose behavior violates the Behavior Policy are educated about the Behavior Policy. It is Phoenix Parks and Recreation's policy to lead with education and raising awareness to achieve compliance with the Behavior Policy. In situations in which verbal warnings and education have not been successful, City staff members have the authority to order a park guest to leave the park for the remainder of the day. In the event of repeated offenses, and with the approval of park management, park guests may be issued a trespass notice for a period of 30 days or more, applicable to the location where the violation(s) took place or to all Phoenix Parks and Recreation parks and facilities.

- First offense will result in a verbal warning and education about the Behavior Policy, and shall require immediate cessation of the behavior that violates the Behavior Policy
- Refusal to cease the behavior that violates the Behavior Policy may result in an order to leave the park for the remainder of the day, pursuant to Phoenix City Code 24-54
- Repeated offenses may result in the issuance of a trespass notice valid for 30 days from some or all parks and facilities
- Park guests who previously received a verbal warning and have been issued a trespass notice, and continue to violate the Behavior Policy, are subject to trespass periods of 60 days and greater from some or all parks and facilities
- The following offenses are subject to immediate trespass periods of 60 days and greater from some or all parks and facilities:
  - o Harassing patrons or staff members, including physical, sexual or verbal abuse
  - o Violating any criminal law of the Phoenix City Code or the Arizona Revised Statutes

Trespass notices must include information on why the park guest is being trespassed, the amount of time they are being trespassed for and the locations from which they are being trespassed. Additionally, the trespass notice provides information on how to appeal the trespass. Before a trespass notice is issued to a juvenile, a notification is sent to the juvenile's parent or guardian, informing them of the issue and providing education about the Behavior Policy.

## BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

**STRUCTURES:** The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. *FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!*

**OUTDOOR STORAGE:** All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

**JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS:** Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

**PARKING:** Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be 1/4 - 3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

**GRASS AND WEEDS:** Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

**ELIMINATE GRAFFITI:** Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

## How the 2020 Census will invite everyone to respond

Nearly every household will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census from either a postal worker or a census worker.

**95%** of households will receive their census invitation in the mail.



**WHAT WE WILL SEND IN THE MAIL**

On or between	You'll receive:
March 12-20	An invitation to respond online to the 2020 Census. (Some households will also receive paper questionnaires.)
March 25-24	A reminder letter.
	If you haven't responded yet:
March 26-April 3	A reminder postcard.
April 8-16	A reminder letter and paper questionnaire.
April 20-27	A final reminder postcard before we follow up in person.

**Almost 5%** of households will receive their census invitation when a census taker drops it off in their area. The majority of households may not receive mail at their home's physical location (for households that use PO boxes or census workers affected by natural disasters).

**Less than 1%** of households will be contacted in person by a census taker instead of being invited to respond on their own. We do this in very remote areas like parts of northern Maine, western Alaska, and in select American Indian areas that are too remote to reach.

Their motivation may be to meet or get to know their neighbors to protect the children, to keep property values up by eliminating blight and graffiti, to stop speeding on the streets by installing speed humps to protect the children, to have peace of mind by discouraging barking dogs and loud parties, and to be safe from crimes like burglary, theft and assault.

We all want to live in a safe and secure environment. Our homes should be safe havens. By rights there should be several layers of protection from the national level to our own neighborhoods. National and state governments provide control of our borders; state and city governments provide police and fire protection, education, and other resources, community member groups provide Phoenix Neighborhood Patrollers and the posting of PNP signs on neighborhood streets; Block Watch provides neighbors watching out for neighbors; and we provide our own home security alarms, lighting and burglary prevention measures.
