Virginia 4-H Celebrates April, Month of the Military Child (MOMC)

April, Month of the Military Child provides an opportunity to recognize and honor military-connected youth. These youth face many challenges that are unique to their situation such as having a parent deployed, frequent moves, and new schools. Their ability to adapt to these challenges deserves our respect. According to the Virginia Department of Education, Virginia has over 80,000 military-connected youth. Virginia is also home to Air Force, Army, Coast Guard, Marine Corps, Navy, National Guard, and Reserve families.

Here are a few suggestions for how your 4-H program can show support for children of military families.

 Although we celebrate Month of the Military Child all month long, Wednesday, April 19 is a special day that Virginia 4-H will celebrate the strength of military youth. Everyone across the state is invited to join us in celebrating Purple Up! For Military Kids Day by wearing something purple on April 19. Groups may select an alternate Purple Up date in April.

Purple symbolizes all branches of the military, as it is the combination of Army green, Marine red, and Coast Guard, Navy and Air Force blue.
