PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN



Presbyterian Women have been a driving force behind the Healthy Women Healthy Families Program since 2001. Mother's Day Cards to support the PCUSA ministry of Healthy Women Healthy Families will be "sold" (suggested donation \$10 per card) after each service until Mother's Day.

Healthy Women Healthy Families supports a range of programs of Presbyterian partner churches globally that promote health, education, and development of women and children. These programs are aimed at alleviating poverty and suffering of women and children, and include: primary and pre-primary education, prenatal and essential obstetric services, trauma healing and psychosocial support, early-childhood health and nutrition programs, health and hygiene education, food security, and fistula repair surgery. This fund enables global partners to implement programs that directly impact the lives of the most-vulnerable community members. It is a year-round, support ministry of the Global Poverty program of Presbyterian World Mission in collaboration with Presbyterian Women.

Because **Human trafficking** is a critical mission of the PWUSA, we had as our October, 2016 guest speaker, Nandi Dyalchand, who spoke to us about human trafficking in India. On Thursday, May 11, Opal Singleton will speak specifically about "Cyber Child Exploitation". Opal is the Training and Outreach Coordinator for the Riverside Co. Anti-Human Trafficking Task Force and serves with the Riverside County Sheriff's Department through a Department of Justice Grant. Lunch will be at 12 noon and will include a salad bar with various salads. Price is \$10. Sign up during fellowship hours.

A WORD FROM YOUR CHOIR DIRECTOR

As a choir, we serve a number of functions:

- We lead the congregation's song. We become what we sing. Words put to music become a part of who we are. We have the opportunity to put an abundance of the Word into the bodies and minds of our congregation. By giving the congregation new confidence, we help them to better embody God's word through music.
- We sing music the congregation cannot. There are wonderful pieces of music that are just too difficult for the congregation to sing. Because we have committed to putting in the time and energy to practice and rehearse, we are able to share these hope-filled songs in times of crisis, exuberant songs of joy as we praise and worship, and inspiring songs to lift us out of apathy.
- We serve as a small-group within the church. Singing creates a bond that unites us like no other activity can. As singers, we are expected to treat each other with "Charity and Love". We desire to act out what we sing as we strive for musical excellence. In addition to Sunday services, we meet together once a week, and caring for each other has become an honor and a privilege.

Our job is not just to sing beautifully, but to minister to the congregation and each other, helping to change the world into a more loving and peaceful place.

From the Magi to Calvary (Part 4)

Between Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday and the Last Supper, the three synoptic gospels (Matthew, Mark & Luke) all wrote that Jesus predicted the destruction of the temple in Jerusalem. (Luke 21:5 & Mark 13:1) The destruction took place during the Jewish revolt against the Romans in A.D. 70.

On the Sunday before his crucifixion, Jesus entered Jerusalem on the back of a donkey with great pomp and fanfare, "So they took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him, crying out, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord, Blessed is the King of Israel!" (John 12:13) This was written approximately 500 years earlier by the prophet Zechariah, "Rejoice greatly... your king is coming to you; righteous and having salvation is he, humble and mounted on a donkey, on a colt." (Zech.9:9)

Near evening Jesus returned to Mary, Martha, and Lazarus' home in Bethany. The next day Jesus went back to Jerusalem, entered the Temple and drove out the religious mercenaries who were cheating people in the Temple. This event further angered the religious leaders who were trying to discredit Jesus, but his answers to their questions totally confounded them. This led the religious leaders to becoming more determined to arrest and rid themselves of Jesus before the Romans moved to resolve the problem.

Into the drama stepped a disgruntled Judas who approached the religious leaders and offered to betray Jesus for 30 pieces of silver. On Thursday Jesus and his disciples returned to Jerusalem to prepare for Passover. During their Passover meal, Jesus instituted the tradition of the Lord's Supper and told his disciples, "I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer." During the meal Jesus explained the significance of the bread and wine and what it represents. Then he told his disciples "Do this in remembrance of Me." During the meal Judas managed to slip out to make the biggest mistake of his life. After he left, Jesus told his disciples, "I am with you a little while longer. You will look for Me, and just as I told the Jews, 'Where I am going you cannot come." In John 14, Jesus comforted his disciples saying, "Let not your heart be troubled; you believe in God, believe also in Me." He added that He's going to where the Father is and He will prepare a place for them and return for them. Then He made a puzzling statement to his disciples, "You know the way to the place where I am going." But Thomas said to Jesus that they don't know the way to where Jesus is going. Jesus then made one of his most famous and controversial statements, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me."

Almost all of us are quite aware of Jesus' ordeal through his arrest, trial and his execution at the hands of a Roman execution squad. The obvious wonderful news is that God raised Jesus from the dead. Early Sunday morning Mary Magdalene approached Jesus' tomb and discovered it empty. She quickly went to tell Peter and the other disciples. Peter and another disciple rushed to the tomb and found only Jesus' burial clothes. Later in John 20, Jesus appeared to Mary near his tomb. The synoptic gospels say that Mary Magdalene and a group of Jesus' woman followers saw an angel at the tomb who told them, "You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He Has Risen!"
