For the second year in a row, Christ the King Lutheran Church in Cary, NC, will host the interfaith prayer service that is part of the Town of Cary's "Dreamfest" during the weekend of Martin Luther King Day. Set for Sunday, January 17, at 3:30 pm, the service will originate from Christ the King and will be live streamed on the church's YouTube channel. Similarly, this year's guest preacher, Rev. Brenda Smith, until recently the director of the ELCA's Book of Faith Initiative, will participate from Chicago via video. Music will be provided by a small Gospel ensemble from Pleasant Grove Church of Cary and by Dr. Abraham Cáceres of Worldhousemusic. Also participating will be CTK member Vicki Gallagher with the "virtual MLK experience" which she leads at NC State. Other event sponsors are Beth Shalom Synagogue, the Islamic Association/Cary Mosque, the Town of Cary, the Cary Area Ministerial Alliance and the Triangle Conference of the NC Lutheran Synod. Council Corner Jan 2021

Traditionally, the Council conducts minimal business in December while the focus is on worship and celebration of Advent and Christmas. Surprise! December 2020 wasn't like that.

First, we completed the sale of Damascus House with a closing on December 2. Then there was a possible COVID exposure that forced cancellation of in-person services and sent staff to work from home for 10 days. During that period we had a congregational meeting over Zoom to approve the budget for 2021 and elect new council members. Maria Chi, Barbara Ellertson, and Tim Hoke will serve three year terms, and we thank them for their willingness to serve.

Later in the month, the Council had a Christmas party of sorts over Zoom, and a few days after that we had an extra meeting to consider a refinancing offer on our mortgage. Thanks to the efforts of our treasurers, John Foreman and Angela Maine, we have an offer from Fidelity Bank that would cut our interest rate by a full percent and reduce monthly expenses by about \$4,000. There will be costs that offset some of the benefit in 2021, but the interest rate will be fixed for seven years. The council voted to approve the Finance Committee's recommendation to pursue this option.

We weren't able to celebrate our staff in person this year, but many of you reached out in various ways to express your love and appreciation. In this extraordinary year, we have pulled together to support each other and keep St. Paul's strong.



The Ministry of Listening



Think of a time when you really felt cared for. Chances are someone focused on what you had to say, was attentive to your needs, and listened to how you felt instead of telling you how you should feel or what you should do.

In Stephen Ministry, a great deal of time is spent in teaching and practicing listening skills because of its importance as a caregiving tool. Here's a sample of what Stephen Ministers learn in their training about listening:

- Listening is active. It takes energy and commitment to listen really well. Focus your attention on what the other person has to say instead of thinking of what you'll say next.
- Listening takes patience. Often you need to build trust before someone will open up to you.
- Listening involves more than just words. Pay attention not only to what is said, but to what is not said. Pay attention to body language, too. Does it agree with or contradict a person's spoken words?

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- 4. Good listeners aren't completely silent. They restate key thoughts or ideas to be sure they understood correctly, and they ask focused questions to encourage the person to reach a little deeper.
- 5. Listening happens over time. One conversation might build upon an earlier one. As you listen over several conversations, are there any recurring themes or patterns in what the person has said? Are there any contradictions from what was said earlier? These are signs there may be more to explore underneath.
- 6. Listening is confidential. A great way to build trust and show the person you really care is to maintain confidentiality and not to share with others what was told to you in private conversation.

Jesus was the model of a good listener. Much of his ministry was listening to people. By listening to what people had to say he demonstrated how much he really cared about them. Do you remember the stories of the woman at the well, Nicodemus, or the disciples on the road to Emmaus? These were all times when Jesus showed his care and concern by first listening to people and then giving them what they needed.

Our Stephen Ministers at St. Paul's follow Jesus' model as a listener and caregiver, helping to make this a caring place where members and guests truly feel people care about who they are and how they feel. Just as our Stephen Ministers use good listening skills to communicate how much they care, so can you!

Listening is a great gift we can give to one another, and one we can all use in our everyday caring and relating.
