Light Bending: Loinnir (1987-1998, West Coast of County Clare/Coalisland County Tyrone—Eire) for Loinnir, Roisin, Bernadette, and the Revolution

It's a long long way from here to Clare Where white horses race ashore in salt and cold sprav And in the Doolin pub thick-bearded Aran fishermen Draw long sips of black stout, Gossip in the ancient tongue, Wonder who the quiet Yank might be-In time of sad civil war up north I just sat, took breaths and stared on a rock along the western shore waiting for the moon to rise or thinking vaguely of captive Roisin far off in a London jail alone and how I visited her famous mom one day up in Tyrone Yankee left journalist on walkabout accepting a kind cuppa tea— They'd asked if she was bitter these many hard years on, as was rumored. "You know the thing I can't forgive is that these wee ones didn't grow up in farm country with all the war and all the war for we had to raise the three of them here on this stark city ground just to breathe at night just to stay alive"

She sighed dreaming perhaps of flower fields, hills and cattle horses dogs with a running child free by a laughing Irish river "Well, you know, I had longer hair back then, not this Ulster matron's Peace Process do, and they said I was bad then," she smiled. "But I'm worse now, far far worse!" Then our wee rebel Bernie the mini-skirted firebrand of Derry of Belfast, of the hall of Parliament and the English jails, who saw the paratroops deal out murder that awful Sunday in seventy-two, now herself a gray granny, took her new grandchild home out of foreign captivity and told all us nosey press about the kid's newly christened name: "Loinnir" "It's a ray of sunshine," she said. "Not the bright summer glare you might imagine, but Loinnir means the pure rare sunlight as it filters down through even the darkest of clouds."

Member Spotlight: Patricia Browne Hirschl

It was my pleasure to interview Pat Browne Hirschl for this month's member spotlight. The sprightly 92-year-old has been a member of the IAS for about four years. Some friends of hers told her about the Ceili dance classes on Wednesday nights at the German Club and that is how she found out about the IAS. She has only been able to come to a few meetings, the most memorable being Patrick McDermott's talk about the motherbaby homes in Ireland and a talk given by Dr. Maya Sutton.

Pat celebrated her 90th birthday on rural Achill Island off the west coast of Ireland along with one of her three children plus various grandchildren, spouses, and one great-grandchild who was still a bun in the oven. Their party of almost 15

effectively shifted the ratio of sheep to people on the island from 4 to 3 to 1.¹ They stayed at an inn near Keem Beach, one of three blue flag beaches on Achill Island.² One of her family members is a surf instructor and the younger ones in the group wanted to learn how to surf in what they thought would be great surfing waves. "No way!" the instructor said. Luckily, the surf calmed on their last day, and they were able to have their lesson.

Pat's great-grandmother, Nora Coyne Brady, was from Co. Mayo, someplace on the coast due to her first husband, Brady, being a fisherman. Described as "the character" of the family and an unusual beauty, Nora divorced Brady, left him with their two children, and immigrated to the U.S. by herself in 1855. Starting life over in St. Louis (an uncommon landing place for the Irish), she met Pat's great-grandfather, Edward Neunuebel, a German immigrant and a steward in a restaurant where Nora waited tables. When she received news that her ex-husband was lost at sea (a common fate for fisherman on the wild west coast), she married Neunuebel. Then word came from Ireland that first husband Brady was still alive. A priest advised that from then on she must live with Grandpa Neunuebel as if they were brother and sister. Of course, for a strong, independent woman this dictate was not to be followed! As a devout Catholic, however, she never got over "living in sin" with Grandpa Neunuebel and was bitter and even more devoutly Catholic ever after. Pat's mother and her cousin told her tales of Nora's awakening them in fierce electrical storms, common in the St. Louis summers, insisting they get up and pray to be saved from the storm and dousing them with holy water. An Achill Island informant told Pat that there had been a terrible storm about the time Nora still a child in Ireland where lightning burned down all the houses and killed all the people in a County Mayo village built on a hill.


Pat had been to Ireland previously with her late husband, about 30 years ago. They landed in Galway and took a boat on the River Shannon. Leaning a little too far over, her husband fell into the river! It was also the first time Pat had colcannon. She liked it so much it became a common dish in her house and was even served at her daughter's wedding reception.

Pat has lived in Albuquerque for four years. Before that, she lived in San Miguel de Allende, Mexico, for about twenty years. Before that she was a Midwesterner. Browne is her father's name; his own father was also an Irish immigrant from County Armagh.

Charles Stewart Parnell: The Uncrowned King Of Ireland

The Great Famine of 1845 to 1849 left over one million dead with a further one million emigrating over the following 10 years. One of the effects of the disaster was to demonstrate to ordinary Irish people that the English Government had failed them in their time of need and that they must seize control of their own destiny.

Out of the Famine grew several revolutionary movements that eventually culminated in the 1916 Easter Rising. Yet in the second half of the nineteenth century, the main concern of the Irish people was their land and the fact that they had no control whatsoever over its ownership.

Charles Stewart Parnell was the son of a Protestant landowner who organized the rural masses into agitation against the ruling landlord class to seek the Three Fs: Fixity of Tenure, Freedom to Sell, and Fair Rent.

Violence flared in the countryside, but Parnell preferred to use parliamentary means to achieve his objectives and the result was a series of Land Acts that greatly improved the conditions under which the Irish agricultural class toiled.

Parnell's main ambition was Home Rule for Ireland (local Government). He led the Irish Party, deposing Isaac Butt in the process to achieve this aim. He and colleagues such as Joseph Biggar made a science out of "filibustering" and delayed the English parliament by introducing amendments to every clause of every bill and then discussing each aspect at length. His popularity in Ireland soared to great heights.

Trouble loomed for Parnell, however, in his private life. He had secretly courted a married woman, Kathleen O'Shea, whose husband subsequently filed for divorce, naming Parnell as the co-respondent. He tried to ignore the scandal and continued his public life, but public pressure in Ireland and from Gladstone in England eventually brought his downfall and he died shortly afterwards, in 1891.

The Home Rule Bill that he had forced Gladstone into introducing was passed in the House of Commons, but defeated in the House of Lords. In the years that followed, the fight for Home Rule continued in Ireland but was overtaken by the outbreak of World War I and the 1916 Easter Rising that changed Irish history forever.



In his last speech in Kilkenny in 1891 Parnell said: "I don't pretend that I had not moments of trial and of temptation, but I do claim that never in thought, word, or deed, have I been false to the trust which Irishmen have confided in me."

But perhaps he will be most remembered for the quotation that can be found on his statue at the junction of O'Connell Street and Parnell Street in Dublin City Centre: "No man has a right to fix the boundary of the march of a nation; no man has a right to say to his country, thus far shalt thou go and no further."
