Years ago, I had a friend, Mary Lou, who made an amazing New Year's resolution. Starting January 1<sup>st</sup>, and every day for 365 days, she wrote a hand-written thank you letter. She wrote letters to her family, her friends, people she saw on the news, famous people she admired, authors she loved, people in her neighborhood. She didn't start the year with a list, she started each day knowing that on that day she would pick someone. She didn't always know who it would be when she got up; she often spent a day listening and thinking. But she said that every day someone would come into her mind and heart, or she would hear about something, or remember someone she hadn't thought of in years, and she would find addresses and write to them.

At the end of that year she did have a list; a list of 365 people who had touched her life directly or indirectly by who they were. She said it changed her to spend a year being thankful and to spend a year looking at the ways so many people made her life better.

As we approach another Thanksgiving, it often reminds us that we are thankful to God for many things, the many ways that God is in our lives, and the lives of people we love. It may also remind us that we don't say thank you enough.

But does God really want us in that guilt spiral, of "I should be thankful, I'm not thankful enough, I'm horrible about that, God must think I'm horrible about it too, I should be thankful, I'm not thankful enough....and on the guilt spiral goes.

It seems to me that instead of the guilt spiral, God would much more like us to turn toward God with our thanksgivings, and just skip the spiral.

Back in the 14<sup>th</sup> century the German Priest, mystic and teacher Meister Eckhart said this: "If the only prayer you ever say in your entire life is thank you, it will be enough."

What I like about today's readings from the Bible is that they tell us that followers of God through the ages have needed to be reminded to say thank you. We aren't the only ones!

In the reading from Deuteronomy the Israelites were reminded that God had given them a new land, after their 40-year wandering from slavery in Egypt, to freedom. The best response to that gift of freedom from Egypt and the gift of a new land, was to take the very first things they grew each year and bring those as a gift to God. They were reminded to bow before God and say thank you for all that God had given them.

We have the annual Thanksgiving Holiday to remind us to say thank you, they had the first fruits of the harvest each year.

I got to see a glimpse of this thanksgiving to God for the harvest the year I lived in Northern Ireland. Late in the fall there was a Harvest Festival in the church each year. While it took place at the end of the harvest, the feelings of gratitude were similar to those of Israel at the beginning of the growing season. One of the farmers brought in a huge old wooden wagon wheel attached flat to a board. Inside each of the spokes of the wheel was the produce of the harvest from farms around the village. Brussel sprouts, potatoes, turnips, carrots, and parsnips filled section by section of the wagon wheel. Bundles of grain stood by the doors. Late autumn flowers filled the deep window ledges. The gifts of God filled the sanctuary. The benefit of living in a farming community was that the gifts of God weren't just on grocery shelves, they were right there in front of us. 30 years later I still remember the joy of saying thank you to God on that day. What I also loved was that at the end of that Harvest Service all the food was taken to hungry families, and the flowers were taken to homebound members.

It wasn't just in Old Testament times that God's people needed to be reminded to be thankful. In the reading from Philippians we hear Paul reminding the people then, and reminding us now: "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say rejoice."

The Message translation puts it this way: "Celebrate God all day, every day. I mean, revel in God!"

As I thought about this morning's sermon, and giving thanks to God, (and wanting to avoid the guilt spiral), I decided we needed to explore the rest of this sermon together.

I decided that instead of me talking about the reasons for thanksgiving this morning, there was a better way.

Instead of me telling you how to rejoice, I'm going to invite each of you to "celebrate God and revel in God" yourself in the next few minutes.

So, this is the time to pull out the yellow insert in your bulletin, and to find the pen or pencil you are going to use. There was a wise woman in my last church who, when she was in her 90's, told me that her mother taught her to pray her thank you's for the simple things, with simple words. We are going borrow that wisdom from Marge's mother and avoid the "thees" and "thous" this morning. Each of us will write our own Prayer of Thanksgiving.

Then I hope when you get home today, you will find a place to be alone with God and pray this prayer out loud. So, you can really "celebrate God and revel in God!"
