None of this would have been possible without friends like you who have given so generously to support these projects. Your support benefits those you will never know a half a world away living in conditions that are unimaginable to us.

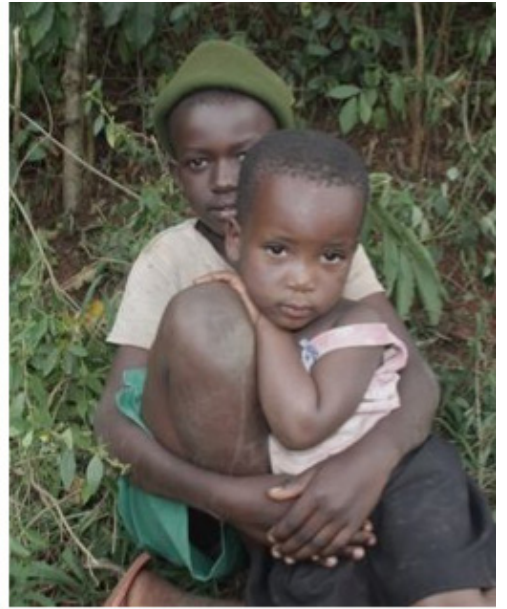

WHO WE ARE

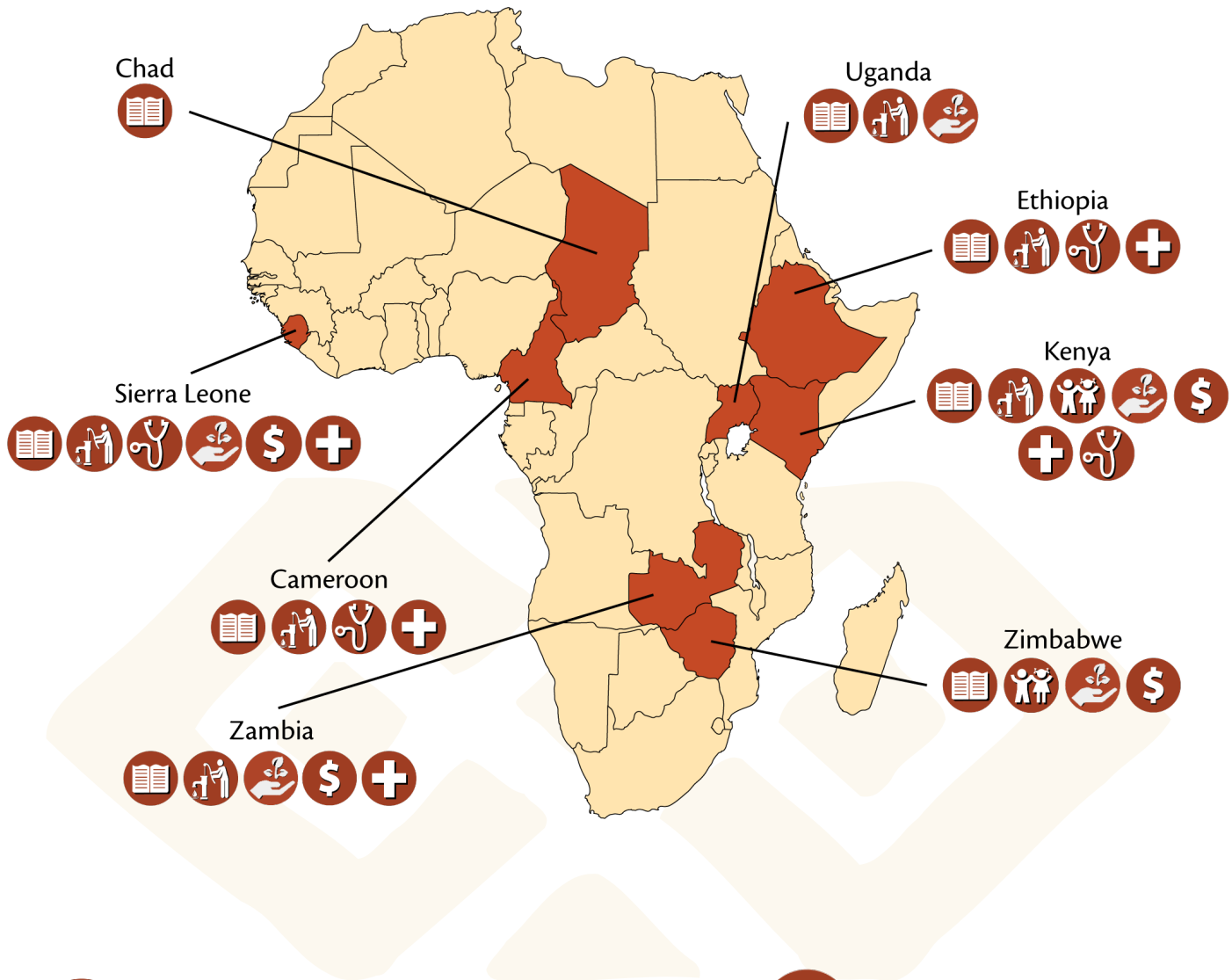

OUR PROGRAMS

-  **Orphan Care** ✦ Provide loving homes for orphaned and abandoned children, including the basic necessities of food, clean water, health care, and an education, so they can build a better life as they enter adulthood.
-  **Education** ✦ Offer quality education at preschool, primary and high school levels, as well as vocational training to give children and young adults the best opportunities for self-sufficiency.
-  **Clean Water** ✦ Dig water wells and support clean water development projects to provide life's most vital resource.
-  **Agriculture** ✦ Train men and women in sustainable farming methods to provide food for their families and surplus to sell at local markets, and provide seeds and basic farming tools.
-  **Healthcare** ✦ Provide essential medicines, medical supplies and equipment to save lives and support the operations of clinics and hospitals in remote villages.
-  **Income Generation** ✦ Provide the initial funding to our program partners to create income generating projects to help sustain their program's future funding needs.

Orphan Care



ORPHAN CARE CHALLENGE

In Kenya, where the Lewa Children's Home operates, there are an estimated 2.4 million orphans, of which 47 percent are due to AIDS-related parental deaths.

In Zambia, where the Kabwata Orphanage and Transit Centre operates, there are 1 million orphans in the country with a population of 17 million. AIDS killed an entire generation of parents leaving the country with half its population younger than 18. One in 13 Zambian children will die before age 5, and many children don't know their parents or even their own birthdays. Zambia's proportion of children without parents is the sixth highest in the world. If more Zambian children born with HIV survived, the largest population in the world of children without mothers and fathers could be there.

Today, the sad fact is that hundreds of thousands, if not millions, of orphaned, abandoned and destitute children who have no place to call home do not know where their next meal is coming from and have no one to love and protect them.



ORPHAN CARE SOLUTION

For over two decades since we began our longstanding partnership with Phyllis Keino to found the Lewa Children's Home in Kenya, Bread and Water for Africa® has worked with our other long-standing partners including the Kabwata Orphanage and Transit Centre in Zambia and Shinga Development Trust in Zimbabwe to provide loving homes for hundreds of orphaned and abandoned children every year.

Program founders and directors Phyllis (Bread and Water for Africa® volunteer international spokesperson), Angela Miyanda (Kabwata) and Margaret Makambira (Shinga) have become the only "mother" thousands of orphaned children have ever known. Without their love and dedication there is no telling what would have happened to those children who were loved and cared for as they grew up and today live successful happy lives.

SHEBA TALAI ABOUNDED LOVE FOR THE NEEDIEST CHILD IN KENYA



Sheba Talai is now 12 years old; she is described as a joyous girl who always has a hug to spare for others. Though you would never guess it from her smile and happy outlook on life – her story begins with more pain than happiness.

Sheba was born with physical deformities of her legs and hands. Because of this, she was found abandoned when she was just 1-year old. By the time she was found, Sheba was also suffering from malnourishment, pneumonia, and sickle cell anemia.

After being brought to the Lewa Children's Home, she was nursed back to health and has received much needed healthcare to help ease her pain and give her a chance at a normal, happy life.

After a while, Lewa staff learned that – in addition to her existing conditions - Sheba was also deaf and mute, adding to the difficulty of her life.

Phyllis and the staff at Lewa continued to teach Sheba in their school with other children for a while, but now she is attending a specialized school for the hearing impaired.

Through the help of the Lewa Home, Sheba has received healthcare, and, more importantly, Sheba has received the love that she so desperately needs to flourish.

58

orphaned and abandoned children lived at the Lewa Children's Home in Kenya where they received support for all their basic needs, including education, healthcare and counseling.

48

orphaned and abandoned children lived at the Kabwata Orphanage and Transit Centre in Zambia which provided their basic needs, including education, healthcare and counseling.

30

children over 16 years old lived at homes supervised by the Kabwata staff where they received support for their basic needs and received vocational training.

18

children living in foster care received food support, a living allowance, assistance with school fees, and basic healthcare support through the Kabwata outreach program.

12

orphaned children lived at the Lerato Children's Village in Zimbabwe which provided for all their basic needs, including education, healthcare and counseling.

10

children were served during a transitional time, ranging from two weeks to six months, until the Social Welfare Department reunited them with their families or reintegrated them into nearby communities.

EDUCATION CHALLENGE

By 2050, Sub-Saharan Africa as a whole will be home to 86 percent of the world's extreme poor unless action is taken, such as educating more women. That compares to 57 percent in 2017. Countries need an adult literacy rate of at least 70 percent to industrialize and grow at a pace that leaves the average citizen better off.



EDUCATION SOLUTION

In addition to the immediate needs of food and shelter, the most important thing an African child needs for a bright and happy future is an education.

Whether it's in Cameroon, Chad, Ethiopia, Kenya, Sierra Leone, Uganda, Zambia or Zimbabwe, all children need the same thing – the opportunity to go to school where they learn to read and write, solve math problems, and, as they get older, take advanced courses where they will obtain the skills necessary to find suitable employment and be able to support their families.



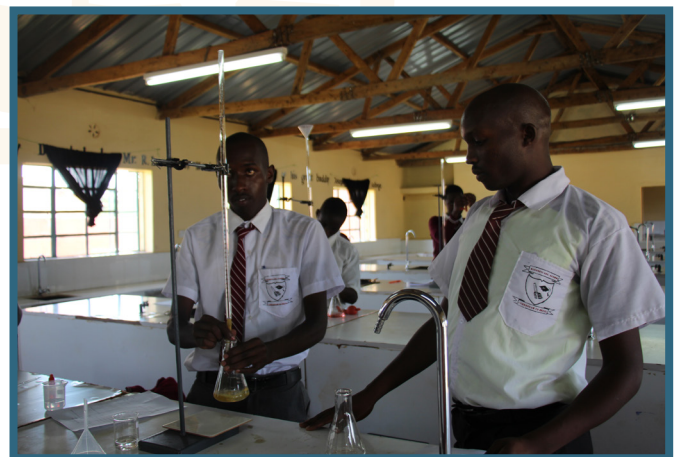

ANN TIYAA A DREAM COME TRUE



18-year-old Ann Tiya is a Form Four (senior) at Sambut Secondary School in Eldoret, Kenya, who has made great strides in her life. For one thing, she has accomplished something only few children and youth are able to do in Kenya – attend 12 years of school and be poised to graduate with a bright future ahead of her.

This would not have been possible for this orphaned young woman who first found a home in the loving arms of Phyllis Keino at the Lewa Children’s Home. It was there where she began her education 12 years ago. Supporters of Bread and Water for Africa® made it possible for Phyllis to pay her school fees for each of the 12 years as Ann steadily made progress through each grade.

“She was born and raised in a family of four children before her mother’s demise,” reported Phyllis. “She was an orphan, so she was raised up in the Lewa Children’s Home.”

Phyllis has full faith in Ann who has already demonstrated in her young life that she has the will and determination to succeed at anything she puts her mind to.

“She is working hard to achieve her dream of becoming a journalist, and her best subjects are business studies, languages and history,” added Phyllis.

In her term one academic report, her teacher expressed encouragement to Ann to “put more effort” into the subjects where she has been struggling in the knowledge that “you have the potential.”

As for Ann herself, she is grateful and appreciative of the supporters of Bread and Water for Africa’s® school fee assistance program.

“It is my pleasure to thank my sponsors for their efforts, and good hearts,” she wrote in a letter of appreciation to those who made it possible for her to continue her education to its completion.

“If not for your support, I could not have reached where I am today or even having visions and missions...or even become the person that I am today.

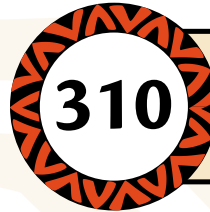

PROGRAM ACCOMPLISHMENTS



secondary school boarding students from the Lewa Children’s Home in Kenya and the local communities were sponsored for educational support, including school tuition, boarding fees, school uniforms and living expenses.



students at Kebeneti Secondary School benefited from the use of a new dining room facility constructed by Bread and Water for Africa®.

Clean Water



CLEAN WATER CHALLENGE

Africa is the world's second-driest continent after Australia. Two-thirds is arid or semi-arid. In sub-Saharan Africa it is estimated that more than 300 million of the 800 million in the region live in what the United Nations describes as a "water-scarce environment." Due to diseases linked to contaminated water, poor sanitation and poor hygiene, more than 100 people die in Africa every hour. In sub-Saharan Africa, more than one-fourth of the population, many of them young girls who should be in school, must spend more than a half-hour to collect water for themselves and their families, many times from unsafe sources.



CLEAN WATER SOLUTION

Nothing is more important for the survival of an African child and family than having access to clean, safe water for drinking, cooking, bathing and washing.

But for millions in sub-Saharan Africa, it's not as simple as turning on a tap, or even filling a container from a nearby well. Children, mostly girls, spend their days walking miles fetching water, often carrying heavy containers of water on their heads. These 5-gallon containers, weighing about 40 pounds, are filled with water from open streams containing water potentially contaminated with diseases such as Typhoid Fever or Cholera, as well as parasites which can make them sick, and can even cause death.

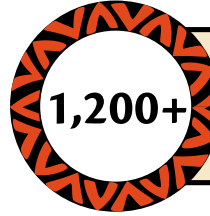

MOYA "FEELING PERFECTLY WELL WITH NO MORE DIFFICULTY BREATHING"



Moya had been living a happy life in the small Sierra Leonean village of Kojowolo before the deadly Ebola outbreak of 2014 tragically took the lives of his wife and their two children, leaving the 62-widower all alone in the empty house.

He managed to carry on his life without his family until one day earlier this year when he suffered from an acute respiratory tract infection.

After a few days as his condition worsened, he knew he needed medical attention, but he continued to suppress his pain because he had no money to pay for treatment.

"Fortunately for him, some of his friends visited him and told him about the Faith Healing Development Organization (FHDO) El Shaddai Clinic in the larger nearby village of Bunumbu and encouraged him to seek medical assistance," explained FHDO founder and director Rev. Francis Mambu, a long-time partner of Bread and Water for Africa®.

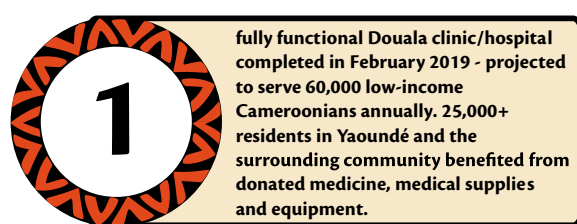
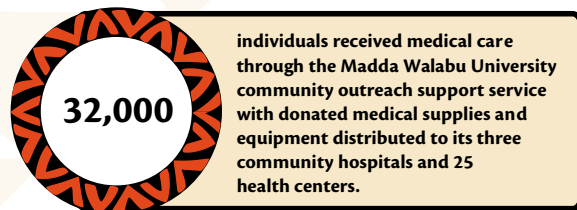
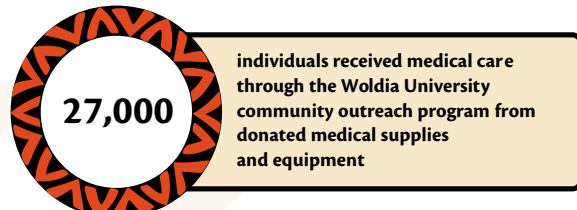
"Moya was transported to the clinic via 'hamoc' (a local swing for carrying sick people) as he was unable to walk the seven miles to a clinic on his own and the road to Kojowolo is not motorable," said Rev. Mambu.

"On arrival at the clinic, he was administered antibiotics provided to FHDO by Bread and Water for Africa® and after six days in the clinic Mohamed recovered fully and was able to walk unaided," added Rev. Mambu. "The head of the clinic subsequently discharged him and he happily went home rejoicing."

As for Moya himself, he had a few words of gratitude to the supporters of Bread and Water for Africa® for preventing what would have been certain death.

"I am now feeling perfectly well with no more difficulty in breathing. Thanks to the FHDO clinic and the supporters of Bread and Water for Africa® for saving my life."

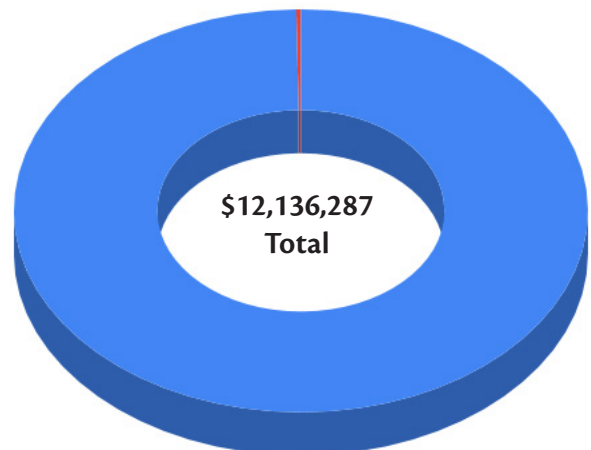
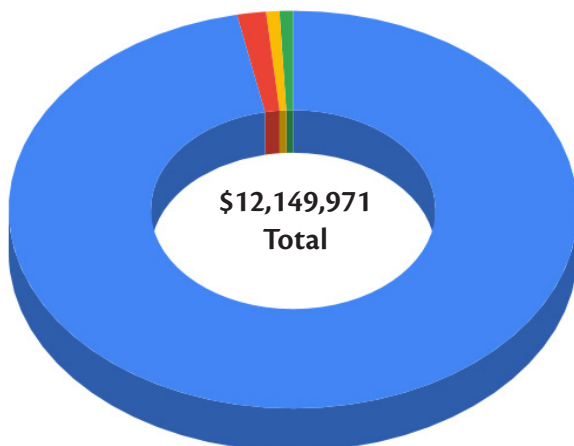
