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

show than Godspell! This timeless musical is brought to you by Cadenza Productions, a company formed in 2004 by music director Carol Salamone that performs a new show every summer. They perform exclusively at Town Hall 1873 - Centre for the Performing Arts located in Port Perry. Their mission is simple: to engage and transport audiences to keep them coming back for more, and to help increase tourism in the lovely Township of Scugog.

Among the many talented cast members is fellow Brooklin native, Liam Lynch, who has taken on the role of Jesus. Liam, who made his theatre debut nearly seven years ago (under the direction of Carey Nicholson, the director of Godspell), has now completed his second year of Sheridan College's Bachelor of Mu-

sical Theatre Performance - one of the most prestigious theatre programs in Canada. He claims that he comes from "a very creative, imaginative family (who) always had a big tickle trunk full of costumes on hand" which inspired him to write and perform his own plays with his younger brother, Kieran, from the comfort of their backyard.

As for turning his passion into a career, Liam says: "I remember doing a show when I was about 17, and we were singing the final number. I remember being onstage as an ensemble, and, before the last note even came out of our mouths, the crowd jumped to its feet and the entire theatre gave the cast a standing-ovation. I can remember that moment really clearly because I'm pretty sure I booked my audition for school the next day." Above all, Liam is thankful for his "super supportive parents who were totally behind (him) chasing (his) dreams!"

As for the show itself, Godspell highlights parables from the gospel according to Matthew through energetic song and dance. In the words of Liam, "Godspell is a beautiful, open show. It's a show with religious components. However, it is written with universal truths. All the lessons, morals, and teachings are genuinely human, and can be accepted by any member of any faith (or lack thereof).



rector Carey Nicholson has decided to modernize the show in order to make it more accessible to audiences today. Attendees are sure to leave the theatre with composer Stephen Schwartz's beautiful melodies stuck in their heads and the passion of the performers engraved on their hearts.

For anyone beginning in community theatre, young or old, Liam has but one piece of advice: "Take time to remember just how much you enjoy it. Everyone enters theatre through different circumstances, but everyone enters with a united passion. You have to remind yourself that you're doing it to tell stories, share messages, and incite change! Don't let nerves or self-doubt affect an experience. Do what you love doing and, most importantly, share that love with others!"

## **Residents Warned of** Fox Sightings in Whitby

The Town of Whitby is advising residents of sightings of foxes in north Whitby. Foxes are common in this area, and there are a number of precautions people can take to minimize conflict with these animals.

The Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry suggests that anyone who sees a fox should keep their distance. The animal will most likely humans.

If you encounter an aggressive fox: never approach or touch the animal

- do not turn your back or run
- from the animal
- back away from the animal while r emaining calm
- stand tall, wave your hands, and make lots of noise
- carry a flashlight at night
- and, if a wild animal poses an immediate threat or danger to public safety, call 911

In addition to the above, residents are encouraged to minimize food sources on their properties. Foxes are fond of fruits, vegetables, eggs, berries, seeds, and dog and cat food. Enclose food compost in secure, animal-resistant containers. Ensure bird feeders are out of reach of foxes and clean up spilled bird seed on a regular basis.

Foxes are omnivores. In addition to fruits and vegetables, they eat small animals such as mice and rabbits. To prevent conflict with pets, keep cats and dogs on a leash when outdoors.



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## BLOOMING IN BROOKLIN

There was excitement last night at 4:00 a.m. No shooting in the street; no baby arriving. It was raining! A gardener who hasn't seen rain in several weeks can get very excited at the sound of rain drops hitting the roof in the middle of the night. How often is excitement followed by the disappointment of reality? Yes, it did rain. It takes about 0.7 cm to fill my rain barrels, and this morning they were just over half full, and some parts of the garden were damp, not wet but damp.

Writing this on Monday for you to read at the end of the week, I can only hope that it no longer makes sense because we have had that good long, soaking rain, but the weather folks aren't promising much. I cannot possibly water all of the containers and garden, but I do spend about two hours most days hauling water to the many containers and moving soaker hoses to the most critical parts of the garden.

I do congratulate myself for finally doing the right thing last year. The vegetable garden has a drip irrigation system throughout most of it, and that has been a food saver. Three to four hours about every five days uses much less water than the same time with an overhead sprinkler, and all of the water goes directly into the soil to keep the vegetables thriving and they have been delicious. The system was quite inexpensive and amazingly easy to install. I'm going to extend it into some of the perennial beds, especially the two that double as Asparagus beds because I want to make sure that delightful spring vegetable truly thrives.

Various places will sell you the pieces to make such a system, but Lee Valley has some kits that are good quality and have everything you need, greatly reducing the need for thinking. \$65 and about an hour's work and suddenly you will have the greenest healthiest gardens on the street. Depending on their layout, you can also set up a drip system to take care of your hanging baskets and other containers. About the only downside of using these systems in your containers is the fertilizing. Yes, you can get injectors to put liquid fertilizer into the irrigation system, but it is neither as simple nor as cheap. The answer, of course, is to have some granular fertilizer on top of the soil so that it continues to dissolve as the water drips on to it.

Despite the constant carrying of water, my containers this year have been the best I've had in a long time. Fertilizer! That's the answer. I used to add some to my watering can on a semi-regular basis until I saw a trial ground with 2000 fabulous containers and watched them being fertilized continuously. The soilless mix that we use to plant our containers

has essentially no nutrient content. That's up to us. I now add fertilizer at a little more than half strength to every bit of water that I supply to my containers, flowers or vegetables. The difference is amazing, and what's more amazing is how long it took me to figure this out. Any good soluble fertilizer will do, but if you have a choice, use one with less Nitrogen, that's the first of the three numbers on the package. My fertilizer costs have gone up but nowhere near as high as my satisfaction


Let me climb back up onto my soap box for a while. Most of the lawns that I see are already as dry and brown as they usually get in August. If we weren't trying to grow nice green grass, we could have a vigorous, healthy, green front yard filled with delicious vegetables. My vegetable garden looks far more inviting and appealing than any of those dormant brown lawns, and it is providing delicious meals. This week, we have a choice of Broccoli, Kohl Rabi, Cabbage, Sugar Snap Peas, Snow Peas, a few green Onions and a variety of lettuces among other things. The Sugar Snap Peas are doubly delightful as they are growing up a trellis fence along with a few colours of Sweet Peas that are poking out between the bright green pea foliage.


Most of the Tomato cages are actually supporting some large flowering Dahlias that are now starting to produce huge blooms that make wonderful cut flowers for the house. There are a few weeds among the neat rows and patches of vegetables, but an hour in the cool of tomorrow morning will make short work of them and give me a time to enjoy the cool solitude of the early morning and get me some gentle exercise without driving to the gym.

Gardening has so many physical and therapeutic benefits that I find it to be the best tonic and anti-aging solution available.

## Is your child is ready for overnight camp?

The summer I turned 10 years old, I spent my first week at sleepaway camp. It was awesome. Camp is where I learned to canoe, make s'mores, and tell ghost stories with my new friends. It was the one of the best experiences of my life. As a parent, I want that same experience for my daughter - but is she ready for it?

It was only two nights and it promised to be tons of fun. On the other hand, she's six and only in grade one, Do I let her go on her first great solo adventure or wait a year?

It turns out she is ready. My daughter, 3 foot something and all 37 pounds of her, recently went to overnight camp....and she loved it!

How can you tell if your child is ready for a sleep-away camp? It's difficult to decide a right age for this experience because kids vary so much developmentally, and it really depends on the child. A mature six-year-old might be ready to go, while an immature 10-year-old might not be able to handle it.

Most children first go to camp between the ages of 7 and 10, as these are the years where children become more independent and can more easily separate from their

parents. The fear a child might have of sleeping away from home is typically not an issue. The overnight camp experience is one where a number of children and staff members sleep in a cabin together. A child is never by themselves during the day or

Your child's ability to manage the separation and your confidence in the camp make a tremendous difference in how everyone feels. Really, it's the child's expectations that will drive the experience and determine your confidence in them. When your child goes to camp, you won't be there to make sure she got all the shampoo out, so they need to be able to do everyday things like show-ering on their own. My daughter is a picky eater, and I was worried that she wouldn't eat all weekend. As it turns out, it was quite the contrary! She even came home having tried and liked many new foods.

Talking to the child about camp and what her expectations are, can help you decide if she understands what camp is and if she is ready to go. Campers who are ready develop a strong sense of self, gaining confidence and social skills in a shared, nurturing, and healthy environment. Campers mature through learning more about themselves as well as by building relationships with others. The best part of going to camp is the adventure. It is a time that children can reinvent themselves, learn many new skills and try out new activities. I knew my daughter was going to love this because she loves trying new things and making new friends.

The sense of self-reliance that develops from this sort of experience tends to be long-lasting. Once they return home, campers are often more comfortable and confident when speaking to a teacher, a coach, or friends' parents, and they're better able to co-operate with other kids.

As for my daughter, she had the time of her life. She made two new friends that weekend and tried canoeing and archery. She's already asking to go back next year...for a whole week!


### From the Archives...
