

My encouragement for you this weekend and over the entire next year is to first be thankful and pray for all the people who came before us in faith. There are thousands and thousands of Catholics over seventy-five years who have lived within or were nourished by Christ in and through our parish, many of whom have lived heroic lives of faith during their unique time in history. We know some of their stories, but we will never know the stories of so many good and holy people this side of heaven. Pray for them and especially ask God to increase our gratitude for what they sacrificed for Jesus as well as in a specific way what they sacrificed for our spiritual good today, helping to establish the foundation that has now become our day-to-day parish life. These events include our 40 hours celebration during the first Sunday night through Tuesday night in May (May 4th - 6th), our parish picnic on June 4th, our annual celebration of the dedication of the church building on July 2th, a memorial Mass for all those who have passed away on All Souls Day, Nov. 2th, and many other events and liturgies as well. We will be praying, planning, and getting organized to launch a new parish vision and mission by the end of this year-long celebration. Christ loves us too much to leave us without gratitude, without joy, and without hope and courage to live our Catholic faith right now at this moment in history with all our hearts. Gate admission for Regular is \$90.80; our price is \$44.95 (ALL ages 3+) valid until 1/4/26.



The Book of the Month for both January and February 2025 is *The Three Ordinary Voices of God* by Matthew Kelly. We gave this book away as a Christmas gift to everyone at the parish, and we will have more copies of the book to give away as well as we begin the month of February. It is a very easy, enjoyable, and engaging read at just over 100 pages. Matthew Kelly, as usual, does a wonderful job of helping us to access the deep topic of prayer us-

ing gifted story-telling, analogies and examples that come to life, and practical tips to help us follow through with this most essential habit of our faith. Sometimes we do overcomplicate how we approach our spiritual lives, and recognizing how God speaks through three of our most fundamental human experiences: our needs, our talents, and our desires; Matthew Kelly brings to life how often and profoundly God wants to speak to us and move us closer to Him. This all leads to our ultimate desire, which is our desire for God Himself, so I encourage you to give this book a chance and please consider coming to our book discussion on Wednesday, February 26th from 7:30 - 8:30 pm in the Church social hall. This is just a quick reminder, but you don't have to read or book or be an expert in prayer to attend this meeting! It is a great way to simply hear my favorite parts, get a quick summary of the book, and talk to some other parishioners about prayer and how to live our Catholic Faith in a deeper way. The Word of God Alive:

Discussing the Readings with your children.

In today's Gospel, Jesus is teaching about the kingdom of God. When we follow his teachings and treat people as Jesus teaches, we live in right relationship with God and one another. Jesus teaches with a series of blessings first, then with a series of woes, or warnings, about what it means to live as a disciple.

Jesus says, "Blessed are you who are poor" and then "But woe to you who are rich." Is Jesus teaching that it is a sin to be rich?

No, Jesus is first teaching that the needs of the poor come first. At the same time, the rich and those who are not poor, are asked to share what they have with those who are in need.

How might we share what we have with the poor?

You can donate items that we are not using, like clothing, books, toys and school supplies to those in need. You are not too young to help or work with your family to help the poor.

Jesus says, Blessed are you who are hungry, and then, "Woe to you who are filled now." What so you think Jesus is teaching with these two sayings?

Jesus teaches that nobody should go hungry, that we need to share the food we have with those who do not have enough. In our parish we have the opportunity to donate soup that is used at Hound Packs to feed the children in our area who do not have enough food for the weekend. Presently we are packing over 200 bags a week.

Jesus says, "Blessed are you who are weeping, and then, "Woe to you who are laughing now." Why would someone be weeping or crying?

There are so many things that can make us feel sad: a loved one dying, being sick, feeling left out or lonely, not making the team, when we don't get our own way or being homesick. Everyone feels sad from time to time. When Jesus says, "Woe to you who are laughing," Jeus is warning us not to laugh at someone.

What can you do to stop bullying?

You can stand up to the bully and tell the bully to stop. Or you can stand with the ones being bullied and let them know you are their friend. You should never participate in any bullying action yourself.
