STATE OF THE BIRDS 2025

On March 13, the North American Bird Conservation Initiative released the <u>2025 State of the Birds Report for the</u> <u>U.S.</u> A coalition of 19 bird-focused partnerships and nonprofit organizations, including the National Audubon Society, produced this latest iteration of the report. Once again, the report is a sobering reminder that many North American bird species are in trouble.

As with the 2022 report, "Tipping Point" species—birds that have lost 50% or more of their populations in the last 50 years—are highlighted. A new refinement in the discussion of these species is their placement in 3 groups based on threat levels: Red alert, the highest threat level (42 species); Orange alert (37); and Yellow alert (33).

Among the Red-alert species: Mottled Duck, Lesser Prairie-Chicken, Mountain Plover and Chestnut-collared Longspur. Among the Orange-alert species: Rufous Hummingbird, Stilt Sandpiper, Lesser and Greater yellowlegs, and Pyrrhuloxia. Among the Yellow-alert species: Northern Pintail, Snowy Plover, Sagebrush Sparrow, Chihuahuan Meadowlark, and Grace's Warbler.

The report looks at trends for shorebirds, grassland birds, aridland birds, western forest birds, eastern forest birds, waterfowl and waterbirds, seabirds, and Hawaiian birds. The largest declines have been with grassland birds (down 43%) and aridland birds (down 41%).

The 2022 report highlighted the long-term recovery of waterfowl and waterbird populations due to successful conservation efforts, but the 2025 report offers a note of caution: "Loss of wetlands and grasslands is accelerating in key regions for waterfowl, and wetland protections are being weakened. Environmental and land-use changes are driving recent duck and marsh bird declines in many areas."

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AT FEATHER LAKE

In summer 2021, storm runoff flooded Feather Lake to a record depth—approximately 7'8". Sediment and debris at the lake outlet had slowed the water discharge from the basin. In response, El Paso Water decided to install two water-control gates at the outlet to provide better flow between Feather Lake and its downstream companion basin, Feather Lake II. Work on that project started in late January 2025 and continues at this writing.

Want to see the new work at the outlet? Our next workdays at Feather Lake will be **Sat.**, **April 5** and **Sat.**, **June 7**, both starting at **8 a.m.** Join us. Feather Lake is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux in El Paso, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave.

STATE OF THE BUTTERFLIES 2025

Coincidentally, a week before the release of the 2025 State of the Birds report, a coalition of researchers published a paper in the journal Science entitled "Rapid butterfly declines across the United States during the 21st century." Using data from over 76,000 surveys across 35 monitoring programs, the researchers concluded: "Between 2000 and 2020, total butterfly abundance fell by 22% across the 554 recorded species. Species-level declines were widespread, with 13 times as many species declining as increasing. The prevalence of declines throughout all regions of the United States highlights an urgent need to protect butterflies from further losses." The region of the country where declines were most severe? The Southwest.

A challenging water year at Rio Bosque continues. The park has received no water Rio Bosque Wetlands Park


The park has received no water from the Roberto Bustamante Wastewater Treatment Plant since February 2.

Rio Bosque's two wells are delivering some water to the old river channel within the park, but the majority of the channel is dry, as are both wetland cells. On a positive note, the park's two White-tailed Kites have now been present for over 10 months.
