TREASURER'S REPORT AS OF NOVEMBER 30, 2024

There were no reserve expenses in November, so the reserve account remains in good shape at \$587,336.88 at the end of that month.

Operating expenses through the end of November were still over budget by about \$9,939, but this was an improvement from October, when the budget was over by about \$13,793. The three categories that contributed to this overage were landscape, utilities and the pool.

Our operating cash stands at about \$20,817. We also have a total negative liability of about

\$23,872, which bodes well for our cash situation.

The number of homeowners who are behind in payments increased slightly from 6 to 7, and the amount in arrears increased to \$4,850 from last month. Strong Management has been asked to contact the three homeowners who make up the majority of the delinquent amount to see if they need assistance.

LANDSCAPE COMMITTEE REPORT

Happy New Year!

I'm very happy to say we are going to prune 19 trees starting on January 9, 2025. Here are all the addresses:

S Temelec Circle - 153, 161, 176

St Matthew Court - 15, 16, 22, 28, 29, 34

St Patrick Court - 11, 12, 17, 18, 23, 24, 29

This is the plan, weather permitting. There will be noise cutting and grinding branches. If you have a pet nearby you may want to prepare accordingly. We start work 8 am at the earliest and finish by 5 pm. If we have to, we will finish on a second day. I know it's noisy but I look around at what we trimmed last year, the trees look so much better, healthier, happier. And if you are patiently waiting for your turn, I promise to prune tall trees every year until they are all done. I leave no tall trees behind!

January HOA meeting

Look out for the Agenda for the January HOA meeting. The plan now is to discuss drawings for possible landscape ideas. Please bring your thoughts and an open mind. This is a chance to change how we use our public spaces. Imagine having a handicapped accessible path to enjoy, with a cane or a walker or a wheelchair. A handrail to hold on to for safety. Moss on the roof

shingles and can lead to roof rot and leaking. A handy person can pick the moss off your roof, then treat it to prevent the moss from

coming back. You have to treat the roof, even if you remove the moss. Spores are there, you can't see them until they come back next year.

Finally, I have a favor to ask. If you need anything concerning landscaping in your yard, please call or email me and do not make requests for work from the Waldron workers. I speak with the owner and manager of Waldron. I don't talk to the guys working because they have to get permission from the Waldron

managers to do anything. If you ask them to do things in your yard, you are making them uncomfortable. Thank you for your understanding.

Hope to see everyone interested at the January HOA meeting.







From the FDIC Consumer News Bulletin:

How Gift Card Scams Work

Gift card scams start with a call, text, email, or social media message. Scammers will say almost anything to get you to buy gift cards — like Google Play, Apple, or Amazon cards — and hand over the card number and PIN codes. Here are some common tactics scammers use in gift card scams:

- Scammers will say it's urgent. They will say to pay them right away or something terrible will happen. They don't want you to have time to think about what they're saying or talk to someone you trust. Slow down. Don't pay. It's a scam.
- Scammers will tell you which gift card to buy (and where). They might say to put money on an eBay, Google Play, Target, or Apple gift card. They might send you to a specific store often Walmart, Target, CVS, or Walgreens. Sometimes they'll tell you to buy cards at several stores, so cashiers won't get suspicious. The scammer also might stay on the phone with you while you go to the store and load money onto the card. If this happens to you, hang up. It's a scam.
- Scammers will ask you for the gift card number and PIN. The card number and PIN on the back of the card let the scammer get the money you loaded onto the card even if you still have the card itself. Slow down. Don't give them those numbers or send them a photo of the card. It's a scam.

Common Gift Card Scams

Scammers tell different stories to get you to buy gift cards so they can steal your money. Here are some common gift card scams:

- Scammers say they're from the government. They say they're from the IRS, the Social Security Administration, or even the FTC. They say you must pay taxes or a fine. But government agencies won't contact you to demand immediate payment, and they never demand payment by gift card. It's a scam.
- Scammers say they're from tech support. They say they're from Microsoft or Apple and there's something wrong with your computer. They ask for remote access and say to pay them to get it fixed. Don't give them access to your computer. It's a scam.
- Scammers say they're a friend or family member with an emergency. If the scammer uses voice cloning, they may even sound just like your loved one. They ask you to send money right away but not tell anyone. It's a scam. If you're worried, contact the friend or relative to check that everything is all right.
- Scammers say you've won a prize. But first, they tell you to pay fees or other charges with a gift card. It's a scam. No honest business or agency will ever make you buy a gift card to pay them for a prize. And did you even enter to win that prize?
- Scammers say they're from your utility company. They threaten to cut off your service if you don't pay immediately. But utility companies don't work that way. It's a scam.
- Scammers ask for money after they chat you up on a dating website. Romance scammers will make up any story to trick you into buying a gift card to send them money. Slow down. Never send money or gifts to anyone you haven't met in person even if they send you money first.
- Scammers send a check for way more than you expected. They tell you to deposit the check
 and give them the difference on a gift card. Don't do it. It's a scam. That check will be fake, and
 you'll be out all that money.

What To Do If You Gave a Gift Card to a Scammer

If you bought a gift card and gave someone the numbers off the back of the card, that's a scam. Use your gift card and gift card store receipt for these next steps:

- Report the gift card scam to the gift card company right away. No matter how long ago the scam happened, report it.
- **Ask for your money back.** Some companies are helping stop gift card scams and might give your money back. It's worth asking.
- Tell the FTC at ReportFraud.ftc.gov. Every report makes a difference.
