College open houses are worth attending

s Atticus Finch of "To Kill a Mockingbird" **L** so lovingly explains to his daughter, Scout, "You never really understand someone until you consider things from his point of view ... until you climb into his skin and walk around in it."

Sage advice for many instances in life; and even more so when trying to discern which college is right for you. If you have the time and money, going to a college's open house is very valuable.

Most colleges — but not all welcome newly admitted students with some kind of informational open house that's intended to help students make their acceptance decisions.

On the agenda is usually a welcome speech by the college president or dean, a campus and dorm tour, a Q&A session with current students and workshops on financial aid. Several colleges offer overnight options and chances to sit in on classes.

Typically, these events happen before a student has to commit to a school; most are in April, although some were in March, and parents are invited to attend as well. Unfortunately, many are on the same day, so it is helpful to figure out ahead of time which ones to attend. The Davis High School counseling office should have the most current list of open house schedules, and you can find them listed on each school's website.

What to consider

Open houses are different than campus tours and preview days in the fall. It is a chance to really "try on" the college. So what should a student look for and do at an open house?

■ Social/emotional fit. Connect with the other prospective students in attendance. Are these students with whom you would enjoy going to class, sharing a dorm room and just hanging out? Also, ask questions of current students to



learn as much as possible about the social life and emotional well-being of the student body.

- Academic options. Attending open house is an opportunity to learn more details about academic requirements and expectations. You may have a chance to meet with faculty and sometimes an adviser or a counselor, which will help you better understand how the college could further your academic interests.
- **Learning support**. If you need accommodations for learning challenges, open house is the ideal time to meet with people from the student disability center to learn about which services are appropriate and how and when to set those up. Discussing longer-term considerations such as counseling needs and medication management also may be helpful in deciding whether the school is a good fit.
- Parent education. Open houses not only provide parents a chance to get to know the college, but also to learn important information ranging from financial-aid intricacies to how to ease the transition for students to more independence. Many parents I work with find these sessions to be extremely useful and reassuring.
- Take care of business. Many colleges have admission counselors available for questions during an open house. If you decide the college is the one for you, there are often options to submit an acceptance form and register on the spot.

Tips

Here are some little tips to make the day go smoothly.

Take pictures and exchange contact information with other prospective students who may be helpful to know in the future. Since the majority of time during an open house is often spent outdoors walking around, bring sunscreen and wear comfortable shoes and layers. If the tour includes seeing the dorms, bring a measuring tape to measure storage possibilities in the rooms.

As you "try on" your new potential schools, enjoy the excitement that comes with charting your course to the next stage.
