March 2021 SIGP Awards Ceremony

On Wednesday, March 10, 2021, Soroptimist International of Grosse Pointe (SIGP) held its Annual Awards Ceremony virtually on Zoom. More than 50 people joined the online event, which included 28 SIGP members, 5 awardees and their families, award judges and other guests including Midwestern Region Governor-elect Christine Shearer, and District III Director, Kellie Klingel.

SIGP co-presidents, Marya Malkovich and Ellen Chapin hosted the Zoom call. Each awardee received a gift bag that included an award check, yellow rose, restaurant gift card, award certificate and a fun and clever “survival kit” (see p. 10).

The Live Your Dream (LYD) award is the signature award of Soroptimist International of the Americas. It honors women who are going to school to improve employment opportunities, are the head of household, enrolled in a training or educational program and have financial need.

The first-place winner, Ariel Jewell, \$3000

The second-place winner, Tonesia Loyd Nesbitt, \$2000.

The third-place award winner, Jeritha Brown, \$1,000.

SIGP awarded the Virginia Wagner Educational Award of \$3,000 to Briana Cruga. The Virginia Wagner award is a Midwest region award given by each club in the region to a woman who is enrolled in a university degree program (Bachelor, Master or Doctorate), who has a financial need and serves as a volunteer in the community. Our winner was also chosen as the Midwest Region Virginia Wagner award winner. She will be receiving an additional award of \$2,500.

The Soroptimist Ruby Award is given to women who have made a positive difference in the lives of other women and girls. Tanesha Windom, founder of My Sister’s Keeper, was awarded a \$500 donation to be used toward mentoring and advocating for young women aged 7-24.

This year the Continuing Education Award in the amount of \$500 was given to previous LYD award winner Lavina Hutchinson. This award is given to provide additional support and mentorship to previous LYD awardees.

Each awardee was introduced by an award chairwoman and then given an opportunity to speak. All the awardees expressed their gratitude for the monetary award and explained how the money would help them to continue in school. After hearing the struggles these women endure, SIGP members know their fundraising efforts will have a profound affect on these women’s lives.

Briana is currently enrolled at the University of Michigan-Dearborn where she is earning a Bachelor of Science degree in Biological Sciences. Upon graduation she intends to pursue her interest in public health and ultimately obtain a medical degree. Her goal as a physician is to use integrative and preventive medicine techniques to help mobilize communities and resources to deliver healthcare to vulnerable populations. As a self-described "STEMinist," she is an ardent proponent of women having careers in STEM or traditionally male-dominated fields.

What is so amazing about Briana is her drive to gain experience to be the best physician she can be. She helps to pay for her tuition and contribute to her family's expenses by working as a medical technician/phlebotomist and as a supplemental instructor providing interactive and collaborative review sessions for fellow students.

Her volunteer activities have included: 1) student researcher in faculty-sponsored biochemistry and psychology labs; 2) Detroit Regional Dollars for Students alumnus; 3) President of the One University organization in Dearborn; 4) coordinator for Biology Club and Mindful Medicine events on campus and 5) teaching Bible lessons for young children in her church.

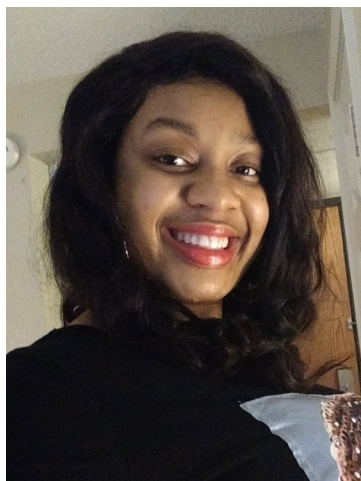
SIGP Business Meeting

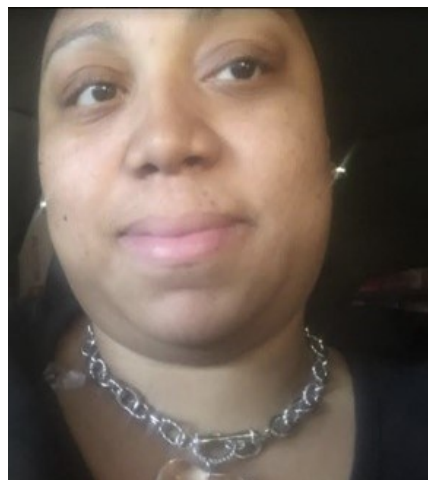

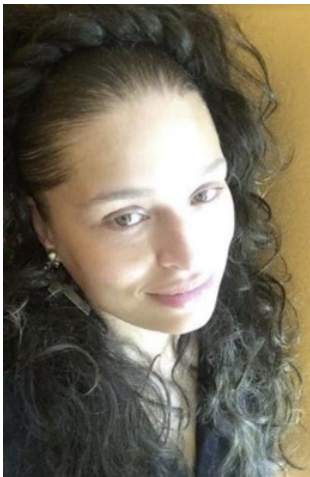

This ambitious project grew in response to her own tumultuous adolescence. She turned her pain to purpose by reaching the growing number of hurting, under-privileged, under-valued, and under-served young ladies who could benefit from her love, experience, guidance, and resources.

She has worked tirelessly, without a salary, and often uses her own finances to safeguard the trajectory of today's youth and to change their narratives.

Ms. Tanesha, as she is affectionately called, is a professional counselor and member of the National Counseling Association. She earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in Business Administration from Rochester and a Master of Arts degree in Community Mental Health Counseling from the University of Detroit Mercy.

Tanesha is the mother of two young-adult sons and a native of Highland Park. She has received accolades for her work, particularly the UAW-Ford Community Award. Her goal, which she is well on her way to achieving, is to mentor one million youth.

Four Updates from SIGP's Human-Trafficking Awareness Committee

Next Human Trafficking Committee meeting: Tuesday, April 13, 6:00 p.m. on Zoom

1. The Grosse Pointe & Greater Macomb clubs are partnering this year on two human-trafficking awareness events. In the month of January, weekly emails were sent of video interviews from knowledgeable experts sharing their knowledge and insight of the most current information about human trafficking. Each club posted these recorded interviews on their website and distributed them to family, friends, and members.
2. Both clubs have agreed to fund a short documentary video that curates the most salient points from these interviews. This project is being put together by Bev Todd, of the Greater Macomb club, Laurie Jost and myself, Karrie Blankenship. We hope to have this documentary completed and ready to be shown in early fall or sooner.

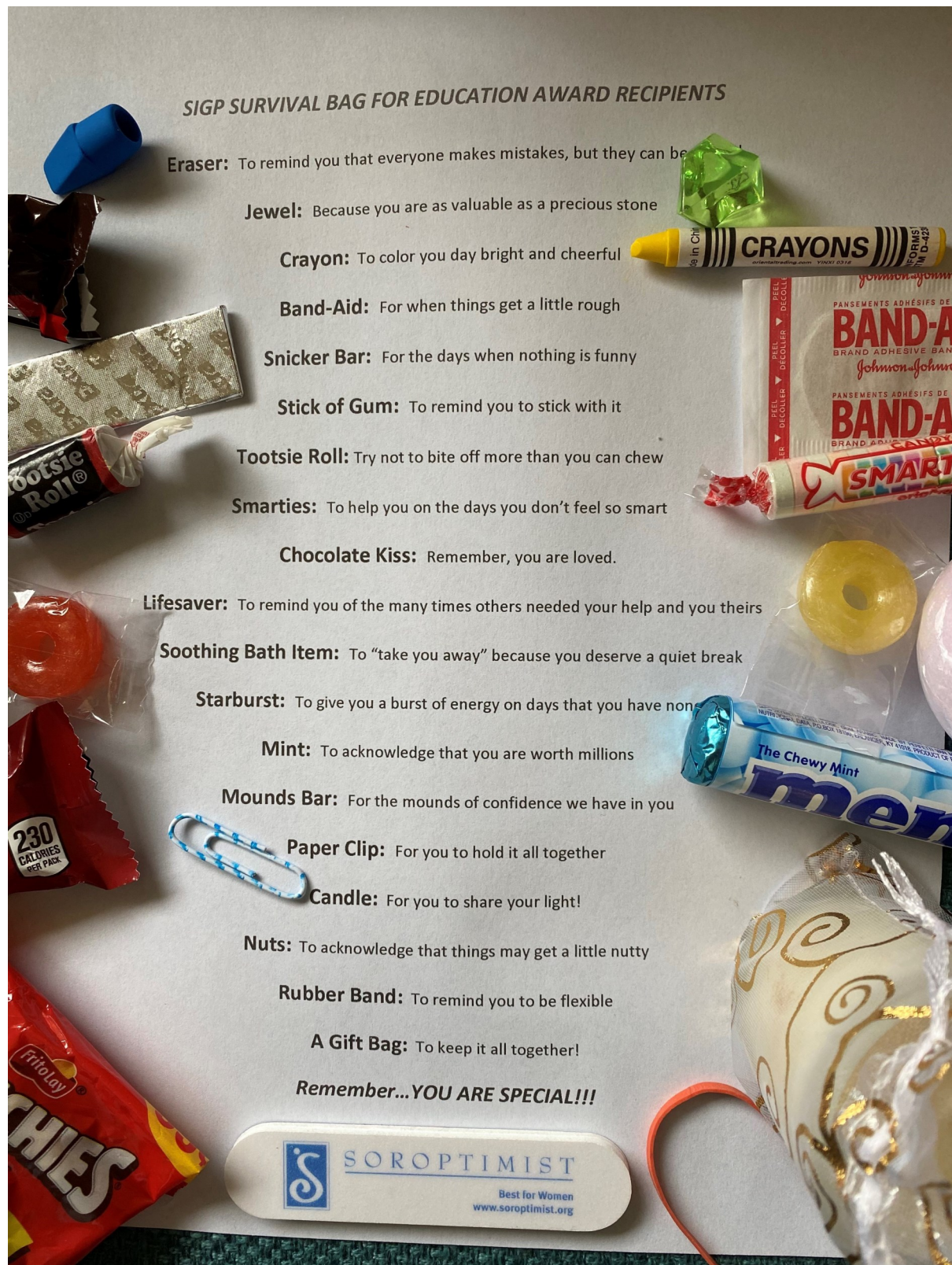
