Blessedness of giving: John D. Rockefeller, Sr., was a millionaire at age 23. At the age of fifty, he was a billionaire. He was the richest man in the world, but he was a miserable, rich man. At the age of 53, he was eaten up with physical diseases and ulcers. He was a grabber, not a giver. He was always trying to get more money and he was a greedy man. Greed had so consumed him, that at the age of 53, the doctors told him he had one year to live. Just one year. Here's a billionaire, the richest man in the world, and all he could eat that year, all that his stomach could handle was milk and crackers. Milk and crackers. The man could go out and buy any restaurant in the world, buy it; he could have any food before him on the table, but it wouldn't do him much good. It was in that year, that Rockefeller began to look at his life. He said, "I have all these possessions, and I've never been a giver." That's when he decided to become a giver. He gave to Churches, to hospitals, to foundations, and to medical research. Many of the discoveries we've had in medicine have come from money provided by the Rockefeller Foundation. — That man who had only one year to live at age 53, began to live, and began to give, and do you know what happened to him? He started releasing all of the internal negative things that were killing him. He got rid of his stress, his tension, and his ulcers, and he lived to the age of ninety, a saint to many.

2025 marks the 1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea (in modern-day Turkiye). In the year 325, some 318 bishops gathered in Nicaea for an ecumenical council to discuss matters of great importance to the church. One of the greatest achievements was the definition of the faith in the form of a creed. Since the 1960's, in Canada, we have prayed the Apostles' Creed at Sunday Masses and Solemnities. The Apostles' Creed, whose present form is similar to the baptismal creed used in Rome in the second and third centuries, actually developed from questions addressed to those seeking baptism.

To highlight the 1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea, the Council of Priests have recommended that the Nicene Creed be used, throughout the Archdiocese of Winnipeg, in 2025. The Archdiocese of Winnipeg is encouraging parishes pray the Nicene Creed at all Sunday Masses and Solemnities. However, during Lenten and Easter seasons the praying of the Apostles' Creed is preferred. It is Apostolic Administrator Richard Gagnon's fervent hope that the use of the Nicene Creed, throughout 2025, will unveil for us the rich theological beauty of this ancient profession of faith.

Dear Padre,

I have always been an "every Sunday" Catholic. My problem is that holy Communion doesn't feel that special. I believe that it's the Body and Blood of Christ, but receiving feels "routine." Sometimes I'm even distracted while receiving. Help?



Do you remember the story of the transfiguration of Jesus? (See Luke

9:28–36.) Jesus took his three special disciples, Peter, James, and John, up on the mountain, and while Jesus was praying, what did they do? They fell asleep! In the very presence of Jesus, their Lord and Master.

Human beings cannot maintain feelings of awe and ecstasy for long periods of time. We would be exhausted. Feelings don't always reflect the specialness of the moment. That is why good habits are so important. Feelings may elude us, but we can fall back on the habit of Sunday Mass. Just as two contented, long-married people don't feel like they did on their honeymoon, they still quietly enjoy the habit of each other's company.

Lent is coming soon. You might consider shaking up your routine a little. Attend one weekday Mass. Prepare for Sunday Mass by reading the Scriptures for that Sunday and praying the entrance antiphon or the psalm. If you don't already, consider volunteering as a choir member, lector, or extraordinary minister of holy Communion. Meanwhile, continue to receive holy Communion, giving thanks that it is readily available, and perhaps offer a prayer for communities where Communion every Sunday is not possible. •



It's All about the Roots

here we put down our spiritual roots matters. For some, the old adage "Bloom where you are planted" may offer wisdom; however, the prophet Jeremiah reminds us that if we find ourselves planted in a lava bed or a salty and empty land, we won't do much blooming. We'll be no more than a shriveled, barren bush. So, where we plant our inner spiritual lives makes a difference.

This week's gospel may seem to sap all the joy out of life. Woe if you have money to spend, a banquet to feast on, fun and laughter to dress up your days. Woe to you, it seems to caution, because when you die, the opposite will be your lot. What's so wrong, we wonder, with having cash in our pockets, food on our tables, and a good time once in a while? Life can be downright dreary otherwise.

The answer, of course, is that there is nothing wrong with any of that—unless that's where we put down our roots. In other words, if that's what life is all about, sooner or later, we are likely to discover we have become a barren bush standing in lava waste. Jesus didn't come to suck the joy out of life but to give us a heads up on how to live a life that is full. He hoped we might avoid the lure that can become a wasteland. He hoped we might become "like a tree planted beside the waters that stretches out its roots to the stream" (Jeremiah 17:8).
