Unfortunately, due to circumstances beyond our control BHPCNS, as you know, will not be opening our doors this fall. It is my sincerest hope and wish that circumstances change and allow us to reopen at some point in the foreseeable future. Thank you to everyone for your understanding, your kind words, your generous donations, and for believing in BHPCNS. While being closed is not what we had hoped for, the school will be using this unexpected time advantageously to enhance our programming and physical space.

Carolyn McCauley and I continue to work on behalf of the school. We are grateful for the opportunity to work to make BHPCNS the best it can be and to maintain a connection with you and your children. Our beloved teachers are leading pods, tutoring, teaching at other programs, spending time with family, and more. They, too, can't wait for the day BHPCNS reopens!

I am writing this newsletter from the school office. Outside there are several families playing on the playgrounds, despite the hot and humid weather. It's wonderful to see so many friends, even if their smiles are hidden by a mask, playing and having fun. Please continue to come and take advantage of these play spaces. I was chatting with one mom about how much of our lives are happening indoors, without friends and the social-emotional impact and gross and fine motor impact on her children. Also happening at school - The finishing touches on our long awaited security upgrades are being completed. Our new security systems are helping Montgomery County police with a stolen car that was abandoned in our parking lot. The new exterior camera system has taped the thief as he hit the car on the barn like doors hiding the trash dumpsters, parked the car, and then walked away. During the summer other improvements have been made to the facility as well.

- Exhaust fans have been added to improve ventilation
- The former Bethesda Jewish Congregation Education Office on the lower school level, has become part of the school. We are very excited to have this additional space as part of the school. We will be converting this space into:
 - A lending library, where children can check out books and go for story time and/or small group instruction

• A meeting space and working space when the school office becomes a bit too crowded or a specialist/therapist is on site to work one on one with a child. This means no more meetings in the stairwells!

• An infirmary for when a child needs to receive care of rest while awaiting a care giver to collect them. In the weeks and months to come there will be purging, painting, reorganizing, inventorying, and more, all in anticipation of reopening.

In past years, each September, I have sent an ASQ-3 questionnaire home for every child in our care. (A full description appears after my letter.) If you would like a questionnaire for your child/ren, please let me know. I am happy to email you the questionnaire and have you return it to me for scoring. If there are any questions or concerns we can set up a video call to discuss the results.

Most importantly, just because our doors are closed to the physical school building that does not mean the school is closed to you. I am happy to answer questions about your child, provide parenting resources, discuss most child rearing topics, and more! We plan to hold a virtual Potty Training seminar in October. This is always a hot topic for the parents in our 2s' programming! Details will be sent out as soon as we have them finalized. I will continue to send home monthly newsletter with information about what's happening at school and ideas to keep you child/ren thriving in these most unusual times. Please reach out – no question or concern is too big or too small. Interacting with you and your children is the absolute best part of my job – I miss you all.

MORE ABOUT THE ASQ-3 SCREENING TOOL & THE IMPORTANCE OF EARLY INTERVENTIONS FOR CHILDREN'S DEVELOPMENT



At BHPCNS we believe that early intervention for any developmental delay can make a tremendous difference in a child's life. There is a wide range of normal development in children. Most developmental delays in children are not serious and with interventions children can quickly catch up to their peers. Even children who do have serious delays can make big improvements when treatment begins as early as possible.

Each September BHPCNS sends home an ASQ-3 questionnaire as the first step in determining if a child may possibly have a developmental delay. After completing the questionnaire, parents return the form to school and I evaluate and score the questionnaire. Results and recommendations are shared with parents. Any recommendations for a more thorough developmental assessment will be discussed with parents by me. How Developmental Delays May Present In Young Children

There are 5 main types of developmental delays in infants and young children. They include problems with:

- •language or speech articulation, expressive, and/or receptive language
- •vision ability to see properly
- •movement fine and gross motor skills, understanding boundaries, controlling one's movements
- •social and emotional skills age appropriate interactions with adults and peers
- •cognitive skills thinking and processing information

Language and/or Speech Delays in toddlers and young children are common. In fact, language and speech problems are the most common type of developmental delay. Speech refers to verbal expression, including the way words are formed.

Language is a broader system of expressing and receiving information, such as being able to understand gestures, respond appropriately to questions, being able to follow the give and take of daily conversation and more.

Vision Developmental Delays can be difficult to recognize. Until about 6 months a newborn's vision is normally blurry. After 6 months a child's vision improves as the child begins to coordinate sight in both eyes. Sometimes this does not happen and vision problems such as farsightedness, near sightedness, lazy eye, may develop impacting a child's sight.

Motor Skill Developmental Delays may be related to problems with gross motor skills, such as crawling or walking, or fine motor skills, such as using fingers to grasp a spoon, hold a pencil or crayon, or more. Some children have challenges controlling their movements, they may be bouncy, or have challenges recognizing where they are in space leading to walking into things or obstacles, and/or understanding personal boundaries.

Social and Emotional Developmental Delays may be when a child experiences problems interacting with adults or other children. Other challenges include excessive tantrums, hurting themselves, being inconsolable, and difficulties forming attachments, among others.

Cognitive Developmental Delays may present as a child not "learning" age-appropriate concepts, such as their colors or shapes, or when a child is challenged following sequential directions and developmental norms.

SUMMER SECURITY ENHANCEMENTS



The safety and well-being of the children entrusted to BHPCNS has always been our top priority. To that end BHPCNS has been working with security experts for the past two plus years to determine the best ways to keep our children, their families, and are staff as safe as possible while still enjoying all the BHPC campus has to offer. Based on those recommendations many key action items have been implemented.

SECURITY ENHANCMENTS

- New doors have been installed where the main school (brown) doors are located. These doors are stronger and safer than the previous wooden doors and they look great too. At this entrance a new entry system, similar to an apartment building has been installed. This will allow families and visitors to the building to directly contact the building users they are to coming to see, i.e. the school, the church, the BJC, the Friends Club.
- New security cameras have been installed inside the entire building and the exterior of the property. These cameras will provide the school office, and other building users, the opportunity to see what's happening in real time via monitors in their offices.
- A building side, unified mass communication system has been installed. This new system will sent silent and loud speaker messages in the event of an emergency anywhere on the property. All building users, including teachers and BHPCNS staff will be able to communicate quickly and directly with everyone in the building at once.
- Additionally, all the doors leading to the lower level of the building, where the school is located, have been replaced with new doors which can lock automatically and will be opened by using a code, thereby preventing non-BHPCNS visitors from mistakenly entering the school area.



SEPTEMBER FUN!

Go on a Nature Walk:



One of our favorite September books is We're Going on a Leaf Hunt. Use this book as a jumping off opportunity to go on a leaf/nature hunt and collect beautiful fall leaves and then have a wonderful time:

- 1. Sorting the leaves by color, reds, yellows, green, or size, or match shapes. Activities such as these help a child develop pre-math skills needed to form the foundation for formal math programming.
- 2. Have you child count the number of leaves you collect by placing a finger on each leaf and counting one, two, three, etc. This process is another pre-emergent math skills, called one to one correspondence.
- 3. Glue leaves, twigs, acorns, grasses, to a piece of construction paper and make a collage. This is an excellent fine motor, open-ended art activity.

4. You can also make a mobile to hang in your child's room by tying leaves and fall finds on different lengths of string and hanging them from a twig you collect.

5. You can show your child how the veins of the leaf look like the veins on the back of their hands. Get a magnifying glass to inspect the veins, leaves, and your child's hands more closely.

6. Another fun activity is to preserve your child's favorite leaves. <u>Click here for ways to press leaves</u>.

7. While you are on your nature walk you can, lay on the ground and watch the clouds. See if your child can identify shapes in the clouds. You can look for birds, worms, squirrels, chipmunks. See if you can find their homes. Talk about what the animals do as the weather gets colder.

8. Make a bird feeder to hang in a tree in your yard. <u>Here's a favorite BHPCNS birdfeeder</u>. You can substitute any kind of nut butter for the peanut butter. Another favorite bird feeder to make, that doubles as a fine motor activity is <u>a cheerio and pipe cleaner birdfeeder</u>. For older children make the bird feeder using colored O shaped cereal, like Fruit Loops, and have your child create and replicate a pattern on their pipe cleaner. This is another great pre-math skill.

9. As you hike about looking for leaves and other signs of fall, mix up how you walk, take giant steps, small mouse steps, swing your arms, wave them above your head, hop on one foot or jump with both feet. (All these activities keep your child's gross motor skills growing stronger.)
