

The Rector writes

Dear Friends

Many of you will have heard about Pentecost, which comes on June 8th this year. Or if not Pentecost, you may well have heard of the Holy Spirt. Pentecost is the day when the Holy Spirit came upon the apostles while they were gathered for prayer in Jerusalem.

Coming 10 days after Jesus' Ascension into heaven, the descent of the Holy Spirit turned the apostles from a collection of fearful followers looking for some direction into a band of courageous witnesses ready to declare their faith in Christ to the whole world.

Pentecost is the birthday of the Church because that was the day when newly filled with the Holy Spirit, St. Peter preached the first Christian sermon, inviting his listeners to turn to Jesus as their Saviour and their Lord. Those who accepted the invitation were baptized and "were added" to the Church (Acts 2:41). That day marked the beginning of the Church's public mission, which continues to the present.

But the Holy Spirit's actions in the Church were not limited to the apostles in an ancient time. He remains active down to the present, guiding Christians in their daily lives.

The Spirit, moreover, acts not only in the Church as a corporate body, but also in the lives of individual Christians. The Spirit unites us more closely to Christ, increases the spiritual gifts we have been given, and strengthens us to spread and defend the faith.

Ultimately, Pentecost is more than simply a feast celebrating something that happened a long time ago. Of course, the coming of the Spirit we read about in Acts 2 took place just once. But the Holy Spirit remains active today, guiding the Church as a whole, but also working in the life of each individual Christian.

Maybe you don't feel as if the Holy Spirit is working in your life. Well, God the Father gave us free will, so we can choose whether or not we'll obey Him. And God the Holy Spirit, being united in the one Godhead with the Father and the Son, honours that freedom. He'll never force us to turn away from sin or compel us to obey God's commandments. The Spirit offers us grace. He will beckon us toward heaven, and occasionally we may feel Him nudging us along, but we always have the freedom to choose God or to reject Him.

Perhaps you've made a commitment to worship at Communion at least weekly and spend some time each day in prayer. Maybe you have promised to use some of your talents in parish ministries and service to the community. Or maybe you are just wondering what all this means. If you have questions about Jesus, about faith we will be holding an Alpha course in the Autumn, to help answer those questions, more details to follow.

FATHER'S DAY

Father's Day began because in 1909 there was a woman in Spokane, Washington, U.S.A., named Sonora Louise Smart Dodd. That year she heard a church sermon about the merits of setting aside a day to honour one's mother. Mother's Day was just beginning to gather widespread attention in the United States at this time. But Sonora Louise Smart Dodd knew that it was her father who had selflessly raised herself and her five siblings by himself after their mother had died in childbirth. So the sermon on mothers gave Sonora Louise the idea to petition for a day to honour fathers, and in particular, her own father, William Jackson Smart. Sonora Louise soon set about planning the first Father's Day celebration in Spokane in 1910. With support from the Spokane Ministerial Association and the YMCA, her efforts paid off, and a 'Father's Day' was appointed. Sonora Louise had wanted Father's Day to be on the first Sunday in June (since that was her father's birthday), but the city council didn't have time to approve it until later in the month. And so on June 19th, 1910, the first Father's Day was celebrated in Spokane. Gradually, other people in other cities caught on and started celebrating their fathers, too. The rose was selected as the official Father's Day flower. Some people began to wear a white rose to honour a father who was dead, and a red one to honour a father who was living. Finally, in 1972, President Richard Nixon signed a presidential proclamation declaring the third Sunday of June as Father's Day – a permanent, national holiday in the United States.

YOURS?

The names of things can tell us a great deal about them. Alveley comes from a Saxon woman's name " Alfith." Field names tell us if a field is poor. "Clem gander" means it would starve your geese. "The enclosure" means that it was once common ground before the act of enclosures in 1773.

People's names are just the same. There are 7 types of surnames.

Patronymic. Derived from a father's name eg JOHNSON, WILSON, PEAR-SON, STEPHENSON.

Toponymic. You originate from a place eg WOOD, HILL, KNOWLES. (a knol is a small hill or mound)

Occupational. This reflects the trade of an ancestor eg BAKER, SMITH, MIL-LER, COLLIER.

Characteristic eg LONG, BLACK, WHITE.

Ancestral or clan names eg STEWART, CAMERON.

Estate names, common among the aristocracy eg WINDSOR.

Bynames, which describe a particular characteristic such as BROWN or LIT-TLE.

Here's a random selection of mostly local names. LEWIS. From old French or middle English the anglicised form of the Welsh name Llewelyn. LEACH. From middle English when physicians used leeches in the medieval practice of blood letting. ALDWINCKLE. Originates from a place in Northamptonshire and refers to "old" and "wincle" a prominent bend in the river Nene. SUTH-ERLAND. Obviously from Scotland. Did they settle in Shropshire after the infamous Highland clearances of 1750 when people were evicted to make way for sheep? HYDE. Refers to someone living on a hide of land which was a medieval unit of measure, approximately 120 acres. BAXTER. From the old English word baecestre meaning Baker which is the masculine form or bakster the feminine form. SHERRY. Could be from sheriff with the 'f' dropped. Or from Jerez in Spain where fortified wine is made or most likely from Macsherry meaning son of seartha, an Irish form of geoffrey. ARCHER. Someone who uses a bow and arrow. BOWYER. Someone who makes the bows. ARROWSMITH. Makes the arrows. FLETCHER. The person who makes the flights on an arrow called fletchings made from goose or turkey feathers. STRINGFELLOW. Makes the string for the bow. THORLEY. Probably from a location where thorny vegetation had been cleared to make way for a settlement or for agriculture. RUDD. From the old English meaning someone with a red or rosy complexion. Ruddy. ARMSTRONG. A common name

from the Scottish Borders. A nickname for someone of great strength or prowess in battle. NORGROVE. Comes from 'Northern Grove' or from two places in Worcestershire. Norgroves End Farm or Norgrove Court. WAGSTAFF. A beadle or clerk who would waggle his staff or stick, which may have a sort of medallion attached to the top, to show his authority. This is my mother-in-law's maiden name and may be appropriate or not. You decide.

FRANCE. Literally someone who originates from France. At the time of the Norman conquest? KENNEDY. Has Irish and Scottish connections from 'O'Cinneidigh or mac'cinneidigh. 'O' and 'mac' both mean son of. And Cinneidigh means head or helmeted chief. CRESSWELL. Comes from the old English carse (cress) and wieland (stream) likely a place in either Staffordshire, Derbyshire or Northumberland where watercress grows near a stream. SIRRELL. Likely from Normandy before the time of the conquest in 1066. And my own name PAGE. From middle English and old French meaning a young servant or attendant particularly in the courts of the nobility. Since at least two of the bellringers claim descent from royalty this seems appropriate. And last but certainly not least the name SCRIVEN. Scriveners were scribes or clerks known to have helped compile the Domesday book of 1086 that recorded the land and villages and people that William had conquered in 1066. This article is dedicated to the memory of Bill Scriven who did so much to record the past and present history of this village. R.I.P.

ALVELEY COMMUNITY PROJECT TO SHOWCASE PLANS AT OPEN DAY





ALL IN THE MONTH OF JUNE

500 years ago, on 13th June 1525, German Protestant Reformer Martin Luther married Katharina von Bora, a nun whom he had helped to escape from a convent.

250 years ago, on 14th June 1775, the Second Continental Congress established the Continental Army. Later it became the United States Army. On 15th June, George Washington, who would become first President of the USA, became the Army's Commander-in-Chief. This army would defeat the British army, and America would declare independence the following year, on 4th July 1776.

175 years ago, on 24th June 1850, Herbert Kitchener, the 1st Earl Kitchener, was born. This Irish-born British Army officer and politician became Secretary of War during WW1, when he appeared on an iconic poster asking people to join the army. He was killed in 1916 when his ship was hit by a German mine.

90 years ago, on 1st June 1935, driving tests became compulsory for all new drivers in Britain.

70 years ago, on 11th June 1955 the Le Mans disaster took place. A car spun off the track during the Le Mans 24 Hour race in France, and the driver, Pierre Levegh, and 83 spectators were killed, with 100 more injured. It was the greatest loss of life in the history of motorsport, but bizarrely, the race was not stopped. The survivors carried on for the full 24 hours, while the dead and the injured were removed from the site.

65 years ago, on 28th June 1960, the Six Bells Colliery disaster took place in Monmouthshire Wales. 45 coal miners were killed by a gas explosion.

50 years ago, on 7th June 1975, the first Cricket World Cup to be held in England began.

Also 50 years ago, on 18th June 1975, the first North Sea oil was pumped ashore to Britain.

40 years ago, on 2nd June 1985 UEFA banned all English football clubs from playing in European competitions following the Heysel Stadium disaster of 28th May. The ban was lifted after five years.

25 years ago, on 10th June 2000, the Millenium Bridge opened in London. It closed for a while two days later, when it was found to sway uncomfortably when people walked in step.

15 yeas ago, on 28th June 2010, the US Supreme Court ruled that American citizens have the right to own a gun, regardless of which state they live in. The right is protected by the Second and the Fourteenth Amendments. There are an estimated 393 million privately owned guns in the USA, and about 340 million people.

THE BACK PAGE

On the day after Pope Francis's funeral the Head Gardener and I flew to Rome, arriving in the early afternoon. Our taxi from the airport to our overnight hotel took us past the Basilica Santa Maria Maggiore where he was laid to rest. There was a VERY long queue of people waiting patiently to file past his tomb. The following morning the taxi taking us to Civitavecchia to meet our cruise ship also passed the Basilica and the queue was equally long and equally patient. The Pope died on April 21st. On May 8th, just seventeen days after the death of Pope Francis, the conclave elected the new Pope, Leo XIV and the official process, the Conclave, had only started after Pope Francis's funeral.

On 6th January this year Justin Welby resigned as Archbishop of Canterbury and now, 128 days later, we still don't have a clue who will be his successor. I suspect it will be much later in the year that we will eventually find out, after a long, drawn out process.

It is similar with interregnums in the Church of England. Rev. Neil Dunlop took his last services in the parishes in November 2021 - although it was known he was leaving some time before that - and our new Rector, Rev Jon, took up his post in January 2023, some 14 months later. That is not unusual in the Church of England - a friend in Salisbury Diocese tells me that we were lucky it was only 14 months.

Whilst the church powers-that-be will say that the process is to ensure the right person is appointed, the cynic in me suggests that it's a good way to save money - though not necessarily for the parish, and it places a huge burden on church wardens and others. If a pope can be appointed in 17 days or less one must wonder about the current position with the Archbishop of Canterbury as well as the long interregnums in parishes.

The Head Gardener and I enjoyed our cruise, visiting, among other places, Pompeii. This had been on our bucket list and we found it fascinating. The only disappointment was that it was very busy and full of tourists. When I mentioned that to the Head Gardener she quickly pointed out that we were two of them!

Later in the cruise we visited Dubrovnik. There seemed to be little evidence of the war. We wandered through the old town and I marvelled at the sight of the city walls, about 1.2 miles long and with 1080 steps, and was amazed to remember that I had done that walk on my previous visit, about 40 years ago when Dubrovnik was in Yugoslavia. 40 years on and my knees informed me that there was no way they were going to attempt that walk with over a thousand steps to climb!
