Dear Church Family,

As we shared previously, this COVID 19 virus is quite fluid, and we are trying our best to work on a plan as we move forward over the next days, weeks, or months?

While we could become distressed about what we are going through, we can also view it as an opportunity for God to show up powerfully through His people.

I want to express my sincere appreciation to you for your response in this challenging time in the life of our Nation and World. It is encouraging and heartening to see so many of you living out your faith in real-time!

As a result of the Corona virus, we as a church are experiencing issues we would never have anticipated only a few short weeks ago. The primary concern is safety. Please follow the guidelines: stay home when you are sick, cover your coughs, and wash your hands often with soap and water at least for 20 seconds. 





HOW TO PRAY

Question: How do I start?

Answer: Praying is not as hard as you might think. What is hard is getting into the habit of talking to God everyday. Maybe you could start by picking a time everyday. so that I will always continue to abound in hope through the power of your Holy Spirit. 3



Lent is the period of time to reflect on the events that led Jesus to Calvary. Its begins with Ash Wednesday and covers a period of forty days (excluding Sundays) culminating with Holy Week (including Passion/Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday). Lent is a time of fasting, sacrifice, and preparation.

Color: Purple (violet or lilac) is the color used to denote royalty, praying, fasting, and penitence. It represents a symbol of the majesty of Christ, and Jesus' humanity, suffering, and fasting.

A guideline given by some money managers is as follows: Give 1/10 (tithe of your income to God). Put 1/10 in savings. Put 1/10 in an emergency account until three months of pay is set aside. Live on the remaining 7/10 with freedom to work towards giving as much as possible to God's work.

Eastertide covers a fifty-day period (six Sundays) that challenges persons to reflect on the resurrection of Jesus. Ascension Day is celebrated the sixth Thursday after Easter and commemorates the last manifestation of Jesus to His followers after the resurrection. (Luke 24:50-51 and Acts 1:2-11.) Ascension Sunday is the Sunday following Ascension Day. The season ends with the Day of Pentecost.

Color: White is the appropriate color for the season, with gold as an accent color. White is symbolic of light, joy, purity, glory, and the bright light of truth.

Hope for a Better Life

Devotional Reading: Isaiah 53:4-12

Scripture:

1 Corinthians 15:1-8, 12-14, 20-23, 42-45.

DECLARATION:

The Resurrection of Christ

1 Now I would remind you,
brothers and sisters, [a] of the
good news [b] that I proclaimed
to you, which you in turn
received, in which also you
stand, 2 through which also you
are being saved, if you hold
firmly to the message that I
proclaimed to you-unless you
have come to believe I vain.

³ For I handed on to you as of first important what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, 4 and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, 5 and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. ⁶ Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters [c] at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. [d] ⁷ Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. 8 Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me.

¹² Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say there is no resurrection of the dead? ¹³ If there is no resurrection of the dead, then Christ has not been raised; ¹⁴ and if Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation has been in vain and your faith has been in vain.

²⁰ But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died. [a] ²¹ For since death came through a human being, the resurrection of the dead has also come through a human being; ²² for as all die in Adam, so all will be made alive in Christ. ²³ But each in his own order: Christ the first fruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ.

⁴² So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. ⁴³ It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. ⁴⁴ It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. ⁴⁵ Thus it is written, "Thus it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living being"; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit.

Affirmation: We embrace the call to proclaim the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ despite ridicule or resistance!

ENGAGE

Many of us have hopes that life can be made better for us and our families. We strive in this life to live good and wholesome lives and build the foundation of a better future for our children. Others who experience suffering and injustices in this present life do not put their trust in it but in their hopes for an afterlife where the hardships suffered in this present life will be reversed, and they will be rewarded with good for the endurance of previous suffering.

- Discuss with one another how faith in the Resurrection figures in your daily life as a Christian. Discuss the significance you place on it as you labor in the church and the community For example, are you relying and depending on it, and does it have priority in your hope for the future?
- List ways the Resurrection motivates us to work for justice with hope. Discuss with the group.
- 3. Discuss and share how each of your expectations of the form and nature of the resurrected life compare and contrast. How do our hymns and other spiritual songs influence our expectation regarding the nature of our resurrected life?

 Do we have a definite source that defines the nature of our resurrected life?

EDUCATE

People struggle with the concept of life after death. How can resurrection from death provide life that is different from what is experienced before death? In 1 Corinthians and Mark, only life through the resurrection of Christ engenders hope for authentic

justice. The church at Corinth, which Paul had established, was composed of diverse groups who had come into the faith from other religions where there were differences of beliefs concerning various issues. In 1 Corinthians 15, Paul strongly addresses one of those issues, the belief in the resurrection from the dead. The Gnostic believers, for instance, believed in immortality of the soul but had problems with a resurrection of the body, which was considered an evil imprisonment of the soul. For the Christian, this belief was rooted in what Job means when he said, "After my skin has been destroyed, yet in my flesh I will see God" (Job 19:26). Jesus' resurrection displays and confirms it, and Paul in 1 Corinthians 15 goes a long way in explaining it.

1 Corinthians 15:1-8: In explaining the nature of the Resurrection, Paul confronts the conflicting views among the Greeks, who readily embraced the immortality of the soul but had trouble with the notion of the body raised (Acts 17:32). To counter those who doubted it, he gives concreate proof of Jesus' resurrected body, witnessed first by the eleven disciples and later by hundreds of others. And he explains that the forgiveness of their sins and the assurance of their salvation depends on it. If they deny the truth of the Resurrection, then their faith is in vain.

1 Corinthians 15:12-14: The rhetorical questions Paul put to the Corinthians here reflects the usual method of argument typical of Greek rhetoric. It is thought-provoking. He invites them to reflect on what he had previously taught them and how central the Resurrection is to their faith. "Denying all resurrection logically denies Jesus' own resurrection. If we affirm his resurrection but deny the possibility of bodily resurrection for all people, then we are negating Jesus' humanity (contrast John 1:14). Such

Jesus' death that gives us new life.... That would mean that we are still liable to the penalty for our sins (1 Corinthians 15:18). Without the possibility of the resurrection from the dead, the entire Christian message collapses; the Christian life becomes an exercise in futility...." (Standard Lesson Commentary, P.281).

1 Corinthians 15:20-23: Jesus did not elaborate on the theological meaning of His resurrection and connect it to Adam, but Paul extends his explanation of death to all as seen in the situation of Adam and the new resurrected life in Christ as the second Adam, through whom life eternal is restored to all.

1 Corinthians 15:42-45: Paul makes a logical point about the nature of the body of the resurrected person in contact to the old body. stating that there are many kinds of "bodies," in which case the resurrection body is a new, nonperishable body specially gifted from God (v. 45-48). "Paul uses the two-Adam analogy...to contrast sin and death versus eternal life. He reminds us that Adam's body was lifeless until God breathed life into it (Genesis 2:7). Only then did Adam become a living being. In the resurrection, our dead bodies will receive life again, given by the last Adam, who is Christ. The risen Christ participates as a life-giving spirit in our bodies' return to life from death... Christ is the one who has the power to recreate and restore life to our bodies. The new body in and of itself is not enough, even if it is imperishable, glorious, and powerful" (lbid., p. 283).

ELEVATE

As Christians, we celebrate the resurrection of Christ as a sign of hope for justice. It is not a "pie-in-the -sky" type of hope, for we enjoy the rewards of new life in Christ right now (Ages 18 and up) International in our daily living. Songs such as "Blessed Assurance, Jesus Is Mine" express that present joy. Yet we look forward to a newly resurrected life different from the present one where denial nullifies the sacrificial power of all sorrow and suffering will be turned

into joy and celebration. While we experience joys and sorrows now, in the resurrection, as the hymn "Must Jesus Bear the Cross Alone?" so poignantly phrases it, we will "taste unmingled love and joy without a tear."

Discuss further how Christians experience a sense of resurrection renewal and restoration in the present life due to their spiritual life in Christ. How does this take place and how might it be increased?

To what extent are Christians willing to bear courageously the sorrow and suffering in the present life as we look forward to the hope in the life to come? How does this belief square with our concept of justice?

I THINK:

- 1. Roleplay the scene of Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Saome coming to the tomb early and encountering the young man, and what follows (Mark 16:1-8). Discuss how the story of the Resurrection relates to Paul's teaching about the Resurrection in 1 Corinthians 15.
- 2. Discuss the meaning of the Resurrection of Christ as a sign of hope for justice.
- 3. Research and discuss the differences between resurrection and reincarnation and the Christian belief regarding the two.

VERSE OF THE WEEK:

If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied. But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died. 1 Corinthians 15:19-20.

The key to many customs and traditions in Lent is what down through the ages has come to be known as Holy Week, the last week in Lent. It has becomes a tradition to trace the activities of Jesus that led to the cross of Calvary. Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday as a reminder of Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. The people along the roadside waved palms and shouted "Hosanna" the Hebrew word for "save now." (See Matthew 21:1-11, Mark 11:1-10, Luke 19:28-40, and John 12:12-19.) Many churches today bless the palms and distribute them in the form of crosses to be worn by the worshipers.





MAUNDY THURSDAY

Maundy Thursday lifts up the event of the Lord's Last Supper that was celebrated in the Upper Room at the time of the Jewish Passover. It is the basis for the establishment of sacrament of Holy Communion. Historically, the Passover marked the Israelites' departure from Egypt when the final plague was cast upon the Egyptians to smite the first born dead (Exodus). The Hebrews received special instruction to kill a lamb the or goat for each household and to sprinkle the blood on the doorpost and the life of the first born would be spared. Every Jew/Hebrew was required to celebrate the Passover, and the Lord's Last Supper was Jesus' observance of the Passover. However, Jesus brought new meaning to this event as it commemorated Israel's

deliverance from Egyptian bondage – all of humanity was delivered from sin.

The Lord's Supper was the last meal that Jesus shared with the disciples before going to Calvary. It occurred on what is called Maundy Thursday. "Maundy" is a variation of the Latin word "mandatum" meaning "commandment" (see John 13:34). The significance of God's love for humanity comes forth in this act because it was and is through Jesus' blood and body that persons are redeemed. Therefore, the new commandment requires persons to love one another just as God loves all persons. The Latin word "Mundo" means to wash, and some claim this is how Maundy Thursday came into being, since Jesus washed the disciples' feet on that day. Some denominations and congregations still carry out the practice of washing feet before Holy Communion, at least on Holy Thursday.

Yet another tradition credits the name to the word "maund" for basket and the practice of giving baskets of goodies to the poor. Whatever the source, Maundy Thursday is practiced in just about every Christian church with either a love feast or Holy Communion being participated in by all. One cannot but help call to mind the celebration of the feast of the Passover by Jews. Christians celebrate similarly, for this is in remembrance of the Lamb of God who willingly shed blood for the sins of the whole world.



GOOD FRIDAY

Most authors agree that the term "Good Friday" evolved from "God's Friday." It is one the three days that many persons make an effort to attend church, the other being Easter Sunday and Christmas Day. Services in most churches last about three hours since generally, the seven last words of Jesus are used.

The Seven Last Words are:

- 1. "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." Luke 23:34
- 2. "Today, you will be with me in Paradise." Luke 23:43
- 3. "Woman, here is your son, ...Son, Here is your Mother." John 19:26-27
- 4. "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani? My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

Mark 15:34 and Matthew 27:46

5. "I am thirsty." John 19:28 6 "It is finished." John 19:30

7. "Father, into your hands I commend My Spirit." Luke 23:46

More and more today, however, times and length of services are being arranged to meet the working schedules of most parishioners. Good Friday represents the day of that dreadful crucifixion and is not just a day of mourning. It is a day of remembrance of the events of the day, especially the time Jesus hung on the cross. It is appropriate

to leave the alter bare and use no liturgical color. However, if desired, black may be used. In many countries, the old practice was (and in some instances still is) not to cook on Good Friday. Rather, one drinks some beverage and eat hot cross buns. Like most other customs and traditions, cross buns have pagan origins. According to Rudolph Brasch, it was part of a pagan festival of bread offered to idols at spring time. Horns were stamped on the buns. This, however became the mark of the cross. It not only was a symbol, but served a practical purpose. When these buns were used in love feasts, it was easier to divide one into four pieces.



EASTER

Easter Sunday commemorates the glorious resurrection of Jesus from the dead. It is the other highest point of the Christian Year. Thus, joy and celebration engulfs the season as the Christian Church rejoices in the fact of the resurrection and its meaning to the Christian faith, hope, and life. Many wonder why Easter occurs on various Sundays from year to year? Easter does not occur on a set day like Christmas because it is determined by the moon and the seasons in nature. Thus, for most Protestants and Roman Catholics, Easter falls on the Sunday near the beginning of Spring, which is also after the first full moon. Because of the fluctuating cycle, Easter Sunday can occur anywhere between March 22 and April 25. Therefore, Easter is a

determining factor in the cycle that sets the beginning and end of some of the seasons. The number of days in the season of advent (four Sundays weeks prior to Christmas), Christmas / Christmastide (from Christmas day to the day before Epiphany-January 6, twelve days), Lent (forty days, excluding the Sundays), and Eastertide (fifty days), are constant seasons in terms of length. The Season After Epiphany, The Season After Pentecost, and Kingdomtide experience the variation from year to year.

Easter has been described as the oldest festival of the church. It truly is the key to Christianity, since it emphasizes the redemption of humans. Note that in the early Christian Church, the word used for Easter was *Pascha*. This is from the Hebrew word for Passover. The closeness and similarity between the Jewish Passover and the celebration of Lent and Easter should be recalled and remembered. The Jews observed the *Passing Over* of the houses of the Israelites who had the blood of the lamb smeared upon the posts of their houses, by the death angel during their sojourn in Egypt. This was the final plague before Pharaoh agreed to let God's people, the Israelites go. For Christians, the blood that saves persons from eternal damnation is the blood of Jesus, shed upon the cross at Calvary. Easter, like the word Lent, has nothing to do with the reason for celebrating these occasions. Rather, Easter comes from the name of an Anglo-Saxon spring goddess, *Easter*, whose festival was observed at the spring equinox. Easter is indeed THE DAY of the days in the church calendar. This is the day that celebrates Christ's resurrection from the gave. Without the resurrection, there would be no Christian Church. This is why many Christians moved their day of worship to Sunday. So, not only is it a day of worship, but a little Easter, when persons remember that Christ rose from the dead. (See Matthew 28:1-7, Mark 16:1-8, Luke 24:1-12, and John 20:1-10.)

The observance of Lent would have no meaning if it were not for that victorious first Easter. The crucifixion without the resurrection would not be a victory and would destroy the essence of the Christian faith and God's redemptive act. To be resurrection signifies that something or someone who was dead has return to a living state. Christ's resurrection was a demonstration of that fact and a revelation of God's power over sin and death. Thus, the agony and tragedy of the cross was transformed into a joyous celebration and God's fulfillment of the covenantal promise was affirmed. ALLELUIA! Jesus arose as a "mighty triumph over His foes" and lives forever. The liturgical color for Easter/Eastertide is white, symbolizing purity. Along with white, gold is often used to give emphasis to this most holy day of the church year.

I can mentally predict the ancestral origins of many African Americans I meet day by day. Forget about the 'mythical and stereotypical' claims that all black people look alike. We do not. To me, that is akin to thinking that all tall people are good at the sport of basketball. Hogwash!

To me, the Norman Nigerian context was much more than mere conjecture. I detected what I thought, at the time, was a distinct tribal marking on his face. And, any student-observer of African tribal markings would agree with me that the Yoruba of the south western

Nigeria were most notable in that practice. Even though it is gradually becoming a dying practice, a few left over from the pre-colonial West Africa, are still around. So, it was kind of a let-down when over the years, it became apparent to me that Norman's mark was not a tribal

There were other personal traits that gave him away to my selfprescribed skill of predicting ancestral origins. Norman Leon Bishop had a special, unbridled affinity to commerce and trading. His impeccable love of the finest in clothing (outfits), be it formal, casual or business casual, was another. They all pointed to me, the Yoruba bloodline that ran in his veins. I wondered silently, if he ever thought about it. Or, even knew anything about the Yoruba. Unfortunately, of all the numerous discussions and prospective deals he and I concocted, the origins of his embryonic/underlying traits never came up for discussion.

So, here we go. Norm and I became very close associates within a few days of meeting one another. I became a board member of his popular non-profit organization, Positive Solutions. Inc. He in turn. became a mentor to me on the various aspects of forming and maintaining a 501c(3) organization. During the period around the turn of the millennium, Norm and I bonded so closely and deeply together, we were always in the company of each other.

He helped me create and then register my own non-profit, Leead International, Inc. From that moment on, we spent countless hours helping each other with numerous tasks and chores. We went to places, too. It was during those days when, with the Rites Of Passage group of children and adults from Cross Street, we visited the seaport in Mystic, Connecticut to volunteer our efforts in the recreation of the Amistad ship, that I met Pete Seeger and became a life-long associate of his. Following that, Norm and I frequented events by the folk music icon. And Pete constantly invited me to his appearances all over. Naturally, I would bring Norm along with me, and he never let me down. He accompanied me to New London a

couple of times to see Pete Seeger in relationship between Middletown, concert at a Marina.

I wonder who still remembers when the entire board of Positive Solutions was invited as guests to New York, at a United Nations session on the Aids pandemic. It is hard to believe this, but at one time Wesleyan Professor Charles Lemert had proposed nominating Norm Bishop for the United Nations Nobel Price for Peace, on account of his relentless efforts and creative instincts with the Positive Solution organization.

It wasn't too long before I became African artifacts, which led to the a board member of East River Apprentice Shop, an extremely laudable non-profit organization created by Pete and other New Yorkers. They would grab wayward and troubled teenagers of the New York City school system and attempt to provide them with the necessary skills and fortitude to design and build small boats for sailing on the East River of New York. As a board member, I frequently visited New York for meetings and other businesses. More than once, I would invite Norm to come with me and we had great time hanging out with Pete Seeger.

At the peak of these events, just right before and around the so-called Y2K, millennium era, Norman Bishop and I came up with several ventures. He proposed to use untapped labor to do manual assembling work for a manufacturing company. We also proposed to import arts and craft then, had been hit tremendously hard by the aids epidemic. The rational, mostly that of Norm's thinking, was to the safety and security professionals put such patients to do meaningful but easy crafting, with the intention that it would keep them busy, give them some sense of hope and aspiration, while earning them a few dollars to support their daily lives in their respective countries. Being originally a Ghanaian native, I took the role of visiting and trying to garner business in that venture. We even created a 'sister-city'

Connecticut and my hometown, Kumasi, Ghana, with the sole purpose of giving people living with the aid virus a viable way to make a living. That never worked out, because back home in Ghana, most aid-victims, at that time, didn't want to be identified. There was such resistance to the entire concept that I couldn't find any single individual all over the places I visited who had tested positive for the disease.

The arts and crafts concept fared better when Norman connected with a local New London importer of East opening of the popular "Peoples Back Room Store" which started to trade in ethnic and other African American cultural wares, for a while. That's when the Nigerian-like commercial acumen in Norman Bishop essentially manifested itself. Those were the days. Within a few months of opening the store in the old Clock Tower Mall in down town Middletown, it became the one and only go-to place for all gift ideas when authentic, ethnicity was the theme. In this part of New England, you only see such a store and its offering largely in New Haven or mainly in parts of the 125th Street in Harlem, New York City.

Norman Bishop made a name for himself in the Middletown business community. He was equally found in the association of local clergy just as much as the city's chamber of commerce. He surrounded himself with the likes of Wesleyan University ware from African countries which, by professionals as well as big names of the city hall. He was known to the local medical personnel as well as in the city. Even though he, like me, were members of the Cross Street, A.M.E. Zion church, he still successfully corroborated with various other churches in town for his organization. The most popular event of those years was Positive Solutions' annual fund-raising banquet which was very successful.

I will be remiss if I did not touch

on the one experience that tied him eternally to the community up to his private interment. Norm and I both signed up to become members of the local free masonry lodge, the George W. Crawford Lodge No 21 in town, something I think he must have convinced me to look into doing. We

both studied and attended classes until he eventually got inducted into the fraternity and I bailed out somehow. Any time I caught a glimpse of the emblem and evidence of his lodge membership on the bumper of his BMW, I was profoundly reminded of the one fellow American

who had made the most impact on my personal psyche than anyone individual. May he rest in the eternal peace in the bosom of his maker, for he lived a worthy life.

documented in numerous places for anyone's interest. You are going to have the opportunity to decide for yourself the depth of the ill-reputation of the Klan in the history of this country as you read the following speech by Ida B. Wells-Barnett, written in 1909. I sincerely forgive you, if you've never heard of this great, illustrious daughter of the Negro race.

Born to slaves. Ida B. Wells-Barnett was educated at Rust in Mississippi and Fisk in Tennessee. She wrote for several news papers, notably the Memphis Free Speech, the Chicago Conservator and the New York Age. She started and maintained a one-woman journalistic crusade against lynching. Read what she had to say in a speech to the NAACP's first annual conference in Atlanta, Georgia on May 8, 1909. From "Great Speeches by African Americans" edited by James Daley.

"The lynching record for a quarter of a century merits the thoughtful study of the American people. It presents three salient facts: First, Lynching is color-line murder. Second, crimes against women is the excuse, not the cause. Third, it is a national crime and requires a national remedy.

Proof that lynching follows the color line is to be found in the statistics which have been kept for the past twenty-five years. During the few years preceding this period and while frontier law existed, the execution showed a majority of white victims. Later, however, as law courts and authorized judiciary extended into the far West, lynch law rapidly abated, and its white victims

became fewer and far between.

Just as the lynch-law regime came to a close in the West, a new mob movement started in the South. This was wholly political, its purpose being to suppress the colored vote by intimidation and murder. Thousands of assassins banded together under the name of the Ku Klux Klans. "Midnight Raiders," "Knights of the Golden Circle," etc., etc., spread a reign of terror, by beating, shooting and killing colored people by the thousands. In a few years, the purpose was accomplished, and the black vote was suppressed. But mob murder continued.

were lynched, down to the present, lynching has been along the color line. Mob murder increased yearly until in 1892 more than two hundred victims were lynched and statistics show that 3,284 men, women and children have been put to death in this quarter of a century. During the last ten years from 1899 to 1908 inclusive, the number lynched was 959. Of this number 102 were white. while the colored victims numbered 857. No other nation, civilized or savage, burns its criminals; only under that Stars and Stripes is the human holocaust possible. Twentyeight human beings burned at the stake, one of them a woman and two of them children, is the awful indictment against American civilization-the gruesome tribute which the nation pays to the color

Why is mob murder permitted by a Christian nation? What is the cause of this awful slaughter? This question is answered almost daily - always the same shameless falsehood that

"Negroes are lynched to protect womanhood." Standing before a Chautauqua assemblage, John Temple Graves, at once the champion of lynching and apologist for lynchers, said: "The mob stands today as the most potential bulwark between the women of the South and such a carnival of crime as would infuriate the world and precipitate the annihilation of the Negro race." This is the never-varying answer of lynchers and their apologists. All know that it is untrue. The cowardly lyncher revels in murder, and then seeks to shield himself from public execration by claiming devotion to women. But truth is mighty and lynching record discloses the From 1882, in which year fifty-two hypocrisy of the lyncher as well as his crime.

> The Springfield, Illinois, mob rioted for two days, the militia of the entire state was called out, two men were lynched, hundreds of people driven from their homes, all because a white woman said a Negro assaulted her. A mad mob went to the jail, tried to lynch the victim of her charge and, not being able to find him, proceeded to pillage and burn the town and to lynch two innocent men. Later, after the police had found the woman's charge was false, she published a retraction, the indictment was dismissed and intended victim discharged. But the lynched victims were dead. Hundreds were homeless and Illinois was disgraced.

> As a final and complete refutation of the charge that lynching is occasioned by crimes against women, a partial record of lynchings is cited; 285 persons were lynched for cause as follows: Unknown cause, 92; no cause, 10; race

Is there a remedy, or will the nation confess that it cannot protect its protectors at home as well as abroad? Various remedies have been suggested to abolish the lynching infamy, but year after year the butchery of men, women and children continues in spite of plea and protest. Education is suggested as a preventive, but it as grave a crime to murder an ignorant man as is scholar. True, few educated men have been lynched, but the hue and cry once started stops at no bounds, as was clearly shown by the

lynchings in Atlanta, and in Springfield, Illinois. Agitation, though helpful, will not, alone, stop the crime. Year after year lynchings go on. Public sentiment does measurably decrease the sway of mob law, but the irresponsible bloodthirsty criminals who swept through the streets of Springfield, beating inoffensive law-abiding citizen to death in one part of the town and in another, torturing and shooting to death a man who for threescore years had made a reputation for honesty, integrity and sobriety, had raised a family and accumulated property, were not deterred from the heinous crimes by either education or agitation. The only certain remedy is an appeal to law. Lawbreakers must be made to courageous conference of patriotic, know that human life is sacred and that every citizen of this country is first a citizen of the United States, and secondly, a citizen of the state in which he belongs. This nation must assert itself and protect its federal citizenship at home as well as abroad. The strong arm of the government must reach across state lines whenever unbridled lawlessness defies state laws and must give to the individuals under the Stars and Stripes the same measure of protection it gives to him when he travels in foreign lands. Federal protection of American citizenship is the remedy for lynching. Foreigners are rarely lynched in America. If, by mistake one is lynched, the national government quickly pays the damages. The

recent agitation in California against the Japanese, compelled this nation to recognize that federal power must vet assert itself to protect the nation from the treason of sovereign states. Thousands of American citizens have been put to death and no President has yet raised his hand in effective protest, but a simple insult to a native Japan was quite sufficient to stir the government at Washington to prevent the threatened wrong. If the government has power to protect a foreigner from insult, certainly it has power to save a citizen's life. In a multitude of counsel there is wisdom. Upon the grave guestion presented by the slaughter of innocent men, women and children there should be an honest, law-abiding citizens anxious to punish crime promptly, impartially and by due process of law, also to make life liberty and property secure against mob rule."

This was over a hundred years ago, in 1909, when the klan was clearly known to have been behind most of the atrocities. Fast forward to 2017. now the hood is off, and they are emboldened by recent events and want to drag us all back to those days of mob rule, again. This is the background of the urgency with which the counter-protestors showed up in Charlottesville, Virginia. As if you never knew that - but just in case.

Having discernment to know the time period we are living in and the signs of the times was evidently important to our savior.

Discernment gives us understanding and understanding gives us perspective and the ability to allow God to put us in our perfect place in these times.

Discernment and understanding also gives us a mind set which sets our topic for discussion.

Having the mind of Christ in these times means having control over our thoughts. For it is our thoughts which are the foundation of how we conduct ourselves from day to day.

So important are our thoughts that our brother Paul said they were part of our spiritual warfare in 2 Corinthians 10:4-5; "(For the weapons of our warfare are not

Our every thought must be brought under obedience to Christ. With that said, when we look at some of the things Jesus told us it's no wonder so many people today especially during these tumultuous times are finding it difficult to live in the moment and enjoy each precious moment God has given us.

We want perfect peace but how is this accomplished? We don't want to worry about tomorrow but find it harder than ever to live for today.

We get so busy in the hustle and bustle we wonder if we will ever have time for what's important and needful.

And yet, Christ gives us the answers to all of these most common anxieties that plague society and especially the good Christian.

First, let's look at perfect peace because it all begins in the mind and without peace our minds cannot be used by God to their fullest potential.

Isaiah 26:3-4 Tells us, "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on thee: because he trusteth in thee. Trust ye in the Lord for ever: for in the Lord Jehovah is everlasting strength:"

Perfect peace comes to a person whose mind is stayed on Christ and Christ alone. Why? Because that mind is trusting Him for everything. Trusting Him for our very next breath even. When we trust Him peace always follows and because He is so good, He throws strength in as well to give us the ability to continue to trust.

When it comes to fear and anxiety Christ gives the remedy as

well and again it has to do with our 6:25,31,33-34 Jesus himself says to us. "Therefore I say unto you, Take no thought for your life, what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink; nor yet for your body, what ye shall put on. Is not the life more than meat, and the body than raiment? Therefore take no thought, saying, What shall we eat? or, What shall we drink? or, Wherewithal shall we be clothed? But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you. Take therefore no thought for the morrow: for the morrow shall take thought for the things of itself. Sufficient unto the day is the evil thereof."

It's pretty clear God doesn't want you and I to be thinking about tomorrow at all. That's Gods business not ours.

With the thoughts of tomorrow in the hands of God we are free to live for today and that is a thought which brings much peace and joy to the Christian.

Furthermore, Paul encouraged the Philippian brethren to; "Be careful for nothing; but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God. And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus. Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things." Philippians 4:6

The word careful here means anxious or nervous. God truly wants us in prayer. Our prayer life will certainly determine our mindset. There are days when we must fight to find that time to run into our prayer closets but it is absolutely necessary.

It was said to me many years ago that prayer is our direct line to God. Think of it as picking up the telephone and talking to God personally and intimately as you would in your most personal relationship on earth. He wants to hear it all

1 Thessalonians 5:17, "Pray without ceasing" Paul tells us.

Finally, one of the most important and needful things we can do is spend time reading God's Holy Book, The Bible.

Remember Martha? She was very busy much like we can be. Jesus explained to her that only one thing was needful and Mary chose what was good .

When we look at how crazy things can be lately and how much our busy schedules try and dictate our course of action, we can take comfort in sitting at the feet of Jesus and listening to His words.

Luke 10:41-42: "And Jesus answered and said unto her, Martha, Martha, thou art careful and troubled about many things: But one thing is needful: and Mary hath chosen that good part, which shall not be taken away from her."

Having the mind of Christ in these times is trusting the Savior for everything.

Having our mind on Him only. Having our thoughts on today and not tomorrow.

Having a healthy prayer life. Taking the necessary time to listen as He speaks.

Doing these things will keep us all in a spirit of peace, joy and stability in very uncertain times.

"For who hath known the mind of the Lord, that he may instruct him?

The Power of Encouragement **Peter Chin**

The whole assembly became silent as they listened to Barnabas and Paul telling about the signs and wonders God had done. Acts 15:12

Read: Acts 15:12-21 (NIV)

Insight

A little detail mentioned in Acts 15:12—"the whole assembly became silent"—is significant. A "sharp dispute and debate" had arisen (v. 2), with Paul and Barnabas on one side and certain believers on the other. These believers insisted that non-Jewish Christians had to adhere to Jewish law and be circumcised. The text tells us, "After much discussion, Peter got up and addressed them" (v. 7). We can imagine how heated that discussion must have been, but Peter outlined a rational defense of the gentiles' faith (v. 7). He noted how they too had the Holy Spirit, just as the Jewish believers did (v. 8). Peter added, "We believe it is through the grace of our Lord Jesus that we [Jewish believers] are saved, just Let's thank God for the moments we receive as they [gentile believers] are" (v. 11). Peter's calm response to the dispute, along with the testimony of Paul and Barnabas, preserved and enhanced unity in the church.

When he was a young boy, Benjamin West attempted to draw a picture of his sister, but he succeeded only in making a mess. His mother saw his creation, kissed him on the head, and remarked, "Why, it's Sally!" He would later say that it was that kiss that made him an artist and the great American painter he would become.

Encouragement is a powerful thing!

Like a child learning to paint, Paul didn't have much credibility early on in his ministry, but Barnabas affirmed his calling. It was through Barnabas's encouragement that the church accepted Saul as a fellow believer (Acts 9:27). Barnabas would also encourage the fledgling church of Antioch, helping it to become one of the most influential in the book of Acts (11:22-23). And it was through Barnabas's encouragement, as well as Paul's, that the Jerusalem church embraced the gentile believers as Christians (15:19). So, in many ways, the story of the early church is really a story of encouragement.

The same should apply to our own lives. We might think encouragement is merely saying something nice to someone. But if we think that way, we fail to recognize the lasting power it possesses. It's one of the means by which God shapes our individual lives as well as the life of the church.



Why Do We Go To Church?

Use Of Spiritual Gifts

1 Corinthians 12 makes it clear that God has given spiritual gifts to every Christian. Verse 7 states that these abilities are not provided to make you feel good; they are abilities to minister that should be used for the common good! 1 Peter 4:10 commands us to use spiritual gifts to help each other. The same passage makes it clear that we meet with other Christians so they can use their gifts to strengthen us. God's gift of a preacher or teacher is wasted if no one comes to hear him or her speak.

Mutual Ministry

The church is pictured as a body and in 1 Corinthians 12, Paul explains that each part of the body exists to meet the needs of other body parts. In the same way, God intends each of us to meet the needs of other believers, using our strengths to help in their areas of weakness. 1 Corinthians 12:21 expresses it this way: "The eye cannot say to the hand, I have no need of you". Neither can a Christian claim to be self- sufficient. The New Testament is full of "one another" commands. We are to comfort one another (1Thessalonians 4:18), build up one another (1Thessalonians 5:11), confess our sins to one another (James 5:16), pray for one another (James 5:16), and many more. How can we obey these directives if we stay away from the gathering of believers?

Accountability

God designed the church as a place where spiritual leaders could watch out for our welfare, as a shepherd guards the sheep (1 Peter 5:1-4; Hebrews 13:17). A Christian who answers only to himself can easily rationalize sinful attitudes or actions: regular contact with other Christians can keep us sharp.

LAW Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, Deuteronomy.

The first five books of the Bible are sometimes called the a Law of Moses. They give many of God's laws about how to live.

HISTORY

Joshua, Judges, Ruth, 1&2 Samuel, 1&2 Kings, 1&2 Chronicles, Ezra, Nehemiah, Esther.

These 12 historical books cover the occupation of the Promised Land, the time of the Judges, Israel's kings, the fall of the two kingdoms and a return to Jerusalem.

POETRY Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Songs.

Nearly one third of the Old Testament is written in poetry. These five poetical books ask profound questions about evil, pain, love, wisdom and God.

PROPHECY

Isaiah, Jeremiah, Lamentations, Ezekiel, Daniel, Hosea, Joel, Amos, Obadiah, Jonah, Micah, Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Haggai, Zechariah, Malachi.

The 17 prophetical books account for almost a quarter of the Bible. They are divided into "Major Prophets" (the first five books) and, "Minor Prophets" (the last 12). The "Minor" ones are shorter, not less important.

New Testament

There are 27 books in the New Testament library
There are three types of writing in the New Testament:
History, Letters, Prophecy.

Before you study a New Testament book it helps to consider what kind of literature you are reading: is it a letter or is it history?

HISTORY Matthew, Mark, Luke, John, Acts

The first four books, called gospels, are not like our modern biographies. But they do give four portraits of Jesus. Acts is part two of Luke, about the early church.

LETTERS PAUL'S LETTERS

Romans, 1 Corinthians, 2 Corinthians, Galatians, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, 1 Thessalonians, 2 Thessalonians, 1 Timothy, 2 Timothy, Titus, Philemon.

We have 13 of Paul's letters. Expect for one personal one, Philemon, they were all written to groups of Christians.

OTHER LETTERS Hebrews, James, 1 Peter, 2 Peter, 1 John, 2 John, 3 John, Jude.

We don't know who wrote Hebrews. Tradition states that all the writers of the New Testament, except for John, were martyred.

PHOPHECY Revelation

Written by the apostle John, this book has seven letters to churches and numerous visions about God.

I have seen the Lord! John 20:18

ccording to Jim and Jamie Dutcher, filmmakers known for their knowledge of wolves, when happy, wolves wag their tails and romp about. But after the death of a pack member, they grieve for weeks. They visit the place where the pack member died, showing grief by their drooping tails and mournful howls.

Grief is a powerful emotion we've all experienced, particularly at the death of a loved one or of a treasured hope. Mary Magdalene experienced it. She'd traveled with and helped support Jesus and His disciples (Luke 8:1-3). But His cruel death on a cross separated them. The only thing left for Mary to do for Jesus was to finish anointing His body for burial—a task the Sabbath had interrupted. But imagine how Mary felt when she found not a lifeless, broken body but a living Savior! Though she hadn't at first recognized the man standing before her, when He spoke her name, she knew who He was-Jesus! Instantly, grief turned to joy. Mary now had joyful news to share: "I have seen the Lord!" (John 20:18).

"They have taken my Lord away," she said, "and I don't know where they have put him," 14 At this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not realize that it was Jesus. He asked her, "Woman, why are you crying? Who is it you are looking for? Thinking he was the gardener, she said, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have put him, and I will get him." 16 Jesus said to her, "Mary." She turned toward him and cried out in Aramaic. "Rabboni!" (which mean's "Teacher"). 17 Jesus said, "Do not hold on to me, for I have not yet

ascended to the Father. Go instead to my brothers and tell them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.'" ¹⁸ Mary Magdalene went to the disciples with the news: "I have seen the Lord!" And she told them that he had said these things to her.

Insight

The name Mary is the English rending of the Greek Maria or Mariam (from the Hebrew Miriam) and was one of the most common female names in the New Testament times. The first Mary we meet is the mother of Jesus (Matthew 1:16). Other women bearing this name include Mary of Bethany, the sister of Martha and Lazarus (John 11:1-12:8; Luke 10:38-41); Mary, the mother of James (Mark 15:40); Mary, the mother of John Mark (Acts 12:12); Mary, the wife of Clopas (John 19:25); Mary of Rome (Romans 16:6); and Mary Magdalene, who is featured in John20:11-18. all the gospel writers place this Mary at Jesus' death or resurrection or both (Matthew 27:56-61: 28:1-10: Mark 15:40, 47; 16:1; Luke 24:10; John 20:1, 18). —Arthur Jackson
