• New Church Clerk Needed: Phyllis Rechtin is retiring as Church Clerk following the January 2025 Annual Meeting. The council will need to select a new Church Clerk beginning February 2025. The following excerpt describes the responsibilities of the Church Clerk:

The clerk shall be appointed by the church council to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the church; keep a register of addresses of church members, with dates and modes of their reception and removal; keep a record of baptisms and marriages [and deaths] (added); issue letters of transfer notifying the churches to which they are addressed; preserve on file all communications and written official reports; notify all persons elected to offices and committees; give legal notice of all meetings when such notices are necessary; conduct all correspondence so far as this is not otherwise provided for, and perform such other duties as are described by law or as usually pertain to the office of a clerk or secretary of an assembly.

• New Memorial Gifts Secretary Needed: The current secretary for Memorial Gifts, Jim Rechtin, is retiring effective at the annual meeting in January 2025. Below is a description of the duties. If you are interested in this position please contact Will Tyler, Moderator.

Memorial Gifts Secretary: One of three members appointed by the church council; shall serve for an indefinite term or until replaced by the council. Aids in upkeep of the Book of Remembrance and the Abiding Memorials Register for a separate memorial gifts bank account. Accepts donations for the gift fund and aids committee members in determining gifts or following through with specific donated gifts requests.






