Waterford's 3rd and 5th grade students will experience various aspects of colonial life through reenactments and participatory activities at several sites on Jordan Green.

**June 8 - “We, the Farmers...”**

Our town of Waterford was called the “West Farms” of New London until 1801. A discussion with descendants of our town’s farming families, including Ray Dimmock and Daneen Roth. The Dimmock family for decades had the right to harvest seaweed at Hammond beach, now Waterford Beach Park.

**Late July - “We, the Hay Harvesters...”**

During this field trip, Tim Conderino will demonstrate techniques that farmers have employed for centuries to harvest hay for their livestock and other purposes, while showing contemporary methods for harvesting. Register in advance via email.

Tim Conderino and others will discuss traditions for harvesting hay over the centuries here in Waterford and explain the purposes which hay still serves.

People once grew “kitchen gardens” near their houses, so that women could tend and harvest fruits, herbs, and vegetables, and preserve fruits and vegetables for the winter months by drying (dehydrating), placing prepared food in Ball jars, and/or placing food in ice cellars. **November 7 - “Harvest to Hearth in 1850’s Waterford”**
