pastor's letter from Pastor Jane

Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

We thank God for all His blessings. His hand of protection is still upon us in the form of simple precautions we can take to prevent contagion. Yet we should not take His protection for granted, nor these precautions lightly. He gives us wisdom and discernment to avoid problems in life. When we don't take advantage of them, we may have only ourselves to blame, if we contract this illness.

I heard a story of a devout man, who loved and served God all his life. He was caught in a flash flood. As he stood on his roof, he prayed asking God to save him. While he was still praying, his neighbor came by in a rowboat, but the man would not go with him and said "No, God will save me." The Sheriff's rescue boat came with flashing red lights, but the man would not get off the roof saying "No, God will save me." A helicopter crew with the National Guard tried to lower a rope to him, but he rejected their efforts as well saying "No, God will save me." The poor man's house, loosened from its foundation and crumbled into the torrent of raging water. Terrified, the man drowned in the waters as his home was demolished. When he reached the Pearly gates, he asked God "Why didn't you save me?" God said, "I sent your neighbor, the police, and the National Guard, but you would not come down off your roof." How are we like this man?

I have been exposed directly to a parishioner who tested positive for the Covid virus. Today Tuesday, I was notified, and I made an appointment immediately to be tested for Covid-19 at Essentia Health. We are so very fortunate to have such a comprehensive medical facility in our community, staffed by people from among us, who are our neighbors, and who care about us. I await the results, somewhat impatiently as we had such plans for next Sunday's Confirmation on All Saints Sunday, postponed to Nov. 22.

Consequently, our students will have yet another delay in one of their important milestones. Nevertheless, God has blessed us with great leadership who jumped right in and planned for a supply preacher and delayed confirmation to Nov. 22. In the meantime, our students are missing out on the crucial spiritual learning that takes place in their formative years. Parents, please be vigilant and use the Sunday School packets, watch or listen to church as a family, encourage the confirmands, take advantage of Youth Group activities and do not neglect your own spiritual food.

I know online learning is not as stimulating as one on one. As soon as I am cleared of this virus, I will be holding oneon-one sessions for 8th & 9th graders in particular, but anyone may come for a 15-minute masked, 6-foot distanced session after church services. Please call to schedule your child, or just come to observe.

Until cleared, I am doing my work at night when no one is in the church. So if you see church lights on at night, (don't panic) it is just me and my dog, working on the bulletin, newsletter, Bible Studies, and thinking of ways to make things better for our congregation and especially our kids during this plague. Your suggestions and wisdom is always welcome.

In the meantime, please take this virus seriously. Wearing a mask is not a political statement. It is a health precaution. Keeping a safe distance is more than inconvenience, it is loving your neighbor to the best of your ability. Washing your hands, using sanitizer or wearing gloves, is kindness.

I must admit, I have thought at times that perhaps I was giving in to fear. But when God gives us easy precautions to take, and we ignore them, it seems unwise. My prayer is that all who are in quarantine, have tests that come out negative; that all those who are in isolation regain their health; and that each of you remain safe and cautious.

May the peace that passes understanding keep you now and always.

Relying on Jesus

Many of us have experienced the fun of playing sports. One of the more exhausting sports is basketball. The pace of the game can be very demanding. During the midst of an intense game, it is a great relief to hear the referee blow his whistle indicating a time-out during which time players get their energy revived after drinking some needed water. The player almost thinks, "That water saved my life!"

The Christian life can be compared to a basketball game. As Christians saved by Christ's atoning work on the cross, we remain on earth to be Christ's ambassadors in order that others might come to saving faith also (2 Corinthians 5:20). But it gets to be exhausting. No one seems to appreciate our efforts to be kind and loving. In fact, sometimes we're made fun of when we try to explain our relationship with Jesus. It's like being tripped on the basketball court with no ref to call a foul. We need the whistle to blow, so we can get to the sidelines to be refreshed. That's why it's so important to be reading and studying the Bible. The Word of God is like that water bottle during time-outs of the basketball game. It clears our heads. It reminds us of our goal and revives us so we can get back into the "game" of living the Christian life.

In our lives, we don't always win, but we don't dwell on our losses. As Christians, we experience failures. Mistakes, failures – SIN – are part of being a Christian. It's important to remember that Christ, knowing our sinfulness, lived the perfect life in our places. He took our mistakes, our failures, our SIN to the cross, and we are free from the burden of carrying our sin around.

The Apostle Paul knew about discouragement; he experienced failure. He was often tired and friendless. He was stoned and whipped by his own people! Still he wrote, "Let us not become weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up" (Galatians 6:9). He knew firsthand how difficult this command is to fulfill. In fact, it's impossible. We can't do it on our own. Only in Christ's strength can we find the energy to keep on "doing good." To that end he prayed, "May the Lord direct your hearts to the love of God and to the steadfastness of Christ. (2 Thessalonians 3:5).

So, don't give up! When you get tired, find your spiritual water bottle, your Bible. Health experts tell us to drink a minimum of eight glasses of water a day. Even eight minutes a day spent in reading God's Word, accompanied by prayer and meditation on your reading, could do wonders for your spiritual vitality. Persevere in Christ's energy!

Giving Thanks to God


